FROM THE

PASTOR'S DESK

Dear friends in Christ,

May the grace and peace of our Risen Lord be with you always! I

pray that you had a good week. Our diocese has been involved in the Missionary Co-operative Effort for years, and each parish throughout the diocese has participated in this effort by welcoming a missionary priest or religious sister or brother to the parish for his or her mission. This weekend our parish will be welcoming a Marist priest who will celebrate all masses and share with us some of his pastoral ministries in the work of missionary. I ask for your generous support to Father's missionary work in this week's second collection. Thank you very much!

As we approach the closing of the Easter season, John's gospel directs our focus to Jesus' farewell discourse. This weekend we have the opportunity to witness the beautiful and meaningful "high priestly prayer" of Jesus Christ for his disciples and also for all of us. Here is the good lesson on prayer that Jesus teaches us! In Jesus' high priestly prayer, we learn two things about the prayer. First, Jesus asks his Father in heaven that "they may be one just as we are one". He prays for unity among the disciples and (also for us). As humans, we are weak, and at times we are tempted to give in to the sin of pride, power, money, or lust. All of these sins cause division among us. This is why Jesus prays for unity among us. It is only God's grace, love, and mercy that unite us together. Jesus also asks his Father to "keep them from the evil one", meaning to protect the disciples and all of us from the snare of the evil. Second, Jesus asks his Father that "they may be consecrated in truth". The world that we live in has filled with many voices, and they all claim to be the truth. It is easy for us to fall into the trap if we do not carefully discern those voices. The only way we can recognize the truth is our dependence on God, for He says "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Through Jesus' prayer, we come to know God's care and unconditional love that he has for us. Like a parent, God loves each one of us. He cares for and protects us at each moment of our lives. Only prayer in God will we come to know the truth-that God loves us always! Have a great week!

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED

Question: My best friend is Lutheran and is a good Christian. I would like her to be

my child's sponsor, but I'm wondering, does she have to be a practicing Catholic?

Answer: The practice of two godparents for an infant's baptism goes back to the time when church law and civil law were one and the same in Europe. If anything did happen to the parents, the custody and well-being of the child became the responsibility of the godparents. Adult baptism required that one have a sponsor from the church who would act as a guide or mentor, in bringing the person to faith. Today, being a godparent has no legal implications. It is a spiritual matter. But at least one of the godparents must be a practicing Catholic. The other is called a Christian witness. This distinction recognizes the difference between faith and religion. A Christian can be a witness because of their relationship to God (faith), but the Catholic is a mentor in the practice of the religion.

In any event, it is vital that parents give serious consideration to the people they choose to be a child's godparents. That choice should be based on practice of faith, solid moral character, and ability to give good example. Too often the choice is left to whose turn it is in the family, or to friends that parents wish to honor or acknowledge in some way. Your choice of godparents is the first lesson of faith you teach your child. Make it count!

INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

When Jesus was physically with his disciples, he guarded and protected them. One of ISEN! his greatest desires was that they share his joy completely. God's love is the source of all things

and their sustenance. As we conduct the normal routines of our lives it is easy to get caught up in the immediacies of this world and lose focus. We become very self and worldly dependent, forgetting that God wishes to guard and protect us. The joy the resurrected Christ can offer cannot be found in this world. It takes a bit of faith to realize that God's will is a constant in our lives and that God desires only the sustenance and goodness of both our bodies and our souls. We need to trust in God's constant and rejuvenating love. This radical resurrection trust allows us to experience the joy of God's presence in all of the good and the bad, positive and negative, life building and life destructive events that we encounter. God remains where love remains.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

The Seventh Sunday of Easter

God remains where love remains. When a believer realizes without doubt that God is love, it is a powerful moment. Being able to place our resurrection trust in this fundamental truth allows us to experience God's presence in all of our experiences: the good and the bad, positive and negative, life enriching and destructive events we encounter. It is no wonder that St. Paul so accurately tells us that it is love that endures all things and lasts. How can God not endure or ever fade away? Because he is God, Jesus also guarded and protected his disciples as the endearing shepherd who always had their best interest at heart.

If we become too immersed in the world, we lose touch with these deeper realities. We can become so preoccupied with preserving what we have created or think that we need, forgetting that it is not building our city that really matters, but God's. Jesus clearly did not belong to the world and, by virtue of his resurrection, he tries to get us to understand that we do not either. The truth brings us to other worldly, more divine places and takes our eyes off of the concerns that often captivate our fears and storm our senses.

Life can easily erode our faith. Think of your life over the last couple of weeks. What challenged your faith and distracted your divine glance? Even being overly stimulated with technology and social media can erode our sense of confidence and cause us to forget who we really are. We need to distance ourselves from the world in order to experience the joy that Christ offers. The world will never like the word of God. It is too challenging and too perplexing. The world mistakenly believes that it can survive on its own. It is a mistaken judgment that may cost people a lot in the end. It is all so very simple: God remains when we love one another. If in all the business of our lives and all that each day brings, the good and the bad, we follow the call and path of love, we will walk with God. There is nothing to fear and anxiety finds no home.

Sacraments of Initiation

Baptism—is available at any age. Please contact the parish office.

Eucharist—Student candidates must be at least age 7 by December 1st and be participating in ongoing Seasons of Faith Gatherings for at least one year prior.

Confirmation—Student candidates must be participating in Seasons of Faith for at least one year prior to beginning formation for Confirmation in the spring.
