May the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you always! I hope that your week goes well. One of the great things about God is that he gives us freedom to make our choices or decisions. Making a decision or choice is part of daily living. We make choices every day. For example, as the sun is rising, we make a choice whether or not we want to get up and go to work. We make a choice of what kind of food we need to eat or even the clothes that we want wear for the day. These are the things in life that we face each day, and when it comes to making choices, we love to have choices between two "good choices."

This weekend we hear the rest of the debate between Jesus and the crowd on the "Discourse of the Bread of Life." Today, Jesus' disciples and the crowd are facing a choice. This is a difficult choice they have to make; it is a choice between life and death. Jesus says to the crowd in order to have eternal life, they have to believe in the One whom God the Father sent—Jesus. In the beginning of John's gospel, we learn that the Word of God became flesh and dwelled among us. Jesus is the Word of God, and the Word is proclaimed through Jesus. The words that Jesus speaks are spirit and life. The question is "do you believe in the words that Jesus speaks and his teaching?" This is a choice that the disciples, and all of us, have to make. If we choose to follow and believe in Jesus, then we must reject what is contrary to his words and teachings. We must allow Jesus and the Holy Spirit to work within us and transform our way of living. When Jesus asks the disciples "Do you also want to leave?", Peter makes the great choice by saying, "Master, to whom should we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God." (John 6:68-69). Peter and his friends make the best choice—to stay with Jesus. Jesus asks you today, "Do you also want to leave?" What would be your answer? Have a blessed week! — Fr. Quigley

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?
CATHOLIC TRADITIONS EXPLAINED**

Question: : We live in a country that upholds the separation of Church and state.

What is the role of Catholics in society?

Answer: The role of the Church in the world has taken different forms over time, but the theme is the same. Be disciples in it! As the lay faithful — that is, not vowed priest or religious — we are called to live and love in the circumstances of our daily lives. St. John Paul II wrote a document about the laity. In it he wrote, “In their situation in the world, God manifests His plan and communicates to them their particular vocation of seeking the Kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God” (On the Lay Members of Christ’s Faithful, 15).

God wants us in the hospitals, the board rooms, the law offices, the food pantries, and the little league games! We are to engage in the affairs of the world. But when we’re there, we should live the plan of God. We need to respect those around us, engage in just business and legal practices, and love our children. We should care for the earth, use our money wisely, and get to know our neighbors. We must advocate for social policies that respect human dignity and human freedom. No matter our state in life, we are invited to build the kingdom of God!

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

Many people give their allegiance to something until they are asked to do something challenging or radical. Then, they find themselves rethinking whether they want to be associated with it. The same holds for God. Either we serve God, or we don’t. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God’s kingdom, love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, and trust that the Eucharist is in fact Jesus’ very Body and Blood. For some, buying into these things may prove too difficult and a return to a life without them is preferred. But truth is truth and it can only be found in God. If we find it hard to accept it from the mouth of Christ, where else can we go to find it? The task before us is to commit to the truth even when it may be easier to pursue something else. Truth is always worth obtaining even when it is difficult. Jesus offers us the truth of life, a life that is found in his own flesh and blood and a life of discipleship.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

The 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

“Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods.” We struggle with our gods. They appear in the forms of things like money, power, prestige, popularity, privilege, and self-fulfillment. We like these “gods” because they make us feel good and ask very little of us in return. When we worship them, we worship ourselves. How can you go wrong with that? We buy into the illusion that if something can give us a comfortable life, free of want and need, then it is worth setting other things aside to pursue it. In essence, we sell our souls. Our struggle with “who is God” and to whom do we belong is a real one and one that can easily find us empty and experiencing disillusionment.

The devil tempted Jesus in the desert and promised him more. We are promised “more.” But in pursuing the more and the satisfying, we lose track of the cost, and the cost is great. We sacrifice our very life in pursuit of something disguised as life. We sacrifice truth for something that only “feels” true. While the true and real God certainly promises us many things, many things are also required. It is not about the warm and secure feelings and self-absorption the world wants to provide, but of giving back. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God’s kingdom (not our own), love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, that we must die to ourselves in order to find ourselves, and trust that Jesus truly gives us his flesh and blood to eat and drink. These are hard things to accept and even harder to put into practice. It is no wonder that many, who may be attracted to Jesus at first, walk away in pursuit of the more self-satisfying gods.

But truth is truth. If we cannot accept it from the lips of Jesus Christ, then where else will we find it? To whom can we go? There is only one source of truth and life, Jesus Christ. Jesus has the words of eternal life and if we do not go to him, then where else will we find this gift? But we must be faithful and buy into the whole package deal that requires sacrifice and fidelity. When we do, we find ourselves, through the Body and Blood of Christ, connected to the Source of all life and then intimately bound with our brothers and sisters. We all have to decide whether we want to stay or go and if we can accept what Jesus has to say. It’s a choice we all have to make.

Sacraments of Initiation

Baptism—is available at any age. Please contact the parish office.

Eucharist—Student candidates must be at least age 7 by December 1st and be participating in ongoing Seasons of Faith Gatherings for at least one year prior.

Confirmation—Student candidates must be participating in Seasons of Faith for at least one year prior to beginning formation for Confirmation in the spring.
