🔀 A Joyful Message



Hooray to the month of May! This month will find us revving up our lawn mowers, and finally putting away our winter wear for the season. Some of us may have begun preparations for college graduations among our family and friends, with commencement exercises taking place near and far. Congratulations to all our young parishioners who are donning their caps and gowns, and bearing diplomas at last!

I'm brought back to my own memories of my college years in the Back Bay section of Boston, MA. I totally enjoyed my courses in architecture, and I recall one outstanding teacher, Mrs. O'Connor, who was in her early 80's. A retired architect herself, she was the first woman to ever graduate from MIT in Boston (Massachusetts Institute of Technology). As she stood in the front of our classroom, she would swing her right arm toward the large bow windows that offered up a full view of the landmark brownstone buildings nearby. With one gnarled finger pointing beyond the glass, she would exclaim, "SEE what you're looking at!" She would proclaim that statement often. In other words, don't just look at things as you pass by, but truly see what it is that your sight is taking in. That may have been the most useful concept that I learned throughout my college years, and I remember it still, to "SEE what you're looking at!"

Years later, I would undertake a 9-month course in ecospirituality, connecting the science of ecology with spirituality. My studies took place on the grounds of the Dominican Sisters of Sparkill, located on the banks of the Hudson River in upstate New York. One of my teachers was a Jesuit priest, who excelled in describing how God was constantly revealed to us through Nature. One morning, as Fr John was wrapping up his lesson, he instructed us to go outside for an hour, to walk around the campus and experience God's hand in the natural world. We were then instructed to return at the allotted time, and report on our outdoor encounter with the Divine.

Hmmmm...where to start? There were plenty of options available on this wide swath of waterfront property. I decided to walk down a winding gravel road that led to the hermitages. It was early May, and the air was mild and bright. Twenty minutes of ambling down this path, I found myself thinking of Mrs. O'Connor's words, "SEE what you're looking at!" With a gradual change in landscape, I arrived in a deeply wooded area. Rows of maple trees were growing side-by-side, forming two leafy panels of spring growth on either edge of the road. A canopy of fresh green buds and lacy maple fronds sheltered me overhead. I was surrounded by green, and in a way that is still difficult to describe, I had an intense experience of green. Green, the color of new life. Green, the color of hope. I slowly circled in a clockwise direction, stopping from time-to-time, taking in this profound appreciation for one color. Unconsciously, my arms extended and rose from either side, like branches reaching out to the sky. It was an unfamiliar, yet authentic form of prayer, a spontaneous reaching upward to the Divine meeting me in that moment.

When I returned to class to describe my experience, I feared it might sound a bit ridiculous. As best I could, I shared my encounter of "God As Green." My teacher, Fr John, seemed to understand. I think Mrs. O'Connor would have approved. As unique as this was for me at the time, I believe that there are countless opportunities for all of us to discover this type of sacred moment when our God is revealed to us anew, in ways we could not have imagined.

While springtime is in full flourish, let's take a focused look at what surrounds us, meeting the Divine in spaces and places that are just waiting for us to take notice.

Thank you to our parishioners and guests who donated over 120 lbs of non-perishable food at the Holy Thursday Mass.


After two years, the Letter Carriers' **Stamp Out Hunger**
