Brit Ha-Adamah: A Covenant with the Earth

One of my favorite *midrashim** is a story in response to the biblical book Ecclesiastes:

When the Blessed Holy One created the first human, [God] took him and led him round all the trees of the Garden of Eden and said to him: "Look at My works, how beautiful and praiseworthy they are! And all that I have created, it was for you that I created it. Pay attention that you do not corrupt and destroy My world: if you corrupt it, there is no one to repair it after you." (Ecclesiastes Rabbah 7:13)

From this text we learn the importance of caring for the earth that has been an integral component of Jewish tradition for thousands of years. Yes, the Torah teaches in Genesis 2:15 that God entrusted all of Creation to human beings, but the midrash comes to tell us that this is a big responsibility. The earth is a treasure that requires loving care to ensure its health and wellbeing for future generations.

This lesson is reinforced by the next Jewish holiday of Tu BiSh'vat. The 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat is our people's Arbor Day. It was originally intended as the catch-all birthday of trees in the Land of Israel, but it has evolved into an annual reminder to keep connected to the earth and all that grows on this precious planet. We celebrate Tu BiSh'vat with special *sedarim*,** planting trees in Israel, and planting seeds at home. For example, it is a tradition in our Pre-School to sow parsley seeds on Tu BiSh'vat so that the herbs will be ready in time for Passover.

I am writing this article on the heels of the UN climate summit COP26. The Glasgow Climate Pact of 2021 sought to keep alive the Paris Agreement of 2015 by bringing together many nations across the globe to formulate an actionable plan to limit global warming and prevent an irreversible environmental crisis. Also we recently discussed "change makers" with our teens in religious school, and young Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg was one of the leaders we studied. Environment and climate change is one of the areas of focus for the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, our movement's main address for social justice. On the RAC's website, they explain why this is a priority for our community:

The Reform Movement is committed to protecting the environment and ensuring a just, healthy, and safe future for generations to come. The science is clear: global climate change and pollution threaten our planet and endanger our communities. We have a sacred responsibility to care for the Earth and its inhabitants by advocating for sustainable policies addressing climate change, promoting clean air and water, and protecting wildlife. In doing this work, we must also ensure environmental justice, protecting those who have been disproportionately impacted by climate change and advocating for a just transition away from fossil fuels. Through our environmental advocacy, we carry on a Jewish tradition of stewardship and partnership in the ongoing work of Creation dating back to Genesis.

Congregation Beth Chaim is striving to do our part in this important work. We have started a conversation about moving away from disposable dishes and utensils, especially in our Pre-School. Before Covid-19 hit, we were doing this well by putting out ceramic mugs for coffee and tea that could be washed and reused without creating more waste. And we are currently in negotiations to set up solar panels on the synagogue roof, which would benefit both us and our world in a myriad of ways.

Jewish tradition teaches that we have a sacred covenantal relationship with the Earth, a *brit ha-adamah*, that requires us to care for the world as much as it allows us to reap the fruits of this earth. I want to ensure that this planet will be alive and well for my great-great grandchildren and beyond. This Tu BiSh'vat, I invite you to join me in ways each of us can make a difference. Taking Care of Others is a Core Jewish Value

I am increasingly taken aback by how our world has become a judgmental and harsh place. Online and off, there are countless examples of people ranting, raving, judging, hurting and excluding others. For many, the need to be "right" outweighs any right for all to be heard; the loudest gets the attention – and the world is suffering.

The Jewish emphasis on community and caring for each other is inherent in our tradition – from Torah to Talmud, from Maimonides to more modern thinkers, much ink has been spilled on the merits of treating others with kindness.

Our Torah reminds us over and over again of the responsibility to "care for the widow, the orphan and the stranger." We are responsible for making sure that the needs of the most vulnerable in our community are met; when we have power over others, we have responsibility for them. We are also continuously reminded that we were often strangers in a foreign land; powerless and at the mercy of governments that were not always friendly. Each Passover we read, "my ancestors were wandering Arameans." We are descended not from gods and kinds, but from those too poor to own land. Rabbi Harold Kushner famously taught, "Jews don't pray for, Jews pray with." Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel famously joined hands with the Reverend Martin Luther King Jr. Marching together in Selma, Rabbi Kushner said, "Even without words, our march was worship. I felt my legs were praying."

Throughout our history, we have been strangers in a strange land - not once, not twice, but many times over throughout our history. We know what it is like to be seen as other; to be treated with cruelty. From this, we learn how to behave when we have the power – we are commanded not to be oppressors but to treat all with kindness, dignity and compassion.

We are reminded of this *mitzvah*, this obligation each time we kindle the Shabbat candles and bring the light of joy and freedom into our world. Shabbat is the time set aside to imagine what our world could – and should – be like. A day to acknowledge the many gifts we have to offer, to count our blessings, and to rest so that after extinguishing the *Havdalah* candle at the end of Shabbat, we are refreshed and renewed and ready to continue our sacred task of improving the world.

Treating others with kindness and compassion creates a sense of kinship and peace across humanity. We care for other people because we see them as part of our human community. More importantly, when we do an act of kindness, no matter how small, we induce a sense of kinship between the giver and the receiver and, by extension, all of humanity. In a world torn apart by divisiveness, creating unity is the way to bring us back together.

Being part of the community means being responsible for the whole community. Rabbi Elimelech of Lizensk taught: There are two kinds of "righteous" people: one who is truly righteous and one who just dresses like a righteous person in a fur coat. Each of them faces the winter in a different way. One will go out and collect wood for the fire; the other will wrap himself in his fur coat. The one who collects wood lights a fire and invites others to join him. He not only warms himself, but others as well. The one who makes himself cozy in his own heavy coat is secure, but those around him will freeze. The genuinely righteous person is the one who shares his warmth with others.

In the days and weeks to come, let us harness the power of our prophets and see the world not as it is but as it could be. Let us all use our gifts to make our world better, creating connections and building bridges so that all of humanity benefits from our talents.

The Meaning of Community

Another word for a synagogue is a kehillah kedoshah--a holy community. They say that Jews are People of the Covenant. It is a covenant with God, but also a covenant with each other. Doing Jewish is not a solitary practice. There really isn't the concept of a Jewish hermit. As much as many rituals are based in the home, so much of Jewish life needs to happen in community. Prayers are not complete, Torah can't be read, kaddish cannot be said to mourn a loved one. We learn together, celebrate together, and comfort each other.

And that is why Jews build synagogues. We build a home to hold our community when we come together. Unlike many churches and other houses of worship, the synagogue is a beit knesset--a gathering place, not a holy place. The holiness is in the coming together.

So, how do we define "membership" in a Jewish community? Do we define it as the act of participating in the central activities of the community? Or do we define it in the narrowest terms as those who support the building in which many of those activities take place? Perhaps this is a trick question, because both are important to a thriving community. Ideally, every member in the community is a measure of each, a provider of material support *and* a participant in the ritual and interpersonal responsibilities. But, and this is important, the structures themselves are meaningless without the people, the community, they serve.

What is a community, but a network of interwoven relationships between individuals? Those relationships may start and center around ritual events and life cycle needs, but they become the glue that binds a community together. Each time we celebrate or comfort or pray together, we are building the connections between us and strengthening the community as a whole. Certainly, there are small micro-communities that form, families with similarly aged children, people who need to say kaddish at the same time, those who care about the same social cause. A well formed community weaves those subgroups into a common fabric.

At the quintessential event at Sinai where we coalesced from a wandering tribe into a People, we entered into a relationship with each other that bound us together through text, ritual and meaning. And fifty years ago, another group of wandering Jewish families became Beth Chaim, walking together on their own Jewish journeys, bound together through shared history and hope for the future. As we begin a new secular year, one dedicated to the Jubilee Celebration of Congregation Beth Chaim, let us remember what binds us together. As we reflect on the past 50 years. Let us celebrate all that has come before and embrace all that lies ahead. Let us plan for the next 50 years by being intentional about all the ways that we weave together our community. Let us plan strategically in ways that reflect our values and manifest our vision. May we open wide our doors and welcome in those who seek to be a part of this sacred community. May we show appreciation and gratitude for all the ways that we each generously contribute our time, our talent and our resources to build this community together.

Become a Beth Chaim Leader

The nominating committee interviews interested candidates and then chooses the new slate of board members, under the leadership of our immediate past president.

So what skills are needed on our Board of Directors? In my view, board members must be problem solvers who are open to new ideas and cooperation with each other. Board members need to put the temple first and be committed to making Beth Chaim a better place. Everyone on our board comes to the table with a unique background, and that diversity helps us in our decision making. The responsibilities of a board member include voting on temple policies and having a fiduciary responsibility for the temple's financial well-being. Fortunately, our financial experts on the board are able to guide those board members with less expertise. The board meets monthly.

As our Nominating Committee will soon begin its work, I want to remind you that everyone in our community has something to contribute, and I know we have leaders who can step into new roles. I encourage you to join a committee and put your talents to work and consider applying for a board position once you have that volunteer experience under your belt. Our 50th anniversary year is a good reminder of how hard our current and past leaders have worked to get us to this point. It's time for the next generation of leaders to step up and take us into the next 50 years.

One final thought - I often hear from people that they are too busy. Yes, everyone is busy. Many of our volunteers work long hours and manage families and personal issues on top of that. But carving out just a little bit of time for a monthly meeting can also serve as a welcome break from those demands. And your contribution can lead to positive and lasting change at Congregation Beth Chaim. I invite you to come and make a difference.

Financial Update

Happy 2022! I wish you and your family an incredibly happy and healthy secular new year.

In this edition of our Beth Chaim Connection, I want to provide an update on our financial position, as we approach the half-way point of our fiscal year, including initiatives we have undertaken to manage our finances, both income and expenses, and where we can use your assistance.

Last spring, not knowing the immediate and longerterm implications of the pandemic, the board and the congregation approved a very realistic, yet conservative budget for our fiscal year, beginning July 1, 2021.

As always, the Board of Directors, Finance Committee and staff have been diligently working to maximize our revenue and control our expenses, without impacting services and programs for our congregational family and the community.

To begin, membership is up! We have over 500 member households. We have new families, primarily with schoolaged children. Several past members have re-joined. We have implemented our new congregational integrated membership portal, ShulCloud, which has been extremely helpful in facilitating membership renewals. Eventually, we will each be able to update our own information on-line: add family members, view transactions, update Yahrzeits and more. Thank you to our Executive Director, Mira, for leading this process. If you have any questions about ShulCloud, please call Mira at the Temple office.

Our youth programs are also doing well this year. Preschool, pre-school summer camp, and religious school have enjoyed increased enrollment from last year and are ahead of the current budget forecast. Huge kudos to our staff, Anne Berman-Waldorf, Robin Resnick, Darra Lipper and all our teachers.

Mira, in partnership with our rental sub-committee, has been proactive in increasing rental income from outside organizations. We are trying to maximize the use of our building when not typically used for membership activities. We have marketed our facility as a very viable option for community groups.

Speaking of facilities, since last summer, we have resurfaced part of the parking lot, which was long overdue, painted the sanctuary and social hall, and upgraded the security system with more enhancements on the way.

On the expense side, we have been holding the line where possible and developing long-range strategies to control costs as we continue to return to more in-person activities. The Board of Directors has recently approved the installation of solar panels on our roof. This is in keeping with our Jewish value of Bal Tashchit, our responsibility to protect the environment, and reduce our annual energy operating costs, without any capital costs. We are projected to save approximately 50% of our electric cost for the next 15 years. The installation should be completed this spring.

Our fundraising has been robust to date. Fundraising represents 15% of our annual budget. It is a critical element in balancing our budget. We have been very blessed to have caring, generous members who have responded to our fundraising appeals to date. Thank you.... but we are only a little over half-way to our goal.

Our 50th anniversary celebration fundraiser is planned for May 14, please mark your calendars and watch for more info. We will have a 50th anniversary tribute book, sponsorships, live auctions and great entertainment featuring award winning musical Mentalist, Sidney Friedman.

You have seen that we focused our Giving Tuesday campaign as a special capital project to replace and upgrade our outdoor children's playground. Our plans are to renovate and replace the over 20-year-old equipment with new, safety-compliant playsets that will benefit the physical, emotional, and social development of the children of the Beth Chaim community, including our pre-school and religious school children. Your contribution will help cover the cost of the new equipment and construction. All contributions appreciated! There are naming opportunities available. Please see the Temple website or call the office for more information. Thank you to Board member, Dana Boyle, for leading this important project.

As we look ahead, I want to highlight two efforts we are focusing on to keep our congregation fiscally strong for the long-term. First, please consider making a 3-year fundraising commitment which helps our finance committee do multi-year budget planning. Second, consider becoming a LIFE & LEGACY PROMISOR by including a promise to Beth Chaim in your estate planning.
