

A Message From Our Pastor Father Carlos

The Second Vatican Council produced a number of documents that contain a great wealth of material for us to reflect upon. The “universal call to holiness” is one of the signature phrases that emerged from these documents. The Catholic Church has a rich tradition of venerating certain members of the Church as having lived heroic lives of great holiness. This practice has existed in the Church almost since the beginning. In the early centuries, people were celebrating the Eucharist in the catacombs. While this was done in part to escape persecution, it was also done as an attempt to remain in close proximity to the remains of those heroes of our faith. That tradition of course evolved into art, stained glass, statuary, and beautiful paintings. These objects of devotion are all an important part of how we express our faith. Catholicism grasps what many of our protestant brothers and sisters have shunned. We worship through all of our senses, the visual beauty of art, the sound of beautiful hymns, and the wonderful smell of incense. Stained glass and statues of saints are not examples of idolatry, though they can become that. These objects are meant to remind us of our rich Christian history and of the many connections within the body of Christ, both the body on earth and those members of the body in Heaven. There is one peril in devotion to the saints that we should be aware of. It’s a good thing to venerate them. It’s a good thing to ask them to pray for us. It is not a good thing to treat them as though they are a category of beings completely different from us. Not all of us will have stained glass windows or statues of ourselves, but every single person that God has created is called to be a saint. If we hold the saints at arm’s length as otherworldly beings, we lose sight of the fact that they’re just like us, and that the road to sainthood is really not all that complicated.

This call to sainthood is the lesson that the “universal call to holiness” of Vatican II emphasizes. However, this belief didn’t start in the 1960s. It started with the beginning of the Church with Christ’s giving us the great commandment to love the Lord our God and our neighbor as ourselves. The saints have been showing this to us through word and example ever since. We can think of those that have worked amongst lepers and outcasts, those who have started schools to provide opportunities for those with less means, and those who have shown their love for the poor by setting aside wealth and possessions in order to be more closely connected to the poor. All of these actions are commendable, but none of them should seem very outlandish. The road for all these saints begins, as it does for us, with answering a simple question, “What does God want me to for Him do today.” – Fr. Carlos

What We Carry from Town to Town

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't.


People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take. — Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPi



Gospel Meditation & Reflections

GOSPEL MEDITATION 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the “road less traveled.” Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, is not always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take. ©LPi



When Kateri Tekakwitha was proclaimed St. Kateri Tekakwitha on October 21, she was the first member of a North American tribe to be declared a saint. “The Lily of the Mohawks,” Kateri was born in 1656 in a village along the Mohawk River called Ossernenon, now known as Auriesville, New York. Her father was a Mohawk chief, her mother a Christian Algonquin raised among the French.

When Kateri was 4, a smallpox epidemic claimed her parents and baby brother. She survived, but her face was disfigured and her vision impaired. She was raised by her anti-Christian uncle, who began to plan her marriage. But after meeting with Catholic priests, Kateri decided to be baptized.

Following her Baptism by a Jesuit missionary in 1676 at age 20, Kateri's family and village ostracized and ridiculed her. She fled the next year to Canada, taking refuge at St. Francis Xavier Mission in the Mohawk Nation at Caughnawaga on the St. Lawrence River, about 10 miles from Montreal, and made her first Communion on Christmas in 1677.

Kateri astounded the Jesuits with her deep spirituality and her devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. She devoted herself to teaching prayers to the children and helping the sick and elderly of Caughnawaga.

She died in 1680 at age 24. According to eyewitnesses, the scars on her face suddenly disappeared after her death. Soon after, Catholics started to claim that favors and miracles had been obtained through her intercession.



Uma mensagem do nosso pastor Padre Carlos

O Concílio Vaticano II produziu uma série de documentos que contêm uma grande riqueza de material para refletirmos. A “chamada universal à santidade” é uma das frases principais que emergiram desses documentos. A Igreja Católica tem uma rica tradição de venerar certos membros da Igreja por terem vivido vidas heróicas de grande santidade. Essa prática existe na Igreja quase desde o início. Nos primeiros séculos, as pessoas celebravam a Eucaristia nas catacumbas. Embora isso tenha sido feito em parte para escapar da perseguição, também foi feito como uma tentativa de permanecer próximo aos restos mortais daqueles heróis de nossa fé. Essa tradição, é claro, evoluiu para arte, vitrais, estátuas e belas pinturas. Esses objetos de devoção são todos uma parte importante de como expressamos nossa fé. O catolicismo compreende o que muitos de nossos irmãos e irmãs protestantes não. Adoramos com todos os nossos sentidos a beleza visual da arte, o som de belos hinos e o maravilhoso cheiro de incenso. Vitrais e estátuas de santos não são exemplos de idolatria, embora possam se tornar isso. Esses objetos têm o objetivo de nos lembrar de nossa rica história cristã e das muitas conexões dentro do corpo de Cristo, tanto o corpo na terra quanto os membros do corpo no céu. Existe um perigo na devoção aos santos, do qual devemos estar cientes. É uma boa coisa venerá-los. É uma boa coisa pedir a eles que orem por nós. Não é bom tratá-los como se fossem uma categoria de seres completamente diferente de nós. Nem todos nós teremos vitrais ou estátuas de nós mesmos, mas cada pessoa que Deus criou é chamada para ser um santo. Se mantivermos os santos à distância como seres de outro mundo, perderemos de vista o fato de que eles são como nós, e que o caminho para a santidade não é realmente tão complicado.

Esta “chamada universal à santidade” foi enfatizada no Concílio Vaticano II. No entanto, essa crença não começou na década de 1960. Tudo começou com o início da Igreja com Cristo nos dando o grande mandamento de amar o Senhor nosso Deus e nosso próximo como a nós mesmos. Os santos têm nos mostrado isso por meio de palavras e exemplos desde então. Podemos pensar naqueles que trabalharam entre leprosos e rejeitados, aqueles que começaram escolas para oferecer oportunidades para aqueles com menos recursos e aqueles que mostraram seu amor pelos pobres separando riquezas e posses para estarem mais intimamente ligados para os pobres. Todas essas ações são louváveis, mas nenhuma delas deve parecer muito estranha. O caminho para todos esses santos começa, assim como para nós, com a resposta a uma pergunta simples: "O que Deus quer que eu faça hoje". - Pe. Carlos
