







SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE SUNDAY SUNDAY, JANUARY 16TH

Before birth the LORD called me, from my mother's womb He gave me my name.

The Catholic Church **teaches that all human life is sacred** (sanctity of life) and that everyone has a right to life which should be protected and valued at every stage. The Catholic Church is against abortion in all circumstances. The Catholic Church teaches that life begins at conception.

On January 13, 1984, President Ronald Reagan issued a proclamation designating January 22 as the first National Sanctity of Human life Day [January 22, 1973 was the day the US Supreme Court legalized abortion-on-demand in all 50 states].

This January marks the 49th anniversary of the Roe v. Wade decision, legalizing abortion on demand. In the United States alone, over 62.5 million infants have lost their lives to abortion. Recently, Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Center brought abortion back to the Supreme Court, opening the door to a new hope that all life will be protected.

As Christians, our purpose is to save and transform lives and share the love of Christ. When a pregnancy is unexpected, it can be difficult to see this new little life as a gift. We help women and men see the beauty, joy and value of this new life. We are excited to announce that we will soon offer ultrasound services at all three of our center locations, giving a new mother the chance to see her baby and hopefully choose life.



Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, and with this celebration the Church brings an end to the Christmas Season. I believe that this feast is truly an appropriate way to finish our celebration of this wondrous time of the year. As

I wrote earlier, Christmas really is a prelude to Easter. In a sense it is a foreshadowing of the ultimate crescendo moment of the liturgical year. At Christmas we celebrate the Incarnation—God uniting himself to us in the person of Jesus. Christ becomes one of us in order to die for us. His death made it possible for us to live our life to the fullest. If Christ did not come and die on the cross, we would remain enslaved to sin and stuck in our living death; sin and death would forever rule over us. God does not want this for us and never did. We chose, and still choose, the path of sin and destruction. God created a better way—the way of life through the cross of Christ.

But for God it was not enough to simply have us witness his love through the cross. He understood that we must truly experience its power in order to be released from the hold that sin has over us. And so He created a way for that to happen—our baptism.

Jesus had no need for baptism: unlike us, He never sinned. Jesus' entire life was about seeking the will of the Father and accomplishing that will in all that He did. Jesus lived his human life to the fullest. We must realize that sin is not simply a rejection of God's will, but also a rejection of our very nature. Each time we choose to act in a way contrary to the will of God, we reject what it means to be truly human. We reject our very dignity. We need help to overcome the desires that lead us away from God and down the path of destruction. We need help to be able to live life to the fullest as Christ did. And that is why Christ was baptized.

As Jesus entered the Jordan, He created for us the path of salvation. His entrance into the Jordan was akin to God's parting of the Red Sea. As God led the people of Israel from the land of slavery and, in time, to the Promised Land, so Christ's baptism releases us from bondage and creates a path to our promised land—Heaven.

Christ's entrance into the waters of the Jordan makes holy forever the waters of baptism. In a sense it makes the waters of baptism, the Jordan River. When we are baptized we enter with Christ into the waters of the Jordan, and through his power we are made whole once again. But how does this happen? The very word baptism tells us. The word baptism comes from the Greek and means immersion. As we enter into the waters of the Jordan with Christ, we become immersed into the very life of Christ. As Paul tells us, "Or are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life." (Rom 6:3-4)

Christ's death and resurrection become the very way we are called to live our lives in Him. Our life becomes grounded in baptism, which means we are called to die to ourselves in order to rise to new life in Christ. It is the constant struggle of picking up our cross daily in order to follow Christ.

Baptism preceded Christ's entrance into his public ministry of proclaiming the kingdom of God. And our baptism is what gives us the grace necessary to make Christ's ministry our own. What we celebrate today is as much about us as it is about Christ. We celebrate what it means to be a true Christian—one who is dedicated to seeking the will of God in all things. And we rejoice that in and through our baptism we are forever united to Christ in and through his baptism, death and resurrection. As we bring to an end our celebration of the birth of Christ, we do so by celebrating our own rebirth through our union with Christ in the waters of baptism. We celebrate our entrance into the hope of eternal life found in and through the life and ministry, death, resurrection and ascension of Christ, which is our own through the waters of the Jordan that we entered with Christ.

Growing up, my favorite episodes of Looney Tunes were always the ones that started with Bugs Bunny complaining about how he should have taken a left turn at Albuquerque. While this was mostly because as a child I thought Albuquerque was a funny word, there were other redeeming qualities to the episodes as well, such as Bugs pretending to be a matador, comedic arguments with Daffy Duck, or Bugs outsmarting Elmer Fudd. However, as I've grown older, I've come to appreciate these episodes for a new reason—just how relatable they are.

Now, I know what you're thinking: what is relatable about Looney Tunes? Trust me, I'm well aware that most New Englanders have never been to Albuquerque, New Mexico, and I would hope that none of us have gotten into an argument with a duck lately. However, we have all taken wrong turns before, and we have all found ourselves in comical situations as a result. I'm not just talking about wrong turns when driving or walking somewhere. I'm also talking about wrong turns we have made in our lives: the mistakes or bad decisions that led us in the wrong direction. In response to these wrong turns, we can try to be like Bugs Bunny if we want. We can stubbornly push through the situation that we find ourselves in, wasting our time in frustration as others find amusement in our struggles. Or, we can choose to do what Bugs never does—turn around. Bugs knows exactly where he made the wrong turn, so why not go back to take the right turn at Albuquerque.

As Christians, we can recognize this turning around as the message preached by John the Baptist and Jesus. The repentance they preached was one that involved turning one's whole life around. While we may find Bugs' struggles amusing, God does not find our struggles amusing. He doesn't want us to keep stubbornly pushing forward on the wrong path we've chosen. More than anything else, He wants us to acknowledge our mistake, then turn around. He wants us to take the better path, the path that we inherently know is the right one. If Bugs Bunny can identify—while tunneling underground—where he took a wrong turn, we can do the same in our own lives. So, embrace the life of repentance that God offers us. Stop pushing forward down the path of misery and frustration. Let go of the heavy burden of stubbornness and accept the light burden of God instead (Matthew 11:28-30).

Why was Christ Baptized?

- Does not Scripture say to not delay and be baptized to wash away our sins? (Acts 22:16)
- If our Lord Jesus Christ was similar to us in every way but without sin (Hebrews 4:15), why was He baptized?

We can rightly argue that He does not need to be washed by the waters of baptism for there is nothing unclean about Him.

My dear brothers and sisters, our Lord Jesus Christ was baptized not because of His uncleanliness but because of the world's uncleanliness. He was not baptized because of His sins but because of our sins that He bore on His body. He was not baptized because He was following a law but because He was showing us The Law.

At His baptism, although He was clean and without sin, He cleansed the waters of sin. His human flesh that knew not sin, touched the waters to be used by us who knew not His sanctifying grace. Hence, He purified the waters to be used for baptism, making them clean once and for all. He made water not only the source of temporal life for all living creatures but, after being cleansed from the death of sin, He made them also the source of birth into eternal life.

He so loved us that He became like sin (2 Corinthians 5:21). He adopted all of humanity's sinful nature, to raise it to the level of Divinity. Hence, at His baptism, all of humanity's sinful nature was washed away from the Devil's grasp for all those who believe in Him.

Finally, He was not just performing a rite or following a law but He was showing us The Law. A good leader and a good shepherd leads by example. Since He commanded us to be baptized, He too submitted Himself to the same law. At baptism, we unite our humanity to Christ's and hence He raises it to the level of Divinity, making us capable of receiving sanctifying grace. We are allowed to be like Christ through grace.

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
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Gary L. Belt Jr., A Longtime Resident of Chelmsford, MA
