SAINT OF THE DAY

SAINT STEPHEN

"As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Greek-speaking Christians complained against the Hebrew-speaking Christians, saying that their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution. So the Twelve called together the community of the disciples and said, 'It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Brothers, select from among you seven reputable men, filled

with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to this task, whereas we shall devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word.' The proposal was acceptable to the whole community, so they chose Stephen, a man filled with faith and the Holy Spirit...' (Acts 6:1-5).

Acts of the Apostles says that Stephen was a man filled with grace and power, who worked great wonders among the people. Certain Jews, members of the Synagogue of Roman Freedmen, debated with Stephen, but proved no match for the wisdom and spirit with which he spoke. They persuaded others to make the charge of blasphemy against him. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

In his speech, Stephen recalled God's guidance through Israel's history, as well as Israel's idolatry and disobedience. He then claimed that his persecutors were showing this same spirit. "...you always oppose the holy Spirit; you are just like your ancestors" (Acts 7:51b).

Stephen's speech brought anger from the crowd. "But he, filled with the holy Spirit, looked up intently to heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, 'Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.' ... They threw him out of the city, and began to stone him. ... As they were stoning Stephen, he called out, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' ... 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them'" (Acts 7:55-56, 58a, 59, 60b)."

INTO THE WILD

"On the day Charles Seghers was born– December 26, 1839– no Catholic priest had yet set foot in Alaska. But by the time of Seghers' death, in November 1886, Catholic missions dotted America's northernmost territory.

In the intervening 46 years, Seghers entered seminary" (at the American College of Louvain), "left his native Belgium" after being ordained a priest in 1863 in the Diocese of Mechelen-Brussels "to serve as a missionary in Canada, and, at just 33 years old, became Bishop of Vancouver Island (in present day British Columbia).

As bishop, Seghers committed himself to personally proclaiming the Gospel in the most remote parts of his diocese. In temperatures that routinely plunged to 40 degrees below zero, he traveled across western Canada and Alaska by schooner, canoe, dogsled, and foot. A master linguist, Seghers always preached to the people in their native dialects, not trusting translators to get the theology right.

In 1879, Seghers reluctantly left Vancouver Island to become the co-adjutor bishop (and in 1880, archbishop) of the Archdiocese of Oregon City (now Portland). Of his work in his new see, which consisted of present-day Oregon, Montana, and Idaho, Seghers wrote. "When I am preaching, I rest from riding. When I am riding, I rest from preaching."

He didn't ride for long. In late 1883, Seghers learned Vancouver Island needed a bishop and asked Pope Leo XIII's permission to return. Leo agreed, and by 1885, Seghers was riding dogsleds through the wilderness once more. During his first year back, he visited all existing missions and established two new ones. He also began building a new pro-cathedral and a bishop's residence in Victoria. In July 1886, with those projects underway, Seghers set sail for Alaska yet again. It would be his final trip.

As his party traveled through Alaska's interior, one of Seghers' companions—a laymen named Francis fuller—began showing signs of mental illness. One morning in late November, Seghers awoke to find Fuller standing over him with a shotgun. Seconds later, the archbishop was dead.

Seghers' murder shocked the country, but as news of his work spread, young priests flocked to Alaska's missions. Today, Seghers is considered the "Father of Catholicism" in Alaska."
