Dear Friends,

As I sit and type this letter about these past weeks, I'm still in awe of Holy Week and Easter weekend. I want to start off by being very clear about something – we know all glory goes to God and that in and of ourselves, we could not have accomplished anything. We thank God for helping us do what we did!

We sang and sang again, “Christ is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia!” Easter marks the singular event in all of history that changed the lives of human beings forever. On Easter, Christians throughout the entire world celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. We rejoice with the Church and in Christ that the promise has been kept and that sin and death have lost their power.

During the forty days of Lent we were asked to prepare ourselves for the great gift of Easter through prayer, penance and charitable works. The Church invited us to walk the journey of faith with our Lord and to see the face of Christ in others. To look upon others as Jesus saw them and to treat others as Jesus did. As Christians we were asked to provide shelter for the homeless, to give food to the hungry, to pray for the dead, to reach out in compassion to those in need, to clothe the naked, to support the young mothers giving birth to their children, to bring joy to those imprisoned as they attempt to rebuild their lives, and to give a warm welcome to the stranger who has now become a friend. We have done that in the forty days. Since the beginning of Lent in the most difficult of times, parishioners and staff of this wonderful parish have worked tirelessly to deepen our awareness of the needs of the less fortunate here in our community. We have traveled the road to Emmaus and we have found God.

Thank you for all that you do and for all that you are. As I celebrate my third Easter with you as your administrator, I wanted you to know how very pleased I am to be here and how very proud I am to be the spiritual leader of such a vibrant faith community. In these few words, I would like to thank all of you for what you did to make this Easter celebration and the Season of Lent a success. I always thank God for the hardworking parishioners we have, who are not afraid to spend their time, talent and treasure for the church. I am going to avoid naming names because I am afraid I'd forget some.

Starting with Lent, the church was decorated with purple colored cloths. During all of Lent and the Triduum and Easter day, thanks to those who handed out palms, those who ministered in word and service. As we rejoice on this Easter Season, let us give thanks to the incredible Staff, our very talented musicians, brother priests, Father Brian,

**Reading**

**Acts 3:13-15, 17-19**

*Peter addresses the people describing the death of Jesus. God raised Jesus from the dead, fulfilling prophecies from the Old Testament. What does Peter then say to them, giving them hope? Is he saying this to us?*

Peter said to the people:

"The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, the God of our fathers, has glorified his servant Jesus, whom you handed over and denied in Pilate's presence when he had decided to release him. You denied the Holy and Righteous One and asked that a murderer be released to you. The author of life you put to death, but God raised him from the dead; of this we are witnesses. Now I know, brothers, that you acted out of ignorance, just as your leaders did; but God has thus brought to fulfillment what he had announced beforehand through the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer. Repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away."

**1 Jn 2:1-5a**

*The author recognizes that even though we try not to sin, we do. He tells us that Jesus died for the expiation for our sins, the sins of the whole world. What is necessary to receive forgiveness?*

My children, I am writing this to you so that you may not commit sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous one. He is expiation for our sins, and not for our sins only but for those of the whole world. The way we may be sure that we know him is to keep his commandments. Those who say, "I know him," but do not keep his commandments are liars, and the truth is not in them. But whoever keeps his word, the love of God is truly perfected in him.

**Gospel**

**Lk 24:35-48**

*At the gathering of the apostles, Jesus appears. Although they were startled and terrified, Jesus recalled both in the old testament and his teachings, that He would rise. Why do you suppose He asked for food?*

The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost.

Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled?

And why do questions arise in your hearts?

Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself.

Touch me and see, because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you can see I have." And as he said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While they were still incredulous for joy and were amazed, He asked them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of baked fish; he took it and ate it in front of them. He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

**Some Thoughts:** I remember times when I was a youngster when I went on camping trips. One of the favorite activities on those trips was sitting around a campfire at night and telling ghost stories. Even though I kept telling myself, "There is no such thing as a ghost," that didn't keep some of those stories from scaring the daylights out of me, and they often made it difficult for me to go to sleep that night. Now, that might seem like a strange way to begin a Bible lesson, but even in Bible times, some people believed in ghosts and were afraid of them. Today's Bible lesson is one example of that. The story begins after two men had walked along a road to a place called Emmaus. They were discussing the crucifixion of Jesus and all of the events that had taken place in the past few days. They wondered what it all meant. As they walked, they were joined by a man on their walk. They did not recognize that the man was Jesus.

There is much more to that part of the story, but it is enough for now that we know that Jesus revealed himself to them. Finally, they recognized that the man was Jesus. They were so excited to see that Jesus was alive that they jumped up and walked all the way back to Jerusalem. The two men found Jesus' disciples and began telling them what they had seen. The Bible tells us that as they said these things, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be to you." Do you think the disciples felt peace? No! The Bible says that they were terrified and filled with fear, thinking that they had seen a ghost! Once again Jesus spoke to his disciples. "Why are you troubled, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands. Look at my feet. You can see that it's really me. Touch me and make sure that I am not a ghost, because ghosts don't have bodies, as you see that I do." Still the disciples stood in disbelief, so Jesus asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of fish, and he ate it as they watched. That was even further proof that they were not seeing a ghost. A ghost doesn't need food. The disciples had seen Jesus die. They had seen him placed in a tomb. But now they saw Jesus alive. Not just this day, but for more than 40 days, they saw him and talked with him. They even watched him eat food. They were not seeing a ghost! Those same disciples went all over the world, telling the story of Jesus' crucifixion, his death, and his resurrection. They never stopped telling the story during their whole lives.

You and I have been called to tell the story just like those disciples. We must be a witness for Jesus, too. We must tell the world that Jesus is alive.

## *Front Porch with God*

**Me:** Good Morning Jesus!

**God:** Well, Good Morning to you my friend.

**Me:** I really love starting every day by saying that.

**God:** And I love hearing you say it. Makes both of us feel real good, doesn't it?

**Me:** Yes it does. And what you said to your apostles - "Peace be with you" - what a wonderful thing to wish for everyone.

**God:** Thanks. I have tried to set an example, you know? But there was something else in the readings today that was also very important.

**Me:** What was that?

**God:** In Acts, where Peter says "Repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away" - that part of having your sins wiped away is *very* important.

**Me:** And yet I think I have the greatest difficulty with that. It's hard to believe that my sins are just wiped away by you.

**God:** Likely because humans have such a hard time forgiving each other. And yet this happens. But please - don't get carried away here. It's not that you can just do anything you want and expect no consequences to follow.

**Me:** I'm a little lost here.

**God:** Well, just understand that you do have to be genuinely sorry for your sins, and then make a real effort to repent, to change the way you act. Even if you do commit those same sins over and over again.

**Me:** And when I do, don't you get frustrated with me, and maybe just give up on me?

**God:** Well, as hard as it may seem, I never give up on you. Maybe you do, but not me. Humans get frustrated, but I love you too much to follow that path. Sometimes I might just say 'You knucklehead, when will you ever learn?' or maybe 'Oh no, here he goes again' - but give up on you? Not going to happen.

**Me:** You're amazing, you know that?

**God:** That is my role in all this, but thank you for the compliment. Shall we pray together?

**Me:** Yes, let's do that. What shall we pray for?

**God:** Well, you already called it. How about praying for Peace and Forgiveness?
