### **MASK MANDATE**

Cardinal Seán has mandated that throughout the archdiocese all people attending public Masses, including weddings and funerals, wear masks. This mandate takes effect the weekend of December 18/19, 2021, and expires on January 17, 2022.

## St. John's and St. Cecilia's Collaborative

In June of 2023, the parishes of St. John's and St. Cecilia's will become a single working collaborative, meaning there will be one pastor for both parishes. The collaborative process has been ongoing in the Archdiocese for the last ten years or so, and 2023 will be the final year of the implementation of this process. The collaborative plan has come about to help address the shortage of priests in the Archdiocese. More information will be forthcoming throughout the coming year.

## First Friday Mass in Honor of the Sacred Heart and Spiritual Reparation

We will have a first Friday Mass THIS Friday, January 7 at 7PM in the lower church, in honor of our Lord's Most Sacred Heart. Why?: To make reparation for our sins, the sins and failures of Church leadership; and for the sins of the world; to pray for the spiritual healing of those that have been hurt; to deepen our own relationship to Our Savior through His most Sacred Heart. Devotion to the Sacred Heart, as we know it, began about the year 1672. On repeated occasions, Jesus appeared to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, a Visitation nun, in France, and during these apparitions He explained to her the devotion to His Sacred Heart as He wanted people to practice it. He asked to be honored in the symbol of His Heart of flesh. Our Lord asked for acts of reparation, Communion on the First Friday of the month, and the keeping of the Holy Hour. When the Catholic Church approved the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She did not base Her action only on the visions of Saint Margaret Mary. The Church approved the devotion on its own merits. There is only one Person in Jesus, and that Person was at the same time God and Man. His Heart, too, is Divine -it is the Heart of God. We will have first Friday Masses, in honor of our Lord's Most Sacred Heart, especially for the reparation of sins and sacrileges that so offend our heavenly Father: for our sins; the sins of the Church; and sins of the world. Following the Mass, we will pray the litany to Our Lord's Most Sacred Heart.

## Holy Hour for the Conversion of Sinners and Prayers for the Dying

There is a holy hour here at St. John's parish for the conversion of sinners and prayers for the dying on Thursdays at 6:30PM in the lower church.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation will be celebrated 8:30-9:15AM in the lower church **NEXT Saturday, January 8.** 

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament follows the 9AM Mass in the lower church every Friday, beginning with the Litany to our Blessed Mother. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy is recited at 11:45AM followed by Benediction. Please feel free to drop in for a visit.

The Knights of Columbus free-throw competition is an annual event sponsored by the Ashland/Hopkinton Council (Bishop Rice council #4822) The event is open to all boys and girls aged 9 to 14 in the local communities. Trophies will be presented to first and second place winners and a medal is awarded to the third-place winner in each age category. First place winners advance to the district finals. The event brings the youth of the community together for a friendly competition and all can participate regardless of disabilities. Since 1972 The Knights of Columbus have sponsored a basketball free-throw competition for boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 14. The Knights of Columbus, founded in 1882, is an Organization of Roman Catholic men whose charter is to support both their parishes and communities. 
## JANUARY 2, 2022

#### CROSS ROADS By Deacon Tony Isaiah 60: 1-6; Psalm 72: 1-2, 7-8, 10-13; Ephesians 3: 2-3, 5-6; Matthew 2: 1-12

In its most lofty definition, an epiphany is a profound revelation, understanding, and realization of something. Today we celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord. What could be more profound than the revelation and realization that God is with us through his Son, His Word Made Flesh, the Divine Light that cannot and would not be extinguished. In this monumental revelation, it is made clear that the rift between Gentile and Jew is eliminated, as the presence of God Among Us is revealed not only to the Jews in the persons of the poor shepherds, but also to the Gentiles in the persons of the learned and persistent Magi. Gentiles and Jews alike are all invited from all nations and races to be heirs to the Kingdom of God.

Also revealed is the difference between temporal authority, and that of God. Herod exemplifies the authority of force, subjugation, violence, greed, and lust for power over people and things. Divine authority is exemplified through the Christ Child as sacrificial love, vulnerability, humility, patience, gentleness, and mercy. When Herod learns from the Magi of the birth of the Christ, he consults with the chief priests and scribes. That demonstrates Herod's ignorance of Holy Scripture. But after that consultation, Herod sees a threat to his power, and reacts as Satan did. Herod decided, to fight God. In Herod's case, he decided to find and to murder the newly born Messiah. This scene also foreshadows the eventual rejection of Christ by the Jewish leaders. Thus, the shadow of the Cross is revealed.

Nevertheless, the Magi followed the light of the star to where the Light Of God was, to a humble manger. They humbly prostrated themselves before the Christ Child and presented their gifts of gold (signifying kingship), frankincense (signifying divinity), and myrrh (signifying Christ's anointing and burial). Like the Magi, we are called to follow the Light of Christ. We also are called **to be** a light that leads others to Christ, by exemplifying sacrificial love, peace, justice, forgiveness, humility, and relief for the lowly, the poor, and the persecuted. Let us pray that God reveal to each of us what He knows we are now, and what He knows we could and should be with His help, that we as Church may become a light to the world.
