




VISITING MISSIONARY NEXT WEEKEND (July 23 and 24)

SLEEP BETTER TONIGHT

A good night's sleep sets you up for better energy the next day—and healthier years to come. That's because sleeping well helps lower the change of heart disease, obesity, type 2 diabetes and stroke, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Have trouble sleeping? These tips can help.

Stick to sleep schedule.

Try to go to bed and wake up at the same time every day. It will help regulate your body's internal clock, which can help you fall and stay asleep.

Make your bedroom restful and quiet.

Keep the temperature comfortable and cool. Make sure the room is dark at night. Is your neighborhood loud? Listen to relaxing music or turn on a fan to drown out the noise.

Talk to your doctor.

They can help figure out what's keeping you up. For example, some medications affect sleep. Or they might suggest and over-the-counter (OTC) sleep aid.

Enjoy a relaxing bedtime routine.

An hour before you want to go to sleep, do something to wind down. For example, read a book or take a warm bath. Also, turn off your devices. The bright light from digital screens wakes up your brain.

Don't eat too late.

Eating a big meal before bedtime may make it harder to fall asleep. If you're hungry close to bedtime, have a snack like a banana or glass of warm milk. Both can help improve sleep.

MASS ETIQUETTE

A Few Suggestions/ Reminders From the Parish Liturgy Committee

<u>Arrive on Time</u>: when invited to someone's home it's courteous to be punctual (unless there is an emergency), the same is true for Mass.

<u>When you're with other people on a special occa</u><u>sion:</u> it's important to participate, not check messages on your smart phone, or suggest you're not going to sing "Happy Birthday" when others are singing, because "I don't like to sing!"

If others around you are engaged in listening to someone, it's impolite to interrupt them by your distracting conversation with someone else. So it is similar when parishioners wish to pray before/ after Mass but are distracted by others talking around them. If there is a need to talk with someone the more appropriate place to do so would be in the vestibule of the church.

What is proper dress for a Wedding or Funeral?

Work places and golf courses have dress codes, so does the Vatican when you have an audience with the Pope. Should we be less attentive to decorum in what we wear when we come to the House of the Lord? Why/where do we genuflect when we enter a Catholic church? In every Catholic Church there is a Tabernacle where the body of the Risen Lord is reserved to be brought to the dying and sick. Church law requires a candle to be burning next to it, and we genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle in honor and respect of the real presence of the Lord Jesus among us. We do not genuflect to the altar or crucifix.

If someone were to read the Declaration of Independence, would we act as it was not meaningful to us? So it is with the proclamation of the Word of God in Scripture. God's Word demands our attention and silence. Babies and children are always welcome in church, but if they're having a "bad day" it's best to take a "time out" in the vestibule of the church where there are speakers and seats and doors to feel a part of Mass.

When you visit a friend or family's home do you sneak out before you can say good-bye? So it is at the conclusion of Mass, please allow the priest and other ministers the opportunity exit before you do.



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
