

St. Andre Bessette, C.S.C. 06 January



Brother André, a lay brother of the Congregation of Holy Cross, was born Alfred Bessette on 09 August 1845 in Mont-Saint-Grégoire, Canada. His father, Isaac, was a carpenter and lumberman, while his mother, Clothilde was a stay-at-home mother who cared for and educated her children.

Br. André was the eighth of 12 children, with four of his siblings dying in infancy. A frail child himself Br. André was baptized just after birth for fear that he wasn't going to survive.

The Bessette family lived in poverty due to a lack of jobs in Canada during the mid-1800's. Br. André's father finally found employment as a lumberman but was tragically killed by a falling tree. His mother succumbed to tuberculosis when Br. André was twelve years of age.

As a young man Br. André moved to Moosup, CT to live with relatives. He worked in textile mills in Connecticut and Rhode Island before returning in 1867 to Canada. It was there that he joined the Congregation of Holy Cross and on 02 February 1875 professed his final vows.

Br. André spent his ministerial life as a porter at the Collége Notre Dame in Quebec. He had great devotion to St. Joseph and when caring for the sick would recommend them in prayer to the foster father of Jesus.

In 1924 the construction of the Oratory of St. Joseph in Montreal began 20 years after St. André began a campaign for a chapel to be built honoring St. Joseph. In 1937 Br. André died and a million people paid him respect before he was buried in a tomb below the main chapel of the Oratory.

Br. André was beatified on 23 May 1982 by Pope John Paul II and canonized on 19 December 2009 by Pope Benedict XVI.

Reflection Question: St. André said: "People worry over nothing. When they need it, help will come at the right time from the good Lord." What does trust in the will of God mean to you as a person of faith?

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory. Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance. Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather and come to you: your sons come from afar, and your daughters in the arms of their nurses. Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow, for the riches of the sea shall be emptied out before you, the wealth of nations shall be brought to you. Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the LORD.

READING II Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6

Brothers and sisters:

You have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for your benefit, namely, that the mystery was made known to me by revelation. It was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

GOSPEL Lk 3:10-18

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born.

They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: *And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel.*"

Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage."

After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

THE NICENE CREED

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.



And, when darkness, boredom, and gloom seem to be the order of the day, a bright new light now shines pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St.
Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 –
January 4, 1821) was born in New York City
to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith.
When she turned 19, she married a wealthy
businessman with whom she had five children.
He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving
her a young widow. After discovering the
Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had
died, she returned to New York and converted
to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."





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
