

Recently I finished up Fr. Mike Schmitz's Bible in a Year podcast. I know that many of you were listening as he read every word of the scriptures from Genesis through Revelation. I was a little later than folks who jumped into this project from the very beginning. But, I got there—sometimes listening in the car, sometimes while unloading the dishwasher, obscurer folding the laundry.

I'm glad I did this project. I've certainly been exposed to scripture previously—and, actually, pretty persistently—over the years. But, Bible in a Year refreshed my memory of passages both familiar and obscure. I appreciated the commentary from Fr. Schmitz and Jeff Cavins. In a brief time—the podcast ran between 20 and 30 minutes each day—they provided some useful context for the readings.

But, now it's over. What comes next?

A WORD

FROM THE PASTOR

This Sunday, which Pope Francis designated as the Sunday of the Word of God, might be a time to reflect on how we might engage scripture this year. So, some suggestions:

We can always return to Bible in a Year. The podcast is still out there, available to hear. Sometimes we hear more on the repeated listen than we did the first time.

Don't forget the scriptures at Mass. One of the great accomplishments of the Vatican II liturgical reforms was to increase the scriptural texts at Mass (and, for that matter, in the Liturgy of the Hours). Between Sunday and weekday Masses we hear a significant amount of the entire Bible. Access those readings in *Word Among Us* (with reflections) or at bible.usccb.org.


Shop around for good commentaries on the scriptures. Some readable suggestions: *The Word on Fire Bible* (beautiful books with clear commentary and wonderful artwork), *The Great Adventure Bible* (with a strong sense of the history behind the text), Peter Williamson and Mary Healy's series *the Catholic Commentary on Sacred Scripture* (commentaries on each book of the Bible).

Remember we continue to offer parish Bible study on Monday evenings. Check the bulletin or call the office to find out how to access that group. (As COVID concerns continue to arise, Bible study has remained a virtual event.)

Do I need to mention the on-going streamed series *The Chosen*? Here's a project that strives to present the life of Jesus in a fresh and creative way. Like any series based on historical events we sometimes need to fact checking. Was

Thomas really the wine merchant at the wedding of Cana? Did Mary Magdalen have a gambling problem? (Short answer: Those are creative moments for the filmmakers. They're not part of the gospel.) But, watching and reading can give us a rich experience of the world and life of Christ and his disciples.

We have options. But, don't let the option be continuing to let dust accumulate on that Bible. Read the Word. Grow in relationship with that Word, that Word made flesh in Jesus Christ.

In today's Gospel Jesus reads the above words in Nazareth as he begins his public ministry. What are we doing through charity and justice to aid those experiencing hunger and poverty? What actions for justice do we extend for those who are both literally and figuratively held captive?

LIVING TODAY'S SCRIPTURE

U.S. BISHOPS' PRO-LIFE CHAIRMAN DENOUNCES FDA DECISION ON CHEMICAL ABORTION PILL

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced recently they will eliminate the safety requirement of in-person dispensing in the Risk Evaluation Mitigation Strategy (REMS) for the chemical abortion drug *mifepristone*. The FDA's action clears a path for the drug to be dispensed by clinics, medical offices, and hospitals through the use of online pharmacies or drug delivery services.

"One of the essential tasks of governments is to safeguard the health and well-being of citizens. As such, the FDA ought to act to protect the lives and health of mothers and children, rather than merely succumbing to the abortion industry's pressure to loosen safety standards.

I call on leaders of every level of government to stand with women in need by promoting policies that recognize the value and human dignity of both mother and child, rather than further promoting the devastating tragedy of abortion." - Archbishop William E. Lori chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Pro-Life Activities.

Under the guidance of St. Jerome, she founded several hospitals and hospices for the poor, the sick, for orphans, and for travelers. She personally saw to the needs of patients, treating their sores and changing their bandages.

Let's skip the long introductions. There's a survey. It originates with the Holy Father. It's being sent throughout the world. Anyone can submit a response. Good Catholic, bad Catholic, not even remotely a Catholic. The Church wants to hear from everyone and anyone—especially people who may seem to be on the margins.

In case you wonder why this is happening, let's look back at our history. The Church has always balanced group thinking and leadership thinking. Even in the Acts of the Apostles the early Church meets in Jerusalem—counted as the first Church Council—but the apostles, and especially Peter, take a leading role.

Popes have their role to play. So do local bishops. So do Church Councils and diocesan synods and Parish Pastoral Councils. St Benedict even demanded that when a decision needs to be made the Abbot should ask the opinion of all the monks, beginning with the youngest member of the community. That sense of listening to the whole community is called "synodality." The Pope has called the Church to reflect on that part of our nature. And to do that, we need to hear from everyone we can reach. Please help!

CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE

Church law requires Catholics to be married with the church's prayers and blessings. Please call the pastor at least six months before your anticipated wedding date. All couples must complete a Pre-Cana program. If you or your fiancée were previously married and divorced, you will need an annulment before being married in the church. Allow at least a year to finish the annulment process.

BAPTISM

Infants and small children may be baptized at any Saturday evening or Sunday morning celebration of the Eucharist outside of Lent. The parish baptismal preparation session is required before the baptism of a couple's first child. Please visit our website for form.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Please notify the parish office whenever anyone is sick, unable to attend Mass and wishes to receive Holy Communion. Eucharistic Ministers are available to bring Communion to the sick. The Pastor will bring the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick as needed.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM

Sundays, September to May, K-8 at 9:30am. High School Students & Youth Group have various activities that can be found on the church website or within this bulletin. A two-year period of preparation for First Penance and First Eucharist takes place in first and second grades for baptized children. A two-year program of Confirmation preparation for children who have received Baptism and Eucharist takes place during the seventh and eighth grades. All children must be registered.
