

Time Flies!

Fellow St Stephen Parishioners:

Over the past short two-week period since Christmas Day, we watched Jesus go from a newborn babe on Christmas Day to a thirty-year-old adult being baptized today.

Before we leave behind a consideration of the Baby Jesus, as we progress over the next three years of Jesus' life, toward his Passion, Death and Resurrection, which we celebrate in mid-April, let us consider our Holy Father's words about the baby Jesus.

Not too many days ago, Pope Francis shared with us how the celebration of Christmas serves as a reminder that God did not reveal his greatness in a grand spectacle, but rather in the "littleness" of a poor, vulnerable child born in a stable in Bethlehem.

Harsh words, yes. But also a reminder that Jesus can be found anywhere and everywhere, even among the poor and vulnerable.

As he shared these words, our Holy Father held a figurine of the baby Jesus. "Let us be amazed by this wonderful truth," the Pope shared, "how the one who embraces the universe needed to be held in his mother's arms. The one who created the sun needed to be warmed in swaddling clothes. Tenderness incarnate needed to be coddled. Infinite love had a tiny heart that did beat softly."

At the conclusion of these words, several children in the audience made their way to the figurine of baby Jesus, placing white flowers around the figurine as it was laid in a manger.

Pope Francis concluded his message with the words of how an angel's announcement of Christ's birth to shepherds was a sign for them to look for "a child, a baby lying in the dire poverty of a manger."

Harsh words, yes. But also a reminder that Jesus can be found everywhere and anywhere, even in the harsh poverty of being born in a manger.

Let us be open to finding Jesus everywhere, even in the harshest of places and conditions.

Asking the Whats beyond the Whys

At the end of Fr Henry's article in our bulletin of a couple weeks ago, "We Ask Why", Father Henry reflected on Jesus' words "blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed". He said "Perhaps implied in Jesus' words is this: Blessed are those who *believe* in the midst of the 'why's."

I would like to take Fr Henry's article to the next level, with the follow thoughts.

What about the "what's." What do I do when my why's are greeted only with deafening silence? What do I do when, like those dejected disciples on the Emmaus Road out of Jerusalem on that first Easter, I utter what have to be the three saddest words in the English language: "I had hoped." All of us at one time or another have uttered these three words. Every one of us has asked the question "What do I do now?" That belief Father Henry mentions is the beginning of answering the question "what now?"

I reflect on the experience of the two Disciples in the Emmaus account of the Gospel of St Luke. After Jesus' Death and Before they recognized him in the Resurrection, these two disciples seemed so lost.

What do we do when we are searching, as were those same Disciples of two-thousand years ago. Yes, what do I do? Do I continue on to Emmaus, which literally means "nowhere"...or....in meeting in the Eucharist each and every day and week the very same Christ who died and rose 2000 years ago, do I run back to the Jerusalems of today proclaiming "I have seen...I have met...the Lord!

Asking "what" gets us beyond our "whys." Truly, we may never answer our why's, yet ask why we must; but if we walk closely with the One who after three days in a tomb transformed the universe in answer to the "what do we do now" questions of all times, we too can become the Mary's, the St. Josephs, the St. Peters, the St. Pauls, the St. Stephens of our own time, somehow, some way entering the sufferings which surround us rather than continuing to fruitlessly question them without answers.

The mid 20th century French poet Paul Claudel once said "Jesus did not come to explain away suffering or remove it. He came to fill it with His presence." Put another way, we might say "Jesus did not come to answer our whys....but he has come to help answer our whats, and fill them with His presence."

So, our every day challenge is this: How and when can I move beyond my whys so I can begin to fruitfully answer some what's? Thoughts and words to ponder.



Reflecting Back On Christmas Day

Our daughter recently married. During family gatherings before and after the wedding, bride and groom baby stories brought tears of laughter and just plain tears. A wise person once said to me that one of parenting's greatest challenges is learning to gracefully let our children go. When they're young, we sometimes wonder when they'll ever leave our arms to explore the world. But as they grow older and leave home, we sometimes yearn for those times we held them in our arms. Full arms sometimes create a yearning for empty ones. Sometimes, empty arms yearn to be full.

Having recently experienced one of life's "letting goes", and on letting go of Christmas 2021/2022, I noticed a detail in the Christmas story that never before caught my attention. We don't know if anyone ever asked Mary or Joseph if they could hold their newborn baby. We don't know if the shepherds simply looked at the baby or ever held him. We don't know whether the Magi ever cradled the baby in their arms after presenting their gifts. There are no accounts of grandparents waiting anxiously in Nazareth for an opportunity to hold the newborn child. We are told that besides Mary and Joseph, Simeon was the only one who held the infant Jesus, but held him not in Bethlehem, but in Jerusalem awhile after the baby's birth. Is it possible that Simeon ached to hold a child after once having to let one go? We really don't know. But perhaps the omission of any mention of Christ being held by anyone besides his parents in Bethlehem and Simeon in Jerusalem is an invitation for us to reach out to hold him, to fill our empty arms and empty hearts.

Babies yearn to be held, and in each one of us there's a yearning to hold one. Perhaps God became one of us as a baby because God knows that only an infant has the ability to crawl in through even the slightest of cracks in the most hardened of hearts, and soften them. Perhaps God became one of us as a baby to teach us that a baby is God's promise that the world will go on. Perhaps God became one of us as a baby so we might realize power we never knew we had to love and nurture the most helpless.

We can go on and on speculating about why God chose to become one of us as God did, but there are some certainties. God did, in fact, become one of us...and the Gospels speak of no one other than Mary, Joseph, and Simeon who cradled God as a babe in their arms. Christmas is a moment to fill a gap in Gospel stories...and in your heart...it's a moment to hide from restless thoughts and everyday worries, enter your inner room, and ask Mary and Joseph if you may hold their baby. Then, as you gaze on the child in your arms, remember the songwriter Mark Lowry's words to Mary, and to all of us, that the child she delivered has delivered her and delivered you. Remember that the tiny eyes you gaze into have looked upon angels where they trod, and remember as you kiss the child Jesus'-or any child's face—you kiss the face of God.

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
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
