

On the last day of Christmas...

We have all sorts of ideas when Christmas ends. Stores and radio stations think it's midnight on December 26. Some folks opt for New Year's Day. The twelve days from the carol bring us to the Epiphahy (which in Catholic countries falls on January 6 instead of a convenient Sunday). But, in the Church's Liturgy, Christmas ends with today's feast: the Baptism of the Lord. So, enjoy this last day of Christmas, like a stolen moment!

Certainly as we look back over the past few weeks, many thanks are due—to our musicians, our liturgical ministers, our decorating crews, everyone who helped distribute giving tree and homebound gifts.

And, if you're not particularly busy this afternoon, we can use some help un-decorating the church right after today's 11:00am Mass!

An octave of prayer...

"Octaves" in Church lingo are pretty similar to what they are in music. Eight of something. Eight notes, eight days. Our greatest feast days—Christmas and Easter—stretch out to an octave of celebration.

Every January 18 through 25 we keep the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. It was created by the Graymoor Friars, a group of Episcopalian monks who—searching for unity in the Church—joined the Catholic Church. Originally the octave spanned the time between two feast days of the apostles—one (no longer on our calendar) for St. Peter, the other for St. Paul (his conversion, still on the calendar for January 25). The intent remains: to pray that divided Christianity—Catholic, Orthodox and Protestant—may truly be one as Christ intended and prayed. Join in praying for that unity. Prayers for all Christians will be part of each Mass during those days.

A day of prayer and fasting...

The Bishops of the United States have set aside January 22 as a day of prayer for the protection of Unborn Human Life. While this day stands in opposition to the Roe v Wade anniversary, its roots are deep in Christian history.

Only decades after the baptism of St. Helen and her son the Emperor Constantine, the first legislation protecting unborn life passed the Roman Senate. And, before we leap to the conclusion that this was the beginning of a Christian assault on women's rights, let us remember that with the advance of Christianity, laws were created that prevented men from merely killing their wives or their slaves. People just weren't property any longer—be they children, spouses or servants. Life is life—from conception until natural death.

Join us in prayer and fasting this January 22—especially with a noon Mass in the Church. (Remember, the building is open for private prayer all day, from 8:00am until after the Saturday evening Mass.



We extend a warm welcome to all who attend our church. It is our desire that you find our parish community a place where your life of faith will be nourished. Your prayers, your presence, and your talents are most welcome and we hope that you will share them with us. Please feel free to introduce yourself after Mass. God bless.



Good Catholic, bad Catholic, not even remotely a Catholic. The Church wants to hear from everyone and anyone—especially people who may seem to be on the margins.

If you wonder why this is happening, let's look back at our history. The Church has always balanced group thinking and leadership thinking. Even in the Acts of the Apostles the early Church meets in Jerusalem—counted as the first Church Council—but the apostles, and especially Peter, take a leading role.


Popes have their role to play. So do local bishops. So do Church Councils and diocesan synods and Parish Pastoral Councils. St Benedict even demanded that when a decision needs to be made the Abbot should ask the opinion of all the monks, beginning with the youngest member of the community. That sense of listening to the whole community is called "synodality." The Pope has called the Church to reflect on that part of our nature. And to do that, we need to hear from everyone we can reach. Please help!

CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE

Church law requires Catholics to be married with the church's prayers and blessings. Please call the pastor at least six months before your anticipated wedding date. All couples must complete a Pre-Cana program. If you or your fiancée were previously married and divorced, you will need an annulment before being married in the church. Allow at least a year to finish the annulment process.

BAPTISM

Infants and small children may be baptized at any Saturday evening or Sunday morning celebration of the Eucharist outside of Lent. The parish baptismal preparation session is required before the baptism of a couple's first child. Please visit our website for form.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Please notify the parish office whenever anyone is sick, unable to attend Mass and wishes to receive Holy Communion. Eucharistic Ministers are available to bring Communion to the sick. The Pastor will bring the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick as needed.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM

Sundays, September to May, K-8 at 9:30am. High School Students & Youth Group have various activities that can be found on the church website or within this bulletin. A two-year period of preparation for First Penance and First Eucharist takes place in first and second grades for baptized children. A two-year program of Confirmation preparation for children who have received Baptism and Eucharist takes place during the seventh and eighth grades. All children must be registered.

Notice Regarding Reporting Sexual Abuse of a Minor

It is the policy of the Diocese of Scranton to report any allegation of sexual abuse of a minor to law enforcement. If you are a victim of sexual abuse committed by a priest, deacon, religious or lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton, you are encouraged to immediately report the matter to law enforcement. If any priest, deacon, religious, lay employee or volunteer of the Diocese of Scranton has cause or reason to suspect that a minor has been subjected to any form of abuse, including child sexual abuse, the matter will be reported to law enforcement. It is also the policy of the Diocese to adhere to all civil and state regulations. In accordance with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Laws, reports of suspected child abuse should also be made immediately by phone to the 24-HourChild Abuse hotline (ChildLine) at 1-800-932-0313 or electronically at www.compass.state.pa.us/cwis.

To this end, the Diocese is equally committed to adhering to the norms of the Code of Canon Law and to upholding the tenets of the USCCB Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People, which includes supporting victims of sexual abuse in their pursuit of emotional and spiritual wellbeing. As such, information regarding an allegation of sexual abuse of a minor should also be reported to the Victim Assistance Coordinator Mary Beth Pacuska at 570-862-7551.
