# The Epiphany of God

## Verily thou art a God that hidest thyself. Isaiah 45:15

...God hides himself in his creation. That sounds an extraordinary thing to say; for it is in his creation that God reveals himself....Yet, so revealing himself to those who patiently seek for him, from those who indolently ignore the message he conceals himself....Man has the fatal power of not thinking. So God allows himself to be blasphemed by those who deny his existence; he, whose very nature it is to exist. From millions of mankind he hides the very principle of his nature.

God hides himself in his governance of the world, in the process of history. The Jews knew that; their bewilderment over it runs through the whole of the Old Testament like a plaintive refrain: "Why standest thou so far off, O Lord, and hidest thy face in the needful time of trouble?" Dominated as they were by the notion of strict justice, of an exact proportion between sin and suffering as punishment for sin, thy were baffled by a spectacle of a world in which they, God's chosen people, were condemned to defeat and to captivity, while the bloodthirsty heathen flourished. And we too, after all these centuries are not exempt from the same misgivings....do we find the most devoted and unselfish characters of our acquaintance rewarded, in this world, with prosperity? Do we find that scheming wickedness always defeats its own ends?...We know that it is not so; God will not make the riddle of existence as easy for us as that. He hides himself; he bids his sun shine upon the evil and the good; sends rain upon the just and the unjust.

The time came, in God's mercy, when he would make a fuller revelation of himself to man. Now at last, we thought, all would be plain; there can be no more concealment, when God himself comes down to live amongst his creatures....If we thought that, we were doomed to disappointment. He came, and the world missed the portents of his coming. The stars could not keep his secret, they blurted it out to the wise men, their cronies; the angels could not keep the secret, they sang it to the shepherds over the fields of Bethlehem. But the world, the world of fashion and intelligence, was looking the other way. What, after all, was there for it to see? A baby, crying at its mother's breast; a boy working in a carpenter's shop; a street-corner orator, producing a nine-days' wonder among the fisher-folk at Capernaum; a discredited popular leader, ignominiously put to death; a corpse lying in a tomb--and this was God! He rose

again, but in doing so he showed himself to none but a handful of chosen witnesses; the world looked to find him and he was gone. Would you know that Jesus Christ is divine? Then see how he imitates, in his humanity, the reticence of the God who created the world and left it to forget him, the God who rules the world, yet rules it imperceptibly; and recognize, in the masterpiece of his Incarnation, the touch of the same artist's brush....

...If, in his Incarnation, God stooped toward us and condescended to our own level by uniting his divine nature with a human nature, which, though created, was yet created in his own image, possessing intellect and will, how much lower he stoops, how much more he condescends, when he hides himself in the Holy Eucharist, veiled under the forms of material, insensible things! If in his Incarnation he gave himself up into the hands of men, allowed them to overpower and control his movements, how much more generously does he give himself into the priest's hands and expose himself to outrage from his enemies!....

God hides himself; it is by that sign that we are to recognize him. Look up, then, Christian hearts, and see God enthroned in the monstrance; for here, hidden more than anywhere else, more than anywhere else he is revealed.
