



Fellow St Stephen Parishioners:

We hear how, from the Gospels, an especially bright star leads the Magi or Three Kings or Wisemen to Bethlehem. These "Magi" were not of the Jewish Faith. They were astrologers who found their motivation and meaning in searching the stars and heavens.

And in seeing that one, singular, holy star and following it, they were led to Jesus himself.

In our day and age, after Jesus's message has made its way over the past two-thousand years to all the ends of the earth, we need to pause and step back to realize the importance of the Magi being led to Jesus.

The religious leaders of Jesus' day — the Scribes and Pharisees — believed themselves to be chosen people, to whom the Messiah would come.

But here we have some of the Scribes and Pharisees missing the birth of Jesus and subsequently aligning themselves against Jesus during his adult ministry.

Jesus is for everyone! All it takes is to be open to the reality that something very special had happened, did happen, is happening and will happen.

Because of the openness of the Magi — as opposed to the close-mindedness of some of the Scribes and Pharisees — it was these Magi who were led to witness the newborn baby Jesus.

During this Christmas season — yes the Christmas season continues into early-to-mid January — let us be open to whenever and wherever Jesus might be present.

So many people come up to me and express their concern at seeing what they see in the news, at the elements of polarization and division within parts of our nation.

Please know that, in Jesus' time, his known world was even more divided than ours. But he came as a healer a unifier, preaching a message of loving one another.

Today, some two-thousand years later, Jesus is still our Savior, our unifier. In his birth, he brought the Magi, non-Jewish travelers from the East, to the holy city of Bethlehem, to give them an opportunity to worship him. In his adulthood, Jesus united Jew and Gentile.

As we begin a New Year, let us be fully open to what Jesus can accomplish in our world, if we all are a bit kinder, a bit more gentle, a bit more patient with others, and better listeners—all summed up in Jesus' message of: love one another.

He is the Prince of Peace. He can bring about peace and unity. But he does not want to force it upon us. He wants us to cooperate in bringing it about, by loving one another.

As did many children of my age back in the 1960's, I had an aquarium in my bedroom.

Although I really did care for the fish, I was stuck by how they did not show the same affection toward me.

Every time I approached the fish tank and my shadow loomed over the water, the fish darted about and dove for cover into the nearest shell.

Looking back on it, to my fish I was too big for them to comprehend!. My actions were too incomprehensible! They could not understand that it was for their own good that I approached the tank and at times had to stick my hand down into their water.

That was back then, when I was a little boy.

Now as an adult and a priest, I see something of what we experience when we come face to face with God's omnipotence. God in all of his glory and power is too big for us to comprehend. His actions can at times be incompressible as well

So some two thousand years ago, God chose to become one of us so that we could better understand him. He was born as the baby Jesus and grew up into the adult Jesus. This enables us to better understand God and his love for us.

Obviously, when I was a little boy, it was not possible for me to become a little fish and swim around in a fish tank so that the other fish could understand that I cared for them.

But some two thousand years ago, it was possible for the infinitely powerful God to become one of us, as a helpless little Baby, completely dependent on his parents. And so he did. And this was done so that we could better understand God's love for us.





Spiritual direction is a space and place to unpack and notice, through conversations with a prayerful companion, personal encounters with the Jesus for whom each and every one of us matters. The very act of holy listening and sharing that occurs within spiritual direction sessions is an experience of Jesus meeting us and entering our life in the world, where we are, as we are.

People meet with a spiritual director for many reasons. Perhaps they want to grow in their relationship with God and are seeking guidance as to how to start their prayer lives or how to take their prayer lives deeper. Or maybe they are trying to discern an invitation from God to minister in some way. Or maybe they are in the middle of having to make a major life decision or transition. Perhaps they are experiencing some crisis of faith. No matter what draws someone to seek spiritual direction, the conversations between prayerful companions always lead back to the One who draws a person to seek spiritual companionship in the first place—the Living Spirit of God.

If you desire to "find God in all things", Deacon Don Ross is available to be a prayerful companion on your journey to the fullness of life in Christ. 
