



Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church



5 THINGS I LEARNED FROM MOE By Bishop William Byrne

My previous parish assignment was St. Peter's on Capitol Hill. In a city parish, one encounters many different types of people. From Members of Congress to the homeless, the Hill offers a powerful experience of the Body of Christ in all His diversity. I learned that a parishioner and friend, Maurice Hawkins, had died. Moe was 72 when he passed of a heart attack. Formerly homeless, through the work of amazing case workers and the love and support of parishioners from St. Peter's, Moe lived in city housing and had a rich life. Moe was developmentally different and one of the most remarkable men I have ever met.

I don't cry easily. However, when I learned of Moe's passing, some tears flowed. I know it sounds cliché, but Moe was the face of Christ. He was like an angel, albeit one dressed in two coats and two hats and carrying a walking stick on the hottest day of the year. The catch is that, unlike the times we may use such phrases to describe other people, in Moe they are actually all true. I remember him sitting in the church, praying his rosary, and imagining his prayers going straight up to Heaven (or Jesus, our Heavenly Father, the Blessed Mother, etc.). His simple faith made me a better man and priest. So, both in homage to this gentle man, and in gratitude for his blessing to all who were privileged to know him, I offer you five things I learned from Moe.

Blessings — Moe would come to the Saturday 5 pm Mass each week. After Mass, he would come to the sacristy and ask me to bless various items. Each week he would present some set of items he had collected: a bunch of clovers, a Barbie doll head, a jar, a stick, bark from the tree the parish had to cut down, a ring from a bubble gum machine. He saw them all as beautiful and wanted God's blessing for them. From Moe I learned to never take for granted the little and unexpected treasures of life.

Art - Among the consistent items to be blessed were photos of his latest art display. Moe would have arranged a table in his apartment with images that he had artistically enhanced. A typical display might include photos of Dr. Martin Luther King, a Greek goddess--usually Aphrodite-- an image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, a holy card of Mother Theresa, a crucifix, and plastic flowers in a vase. Moe would take pictures and then get them blown up at CVS. Then I would bless them and he would gift them to others. The photos were beautiful, quirky, and sweet all at once. But above all, they were art. Moe was an artist. From Moe I learned to seek the beauty in life: go to a museum, read a poem, draw a picture.

Realize Your Blessings - An artist seeks truth and beauty and gives it back to the world. Moe had a fascination with history and mythology. He often asked me to pray that he could read and write better. That request always broke my heart. To have the desire and the love of learning and sharing that love with others, only to meet a wall that was not climbable, seemed tragic in my limited estimation. From Moe I learned to remember the simplest blessings and use them for the good of others.

Joy of Helping - After Mass, Moe would go down to our parish hall and empty the trash, wipe down the toilets, and even scrub the stove. I never asked him, nor expected him to do this, but he would always help as his gift to his family at St. Peter's. He did it for Jesus. From Moe I learned to realize the most humble tasks are often the most powerful ways to serve the Lord.

Remember Eternity - Each time Moe would come for a visit, he would say "Don't say goodbye. Say see you later." After that he would instruct me to say "goodnight" to whatever dog I had at the time: Cleo, Maggie, Mary Cole or Roo. One night more than a year after Cleo had passed, Moe said, "Say Goodnight to Cleo." I reminded him that Cleo was gone now. He told me, "I know. She walks me home every night." I am sure she walked him home one final and wondrous time. From Moe I learned to remember that God created us for eternity.

The final "5 things" for Our Lady of Mercy -- saving the best for last. Congratulations Bishop Byrne!

Good news!


We will be having a Mass at Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Parish on **Sunday, January 3, 2021 @ 6:30pm**.

Choosing right vs. might

Thomas Becket found himself having to choose between an earthly king and Christ the King. The cleric Thomas befriended England's Henry II—leading Henry to appoint him chancellor. Later, when Henry spotted a chance to wield power over church affairs, he named his friend the archbishop of Canterbury. But Thomas would not go along with Henry's plans. Repercussions followed, and in 1170 Thomas was brutally murdered—in Canterbury Cathedral—by the king's men. Though perhaps with less dramatic outcomes, standing up for your convictions may cost you, too. Are you willing to pay the price?



As we await on the arrival of our new pastor, Fr. Bill Garrott, OP has graciously agreed to be in residence and help with the sacramental duties of Our Lady of Mercy parish. This is not Fr. Fr. Bill entered the Order of Preachers in 1988 and was ordained a priest in 1994. He has a masters degree in spiritual theology from the Angelicum in Rome. He has served as a parochial vicar, campus minister and director of vocations. Fr. Bill has preached in nearly 200 parishes throughout the United States and Canada using his musical abilities on piano and guitar. **Welcome Fr. Bill!**

Our New Pastor!



Archbishop Gregory has appointed Msgr. Charles Antonicelli to become the pastor of Our Lady of Mercy after a short seven months as pastor of St. Patrick in Washington, DC and Vice President for Mission for Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Washington. Ordained as a priest of the Archdiocese of Washington in 1993, Msgr. Antonicelli has served as Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia since 2018. In addition, he served as pastor of Annunciation Parish in Washington, St. Thomas Apostle Parish in Washington, and St. Joseph Parish on Capitol Hill. He also served briefly as an administrator of St. Patrick Parish in Rockville.

A native of Jersey City, he earned a political science degree at Boston College, and then relocated to Washington to earn a law degree at the Columbus School of Law at The Catholic University of America. After working as an assistant corporation counsel for Jersey City, and as an associate attorney at two law firms, he entered the seminary and studied at the PontificaOl North American College in Rome, where he earned a licentiate degree in moral theology at the Angelicum. He later earned a licentiate degree in canon law from Catholic University.

Shortly after his ordination, he served as a parochial vicar at the Shrine of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Washington and later at St. Andrew Apostle Parish in Silver Spring. In 1998, then-Cardinal James Hickey appointed him to serve as a Vice Chancellor, and he continued in that position until 2006. In 2006, Pope Benedict XVI named Father Antonicelli as a chaplain to His Holiness, with the title "monsignor."

Msgr. Antonicelli has served as a judge on the archdiocese's Metropolitan Tribunal, and as Episcopal Vicar for Canonical Services. He also taught at CUA's Columbus School of Law from 2002-04.

We will see Fr. Charles in January 2021. Happy New Year!


