



Think Small

About sixty years ago, an ad campaign for the VW Beetle read simply: Think Small. About a hundred years before that, Robert Browning penned the phrase "less is more" in a poem, and the phrase has since been quoted numerous times up until today.

Think Small. Less Is More. I find that these phrases can offer great guidance in our lives, both with our New Year's Resolutions in general, as well as with our prayer life specifically.

In late December, some of you came to me individually, to share your desire to add more private prayer to your life, as your New Year's resolution. Since others may have considered the same New Year's resolution, what follows is my advice.

I have spent decades in spiritual direction myself. I have led others over the past decades in their own private spiritual direction. One thing that seems to be consistent is that we tend to set our goals for private prayer unrealistically high. And when we cannot attain these goals, rather than reducing our goals, we abandon them altogether.

So I have come up with the following solution that gives us a far better chance of sticking to our prayer goal throughout the coming year, rather than abandoning it within a week or two.

Think small! Less is more! Consider your busiest day of the year and estimate how much time you could spend in prayer during that day. Five minutes, ten minutes. And let that be your goal. Consider your busiest week of the year and estimate how many days of the week you could add some prayer time. Only on Saturday. Or Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Think small! Less is more! Consider your busiest day of the year. Consider your busiest week of the year. And let that dictate what you decide for your New Year's Resolution.

It would be wonderful to commit to saying ten Hail Mary's three days a week and doing so for the rest of the year. It would foolish to commit to saying every day all twenty mysteries of the Rosary and two hundred Hail Mary's every day and abandoning your New Year's Resolution shortly after your began.

It is far better to choose a small New Year's Resolution and carry it out throughout the entire year, than to choose an unrealistically high goal and fail and abandon it altogether shortly after you began.

Five minutes of spiritual reading. Ten Hail Mary's. Two minutes of closed-eye mindfulness silent prayer. That is sustainable! That you can continue throughout the year.

Think small! Less is more!

Fellow St Stephen Parishioners:

Anton Chekhov wrote a very short, emotional masterpiece of Russian fiction entitled "Misery," in which a man cannot find anyone who will listen to what he desperately wishes to share. The story ends with the man resorting to sharing what is on his mind and in his heart, with his horse.

Hopefully, we do have one or more special people in our lives with whom we can share. But let us not forget to also take our deepest feelings and share them with God, in prayer.

Yet, easier said than done. I have found that so many of us are reluctant to take our deepest feelings and share them with God, especially if they are ones of sadness or grief. Either we want to only share the good in our lives with an eternal God who is pure Spirit. Or we fear that God might not listen to our woes because he is busy listening to people who have greater woes.

Let us not forget that Jesus was no stranger to woes himself. Biblical trivia: what is the shortest verse of the Bible? John 11:35: "Jesus wept." Jesus himself was saddened to the point of weeping, at the death of his friend Lazarus. So, although God is, yes, eternal and pure Spirit, Jesus as God did weep at the death of a friend, as well as die himself. So Jesus knows!

Furthermore, as omnipotent, God is not limited. We are limited, but God is not limited. We can only listen to so many people at a time, and over time we hit overload and cannot listen to anymore. God has no such limits. God can listen to all of us simultaneously and hear all of us.

With that in mind, let us hear our Holy Father's recent words.

Pope Francis recently pointed out in response to how we sometimes keep our distance from God. "But God wishes to be incarnate," he said, urging us to overcome our fears by drawing near to Jesus. Recalling the Christmas message of last month, the Holy Father calls us to "think of the stable in Bethlehem. Jesus was born there, in that poverty, to tell us that He is certainly not afraid of visiting your heart, of dwelling in a shabby life."

Pope Francis went on to call on all Christians to make space for Jesus in our hearts. God is there in the midst of all the situations of our daily lives, waiting for us to speak with Him about them. Therefore, "let us invite Him officially into our lives, especially in the dark areas... into our 'inner stables'. And let us also tell Him, without fear, about the problems of our time, even our personal, difficult problems: God loves to dwell among us."



Spiritual Direction Available

Spiritual direction is a space and place to unpack and notice, through conversations with a prayerful companion, personal encounters with the Jesus for whom each and every one of us matters. The very act of holy listening and sharing that occurs within spiritual direction sessions is an experience of Jesus meeting us and entering our life in the world, where we are, as we are.

People meet with a spiritual director for many reasons. Perhaps they want to grow in their relationship with God and are seeking guidance as to how to start their prayer lives or how to take their prayer lives deeper. Or maybe they are trying to discern an invitation from God to minister in some way. Or maybe they are in the middle of having to make a major life decision or transition. Perhaps they are experiencing some crisis of faith. No matter what draws someone to seek spiritual direction, the conversations between prayerful companions always lead back to the One who draws a person to seek spiritual companionship in the first place—the Living Spirit of God.

If you desire to "find God in all things", Deacon Don Ross is available to be a prayerful companion on your journey to the fullness of life in Christ. 

Since then, more than \$170 million has been generated for local charities across the country through Souper Bowl of Caring by youth. It has become a powerful movement that transforms the time around the Big Game into the nation's largest celebration of giving and caring for those in need.

Through this mission, people learn they can make a positive difference in the world as they collect food, raise money, and serve at hunger-relief charities and show caring and compassion in local communities across the country.

Share in God's love for our neighbors in need and give generously to the Souper Bowl of Caring Collection sponsored by St. Stephen Youth Ministry. Monies collected will be used to purchase turkey, cheese, bread and supplies for the monthly sandwich making prepared by the youth of St. Stephen.

THE THOMAS MERTON CENTER was founded in 1974 by a group of concerned individuals who saw a need for services to the economically disadvantaged people in the city of Bridgeport. As the times have changed and the needs of the people served have changed, Merton House has developed programs to address issues such as housing, nutritional needs, healthcare needs, parenting issues and youth at risk. The Thomas Merton House of Hospitality provides breakfast, lunch, and day shelter to approximately 210 people each day Monday through Saturday and serves about 85,000 meals a year.

The youth of St. Stephen are planning to provide 2,400 sand-wiches over the next 12 months to the Merton House Soup Kitchen. It's only with the generosity of the people of St. Stephen that this can be accomplished! Thank you in advance for supporting this important ministry of the youth of St. Stephen Parish.







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
