From Our Pastor's Desk

Dear Fellow Saints-in-the-Making,

Greetings in Christ our Lord!

Last week's Gospel on the Wedding Feast of Cana, where Jesus changes water into wine, may have given rise in your mind to the question several parishioners have recently asked me: "Why is water poured into only one chalice at Mass?"

To begin to answer that question requires the answer to an antecedent question: Why is water poured into the wine at Mass?

We must first and foremost remember that the sacred actions in the Sacred Liturgy, most particularly those at the Eucharist, have been given to us as a legacy by Jesus Christ Himself. It is Jesus Who takes the bread, blesses it, breaks it and gives it to His disciples saying, "Take this, all of you, and eat of it..." It is Jesus Who takes the cup filled with the fruit of the vine, blesses it, and gives it to His disciples saying, "Take this, all of you, and drink from it...". In performing the ritual actions of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Priest does what Jesus the Eternal Priest does at the Last Supper.

It may logically be concluded, then, that the addition of water to wine was also done by Jesus at the Last Supper. Though not specified in any of the Institution Narratives (that is, the Gospels of Saints Matthew, Mark, and Luke and St. Paul's First Epistle to the Corinthians explaining how Jesus institutes the Eucharist as a memorial of His Suffering-and Death), this logical conclusion has cultural precedence, as it was the custom in first century Palestine to water down wine both to weaken its inebriating effects and to make the wine last longer, as well as scriptural foundations, for example in Proverbs 9:5: "Come, eat of my bread, and drink of the wine I have mixed." (EWTN.com).

But as importantly, water is added to the wine at the Preparation of the Gifts, for as the Deacon or Priest preparing the chalice says silently, "By the mixture of this water and wine, may we come to share in the Divinity of Christ, Who humbled Himself to share in our humanity." The water represents our humanity, the wine His Divinity. We see before us, then, a visible symbol of the two natures of Jesus Christ. The water and wine do not have to be equal parts in the chalice to represent this. In fact, if there is more water than wine in the chalice, it becomes improper matter, which essentially means that it will not become the Blood of Christ. This is why only a drop or so of water is added to the wine in the chalice.

Since Jesus uses only one chalice at the Last Supper and, consequently, only pours water into one chalice, water is only poured into one chalice during Mass, namely the Principal (Presider's) Chalice.

January 23, 2022 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time



Human history reveals many periods where people lost a sense of God's transcendence. It may even be argued that human beings have been wandering and lost more than they have been at home and focused. Human nature being what it is, we struggle with who God really is — the God of our salvation history or the "gods" of human constructs. Relying on our own designs and pursuits, we forget that we really are meant to listen to One upon Whom the Spirit of the Lord rests, Jesus Christ, and not to ourselves. That same history that reveals our fickleness and infidelity also reveals God's constancy and faithfulness. God always finds us.

As people wander and fumble to find their way, God is there bringing them back to holiness and giving them the assurance of His presence. We have to allow God's Word, God's life, to touch us and change us. It can make us more flexible and attentive to the sacred in all facets of life so that every day is one that is holy. Every day is a time when fulfillment is possible for one's soul. Jesus stood before those gathered in the synagogue as the fulfillment of words of promise that were echoed long ago. God doesn't forget. He always comes for us.

Now it is time to remember to go to God. Sometimes our lives are so confused and tangled that it is difficult to see the Word and hand of God. But when we realize, deep within, the depth of friendship God offers to us it really has the power to turn sadness to joy. The promise is fulfilled. Going frequently to God's Word, allowing ourselves to be enriched and rejuvenated, and pondering the certainty of God's fidelity and promise permanently transforms us. We will be more aware of the sacred and the holy and less invested in things that pull us away.

In 1897, Therese Martin, a 24-year-old Carmelite cloistered nun in Lisieux, France, passed away from tuberculosis. Her doctrine of "the little way of trust and love" was explained in *The Story of a Soul*, and led to her being proclaimed in 1997 one of only four women Doctors of the Church.

FOUR SEASONS

I am not to sure that I like the idea of having four seasons. Whether you like to ski, hunt, fish, watch football or baseball's spring training will pretty much dictate which calendar season is your number one choice.

So I began to wonder, as the Christmas season comes to an end, and we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, do we have a favorite season on the Church calendar? Do we even know what seasons the Church celebrates or why? So perhaps we should take a brief look at them:

Advent is fairly easy to understand. It is the Season of preparation for the coming of a newborn King Who is Messiah and Savior. A time of penitential preparation (getting right with God) and joyful anticipation.

Next, we have the **Christmas Season.** We have the story of fulfillment of ancient prophecy regarding the birth of the Lord. The Angels sing. The Shepherds visit. The Wise Men adore. The earth rejoices. The celebrations and the Season come to an end with the observance of the Baptism of the Lord, which is the first Sunday in the next Season, Ordinary Time.

Ordinary Time is, I think, mislabeled. It is anything but ordinary, and I think it should be renamed Extraordinary. For it is during this Season that we learn about the mission and the message of the Lord. While the Season is broken into two different time frames, the first weeks lasting eight weeks, it is the story of Jesus' adult life, teachings and mission as our Savior. According to the <u>Order of Prayer in the Liturgy of the Hours and Celebration of the Eucharist 2022</u> (Ordo), "It is a yearly cycle of thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated but rather the mystery of Christ itself is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays."

Interrupting the Ordinary Season is the Season of Lent. This season of penitential observance directs our hearts to consider the cost the Lord is willing to pay for our redemption. The need for us to repent of our failings (aka sins) and seek forgiveness through the beautiful Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is a time to ponder our lives and determine if the direction is leading towards the Lord or not. If not, we need to consider the changes or "rerouting" necessary to get on track for the journey Home.

This **Lenten Season** is followed by one of the most solemn periods on the Church calendar, Holy Week beginning with Palm Sunday with Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem and ending Thursday before the celebration of the Last Supper with the Institution of two great Sacraments: the Eucharist and the Priesthood.

The next Season is the shortest in the Church calendar. It is called the **Triduum** remembering the Passion, Death and burial of the Lord. It runs from Holy Thursday until Easter Sunday when we rejoice at the Resurrection of the Lord, which begins the Easter Season.

The **Easter Season** runs until Pentecost Sunday some fifty days following Easter Sunday, during which we hear of Jesus' appearances to the Apostles and others, confirming His Resurrection, affirming His mission of salvation and commissioning the Apostles to, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit..." (Mt 28:19)

Then it is back to **Ordinary Time**, which continues until the First Sunday of Advent. The Gospel stories during this time highlight the life and times of the Lord, which include miracles, mercies and magnificent moral mandates.

Okay, so the weather doesn't change, the leaves don't fall and the grass does not grow with the Church Seasons, but the Lord hopes you will change, that you will not fall and that you will grow in faith, hope and love. Every Season in the Church calendar presents an opportunity to listen, learn and love. **Praise God!**
