

Dear Friends,

I am not sure when you are reading this, so I am keeping this in mind as I write. We received word on June 8th that the New England Bishops are lifting the dispensation for the weekend Mass obligation as of June 19th (Today/Father's Day weekend).

We are, of course, pleased to be called back to our usual way of doing things, and a return to being the community we are meant to be. Bishop da Cunha's letter announcing this is available where you are reading this. (Please be sure to read it for the wonderful context he offers in the making of this decision!)

In our parish, however, I do not feel we are ready quite yet to embrace this invitation. We still have a few things to prepare in the church, and with the seasonal change in our schedule not happening until after the date he gave, I do not feel that our parishioners, in general, will be comfortable with this happening so quickly.

With that in mind I am dispensing our parishioners from the Sunday Mass obligation until July 10th (the weekend after July 4th). This will allow us to more comfortably accommodate those who are still somewhat uneasy at gathering in larger groups, as well as to be sure our worship space is properly prepared to provide all that we usually do (such as Missalettes and Prayer Cards, and other things as well).

The call to return is a welcome one, and I am so pleased to see us returning to some sense of normal. The past few weeks have been joy-filled for me (and many others, too) as we see people we have missed face-to-face, and recognizing the power of the community to bring strength and joy to us all.

For those who may think I am somehow resisting our Bishop in this matter, please know that nothing could be further from the truth. In fact, the Bishop has placed great trust in his pastors to know our people's needs and sensitivities, and to respond properly to them. I believe he will be pleased that I have paid close attention to who we are here, and offered you the space and time necessary to allow for a truly grace-filled return to this community's gathering to worship.

Please know that this dispensation only applies to St. John's parishioners. My authority in this matter is very strictly limited to our parish only, as that is the family of faith I am entrusted to serve.

Finally, please be sure to read the Bishop's letter (on our website), not only for his exposition of why we are obliged to attend Mass and its blessings, but also because he makes clear that many of you reading this are already dispensed due to health concerns, and for other reasons, from attending Sunday Mass. Please know he offers this advice so that you may be at peace when you find yourself unable to attend Mass for the reasons he elucidates. His letter communicates well his compassion and concern for us all, and we thank him for it. Continued blessings to us all as we move forward under God's protective grace!



*In his Apostolic Letter entitled *Patris corde* ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis describes Saint Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows. Pope Francis has declared this "The Year of Saint Joseph." In honor of this, and in honor of her father, John Train this Father's Day, Connie has submitted testimony about her father's love. She invites all of you to do the same.*



Remembering My Father, John Train by Connie Murphy

On January 21, 1969 I became a 29-year-old widow when my wonderful husband was killed in a tragic Air Force plane crash at Minot AFB in North Dakota. He had only weeks before returned from a six-month tour of duty in Southeast Asia, and we'd welcomed our third daughter, Susan, to our growing family on January 10. She joined her sisters Diane, aged four and Janet aged two. We were over-the-moon with joy and happiness to have him home with us again and thrilled with our new addition.

Just eleven days later, Dick was killed in the accident, and my life was turned completely upside

down. All of a sudden, I had to make plans for a funeral and decide what to do for myself and the girls, and where I'd start over. I grew up in Somerville before I entered the Air Force as a nurse. So, without hesitation, my Dad offered to help me with the transition and welcomed me and the children back home until I could get my life together. He and my mother stood by my side with loving arms. Dad was especially heartbroken for the children, who were now fatherless. He simply took over the role of being such a marvelous grandfather. He'd hold the baby, Susan, for hours at a time in his rocking chair, pouring love all over her tiny body. He'd play with Diane and Janet, also, giving them the special devotion they needed each day. Eventually, I managed to get on my feet and buy a house of my own, but Dad was still behind me and continued to be the best guy in the world for us.

My parents had lost their only son, Jackie, a Marine who was killed in Korea in 1953. When Dick was killed, I know their hearts ached again for my loss, since Dick left behind a family who needed him. So again, Dad became my hero in so many ways because of his endless love, compassion and devotion.

He's been gone for nearly thirty years, but not a day goes by without a thought or two for him. As for me, I did remarry a wonderful man, who was also widowed with young children. We combined our children into a new family, and welcomed our son to our lives. They are all grown. I have nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild. I am again a widow, but every day I thank the Lord for His countless blessings of having such a terrific father.



GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

June 20, 2021 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

As we look at our lives and world events, do we ever find ourselves wondering if God is sleeping? After all, maybe God's patient, unconditional love has run its course and He is finally fed up with humanity's reluctance to accept the truth about who we are. God really can't be that patient! All throughout human history, many have prayed to God for intervention or for particular needs. Because their prayers were not answered in the way they wanted or anticipated, they felt that God may have abandoned them. Were they right? It seems that we are continuing, at a rapid rate, down a path of destruction. Do you not care, God, that we may be perishing? When the boats of our lives are rocking and the seas tumultuous, we want to know that we have God's attention. Even more so, we want God's intervention.

Maybe the storms and the waves are necessary. If we listen, they can teach us valuable lessons. Without them, we would never learn that we have the strength to endure, understand the uselessness of fear and worry, or develop the ability to really trust. If God immediately rushed in and simply calmed things down before they got difficult, what good would that really be? We would miss opportunities to learn how to drink more deeply of life, treasure its complexity, irony, and beauty and fully engage ourselves in surrendering to the love of our Creator. It is easy to walk on the surface of life without immersing ourselves in its messiness. Life has to burn its way through us in order to bring

us to a place of secure trust. It's unfortunate that some prefer a shallower journey.

That's the balancing act that comes with faith. It is not God's job to prevent us from encountering the torrential rains and winds of life. Many believe that if faith is done the right way, that God will provide for smooth sailing. That's not how it works. God permits us to ride out the difficult stuff knowing that the storm will eventually be calmed. Do we not have faith that God will do this? True faith trusts in the steadfastness of God's love when the seas are calm and when they are choppy. God's unconditional loving presence shines through all of it and endures forever. Knowing this allows us to put our boats out into uncharted waters without hesitation. MEMORIAL OF ALOYSIUS GONZAGA, RELIGIOUS

Sometimes you have to swim upstream

Discerning one's vocation can be tricky enough, but once you've figured out God's call, you might encounter resistance from others in answering it. Saint Aloysius Gonzaga can relate. As an aristocrat in Renaissance Italy, he was expected to join decadent courtly life and have an accomplished military career. But even in his early teens, Aloysius was dismayed by the violence and licentiousness of his time. Deeply devout, he bucked family and societal expectations and sought a different path. He renounced his inheritance and became a Jesuit. When we encounter pressure to ignore God, may Aloysius help us all stay true.

MEMORIAL OF JOHN FISHER, BISHOP AND THOMAS MORE, MARTYRS

Truth trumps tyranny

Thomas More shares this feast day with John Fisher—both beheaded for daring to cross England's King Henry VIII in his power grab. Significantly, Henry moved up Fisher's execution day so it wouldn't fall on the feast of another sainted John—John the Baptist, who likewise was beheaded by a king for opposing royal tyranny. It's always the right time to speak truth to power, even when the cost is high.

Let's make the world a better place

Today the United Nations celebrates Public Service Day to honor the public servants who selflessly work to promote the common good. Each of us, however, is called to make the world a better place through service. As Pope Francis says in Fratelli Tutti: Service means caring "for the vulnerable members of our families, our society, our people . . . Service always looks to their faces, touches their flesh, senses their closeness . . . and tries to help them." Whether as emergency responders, sanitation workers, public advocates, teachers, community volunteers, or whatever your vocation or profession may be, take the opportunity to recognize the humanity of the vulnerable and offer your help.

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST

Catch fire

Although American Catholics in general don't tend to make a fuss over the Nativity of John the Baptist, today's solemnity is one of the church's earliest, and it used to be widely celebrated in Europe with bonfires and outdoor festivities. Some regions still hold celebrations for John, who prepared humanity for the coming of Christ. The bonfires recognize the fire within this zealous, outspoken saint. Do you harbor a fire for Christ? If your passion has ebbed, pray to Saint John the Baptist to intercede that you might reignite your fire for the kingdom of God.

Friday, June 25, 2021

Confirm your spiritual identity

Most seventh-graders are thrilled by two things about Confirmation: the possibility of having a tongue of fire hover over their heads and choosing a new name. It's not that anything is necessarily wrong with their given names, but it seems awesome to choose one's very own name. Though a sacrament and public witness in the church, Confirmation is also a personal confirmation of our own selves as unique and beloved of God. What can you do today to confirm your relationship with God?

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
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
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
