LENT THE BASICS

WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is an annual preparation for Easter observance – calling us to reform our lives and to open our hearts to the blessings God has promised to bestow on us. Lent begins Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Thursday evening when the Triduum begins.

WHAT MUST WE DO?

According to the Church's Canon Law, all healthy Catholics from age 18 to 59 are required to fast and abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and to abstain from meat on all other Friday's of Lent. Fasting is a bodily way to remind ourselves that we need God above all things. Fasting is also a sacrifice, a gift back to God of our heart's intent to depend more completely on God.

WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Take the necessary steps to get yourself on the road to conversion and spiritual renewal. To help you do this, the three main Lenten disciplines urges are: 1) prayer, 2) fasting and 3) almsgiving. We are invited during Lent to practice these disciplines often. But these aren't just chores we must do because the Church strongly urges them; they are above all opportunities to grow in faith and in love for God.

WHY PRAYER, FASTING AND ALMS?

The Lenten basic practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving are rooted in Jesus original guidance about how to be His disciples that we find in the Sermon on the Mount (Mt ch 5-7). *The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1966-1972)* also reminds us that Jesus here outlines for us the new law which, if we embrace and implement it, will lead us more surely to the interior renewal and growth in holiness and perfection that Jesus expects of us as His disciples.

SHOULD I SET LENTEN GOALS?

Absolutely. Reflect prayerfully about your Lenten resolution before making them. Then make yourself a list. But be modest. You may be setting yourself up for disappointment if you set unrealistic goals. And doing a little with love and devotion is spiritually more beneficial than trying to do much but doing it half-heartedly.

EXPLAINATION OF FASTING, ALMSGIVING AND PRAYER

FASTING: Express our desire to find happiness in God rather than in the satisfaction of our physical needs. The control we gain over our appetites helps us recognize more deeply that all true and lasting pleasure comes from God. Knowing this we are freed to gratefully accept food and savor it, or to avoid or limit foods that we know are unhealthy for us. Through fasting, our relationship to ourselves is reoriented toward God.

ALMSGIVING: Provides assistance to the poor among us and helps us recognize God as the true source of our security. Property and wealth exercise less control over us when we give away or share our wealth out of love for God and for others. Almsgiving is a way of bringing our relationship to others into the orbit of Christ's love

PRAYER Changes our relationship to God. Through prayer, we admit our need for a power that is greater than ourselves. We acknowledge our limitations and let go of the drive to control everything. In the process, we open ourselves to all that God has to offer us.

LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

The Church teaches that Catholics in good health are to observe the following practices during Lent unless for some serious reason they are unable to do so.

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and ALL the Fridays in Lent.

Fasting as explained by the US Bishops means partaking of only one full meal and two smaller meals that do not equal the main meal. Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not to eggs, milk products or condiments made of animal fat.



Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular and important holy days in the liturgical calendar. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent. It is a season of penance, reflection, and fasting which prepares us for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday, through which we attain redemption.

Ash Wednesday takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday, and is chiefly observed by Catholics, although many other Christians observe it too.

Ash Wednesday comes from the ancient Jewish tradition of penance and fasting. The practice includes the wearing of ashes on the head. The ashes symbolize the dust from which God made us. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Alternatively, the priest may speak the words, "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

Ashes also symbolize grief, in this case, grief that we have sinned and caused division from God. Writings from the Second-century Church refer to the wearing of ashes as a sign of penance. Priests administer ashes during Mass and all are invited to accept the ashes as a visible symbol of penance. Even non-Christians and the excommunicated are welcome to receive the ashes. The ashes are made from blessed palm branches, taken from the previous year's Palm Sunday Mass. Ashes also symbolize grief, in this case, grief that we have sinned and caused division from God. It is important to remember that Ash Wednesday is a day of penitential prayer and fasting. It is generally inappropriate to dine out, to shop, or to go about in public after receiving the ashes. Feasting is highly inappropriate. Small children, the elderly and sick are exempt from this observance.

It is not required that a person wear the ashes for the rest of the day, and they may be washed off after Mass. However, many people keep the ashes as a reminder until the evening.

Why we receive the ashes

Following the example of the Ninevites, who did penance in sackcloth and ashes, our foreheads are marked with ashes to humble our hearts and reminds us that life passes away on Earth. We remember this when we are told "Remember, Man is dust, and unto dust you shall return." Ashes are a symbol of penance made sacramental by the blessing of the Church, and they help us develop a spirit of humility and sacrifice.

The distribution of ashes comes from a ceremony of ages past. Christians who had committed grave faults performed public penance. On Ash Wednesday, the Bishop blessed the hair shirts which they were to wear during the forty days of penance, and sprinkled over them ashes made from the palms from the previous year. Then, while the faithful recited the Seven Penitential Psalms, the penitents were turned out of the church because of their sins --just as Adam, the first man, was turned out of Paradise because of his disobedience. The penitents did not enter the church again until Maundy Thursday after having won reconciliation by the toil of forty days' penance and sacramental absolution. Later, all Christians, whether public or secret penitents, came to receive ashes out of devotion. In earlier times, the distribution of ashes was followed by a penitential procession. www.catholic.org/lent

The last of our Level 2 families received their First Reconciliation this week. What an incredible celebration of love and forgiveness for our children.



Family Ideas for Ash Wednesday Worship: Many young families come after school to receive ashes on Ash Wednesday. Why not go in a little late and get your ashes before school/work? Ashes are the visible sign that we are entering into the season of Lent.

Serve: On Ash Wednesday, we remember that we are part of the human family, making it a great day to serve others. If possible, take an hour to help a neighbor, or during lunch, sit with the student or co-worker who usually sits alone.

Give: During Lent we are called to give alms; this year Faith Formation is participating with the Parish with the Baby Bottle campaign.

Continue giving outside of the parish as well. Leave your server an above-and-beyond tip. Put money in the instrument case of a street musician. Purchase a paper from the homeless woman on the corner. Find ways to bless others with that which God entrusts you.

Abstain/fast: "Giving something up for Lent" is a common practice for many Christians.

Don't limit yourself to food or habits. Abstain from gossip or complaining for Ash

Wednesday. What about defensive attitudes,

fear, or anxiety? When these attitudes begin to take hold of your day, pause for prayer.

Pray your day: Pray for the drivers of the vehicles and fellow mass transit passengers with whom you share your commute. Pray as you pass the hospital, police station, and government offices. Pray for the trash collector and mail carrier. Offer prayers throughout the day thanking God for your coworkers.

Be still: Others find meaning in stillness. Light a candle and pause before the presence of God. Take a yoga class. Enjoy a cup of coffee on your deck. Listen for the voice of God.

Clean something: Ash Wednesday is a good day to get a jump on your spring cleaning. Spend an hour with the junk drawer, that cabinet at work, or organizing the files on your computer. 40 bags in 40 days. As you remove things you no longer need and reorder those you do, be mindful of the ways God "cleans" us.

Forgive and seek forgiveness: As we pray for God's grace, we should also seek forgiveness from those we have wronged. Ash Wednesday is a great time to go to those you have hurt.







This devotional image is recognized worldwide and has been venerated dating back to over 90 years ago when in 1931 our Lord appeared to Saint Faustina in a vision. He said to her:

"Paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the signature:

Jesus, I trust in You. I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish...I am offering people a vessel with which they are to keep coming for graces to the fountain of mercy. That vessel is this image..."

The image represents the graces of Divine Mercy poured out upon the world, especially through Baptism and the Eucharist, and we can be assured that it is a vehicle of God's grace if it is revered with trust in His mercy.


