A Message From Our Pastor Father Carlos

We are in the midst of our season of evaluating our role as stewards of the gifts God has given us. For about a year now we've been reflecting together on the reality that God is calling both of our parishes to persevere and to flourish in their own respective gifts and as equally valuable parts of our Stoughton Catholic Collaborative. To continue on this trajectory of growth and flourishing, every member of our parishes must intentionally and wholeheartedly embrace and live the concept of stewardship, both within the walls of our churches and as we step forth to live the Gospel in our daily lives.

This concept of stewardship is not a program and it's not an appeal. While I am here as your pastor, and I hope for many decades beyond my tenure, discipleship, and stewardship must be the measures we regularly use to measure how well we are responding to God's blessings. I have faith that God wants to do amazing things in these parishes and through each of us that gather here, but that will only come to pass if each of us does our part. Stewardship is about recognizing that everything we have and everything we are begins as a gift from God. Our gifts, including our talents and our possessions, make the most sense when we thank God for them and when we ask God how He wants us to cultivate them for His glory, for our good, and for the service of others. God is the one ultimately responsible for making our offerings bear fruit, but much like the faithful widow in today's Gospel, we need to do our part by first selflessly putting before God the gifts we have and asking Him to bless and multiply them.

Being aware of our talents and our possessions we can find ourselves facing the temptation to keep them to ourselves either because we don't understand the full value of our gifts, or because we have the reasonable doubt that if we give from what we have then we may not have enough for our own needs. We need to be prudent stewards, that's true, but we also have to recognize that as members of the body of Christ we live an interconnected existence where God takes care of us through others just as He may nudge us to use our gifts and talents to answer the needs of others.

A comfortable approach to our life of faith says that we show up to church to meet an obligation and to get fed in some way. Long-term this is not a life-giving approach to our relationship with God and the downward trajectory in church attendance that we've seen in recent decades gives witness to this. It's not that Church and being spiritually fed are any less important, rather it's that our understanding of and relationship with Church needs to be shaken up. Stewardship reminds us that Church is not something we do or a place we go to. Church is who we are as members of the body of Christ. A body to be healthy and flourishing needs all its members to be united and healthy, the same can be said of our worshipping communities. God is calling us to life and to holy boldness. Trust Him in this. Thank Him for the gift you are and for the gifts you have, and then ask for His wisdom in bringing these gifts to greater flourishing! May God bless you for all you have done, and may those blessings be multiplied in the years to come. —Fr. Carlos

Gospel Meditation & Reflections

GOSPEL MEDITATION

32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

On December 10, 1979, a very petite holy woman known as Mother Teresa of Calcutta spoke these words in her Nobel Peace Prize Acceptance Speech, "But I am sure in the families and many of our homes, maybe we are not hungry for a piece of bread, but maybe there is somebody there in the family who is unwanted, unloved, uncared, forgotten, there isn't love. Love begins at home. And love to be true has to hurt. I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa had no sugar for her children, and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: I will not eat sugar for three days, I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa. How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name, he loved with great love, he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you, to love one another until it hurts, but don't forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven't got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts."

Living authentically and walking with holiness always involves sacrifice. It has to hurt. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even what is apparently a generous gesture can be nothing. It is no wonder that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus and the young child in our story above the interest of Mother Teresa. It is easy to make the houses of our lives look like they are in perfect order when in fact they are in shambles within. Religion can sometimes make this hypocritical masquerade easy to accomplish. We can find ourselves in all the right holy places, reciting all of the correct prayers, participating in community collections, and reciting the proper doctrines only to find ourselves empty, shallow, self-focused, and overly anxious about personal concerns.

The one who learns to discover their inner poverty, their spiritual poverty, is the only one who can truly place him or herself at the mercy of God. It is only when we allow ourselves to be empty that we realize Who we actually need to fill us. This is the real meaning of trust. Many of us are afraid to take the plunge. We allow ourselves to detach from only so much, always keeping a watchful eye on the protection of our securities. We understand the value of poverty, but we do not want to become too poor. As long as we are able to recognize this tension, our reluctance to let go and our struggle, we can continue our journey of humbly learning how to love so deeply that it hurts. God understands and waits. ©LPi



Can you explain what we mean by a vocation or calling? I have heard this term used in many different contexts and am not sure what it means. Does it apply to religious life?

Answer:

A vocation or calling refers to a spiritual experience whereby a person senses within oneself the closeness of God and what he is asking in one's life. It is a realization of what one's part in God's plan could be. Vocation comes in all kinds of ways. Some are as dramatic as St. Paul's, being knocked off his horse, blinded, and hearing God's voice. Others are less dramatic, often occurring over time through little events and personal interests. Others happen in a hurry, accompanied by great spiritual insight or conversion. We often think that this applies to religious vocation, but in fact, every Christian has a vocation, a calling to serve others in and through the church. Whether married or single, religious or lay, we are all called to live out our baptismal commitment to preach and teach the Gospel message. Each of us has our role to play in God's plan, and we become coworkers with God in the work of redemption. With a little confidence, a willing spirit and God's grace, we can and will respond to his unique call.


CONSOLATION MINISTRY

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Uma mensagem do nosso pastor Padre Carlos

Estamos no meio de nossa temporada de avaliação de nossa missão de ser administradores fieis dos dons que Deus nos deu. Por cerca de um ano, temos refletido juntos sobre a realidade de que Deus está chamando ambas as nossas paróquias para perseverar e florescer em seus respectivos dons e como partes igualmente valiosas de nossa Stoughton Catholic Collaborative. Para continuar nesta trajetória de crescimento e prosperidade, todos nós, os membros de nossas paróquias, devemos abraçar e viver intencionalmente e de todo o coração o conceito de mordomia, tanto dentro das paredes de nossas igrejas e quando saímos para viver o Evangelho em nossas vidas diárias.

Este conceito de administração cristã não é um programa e não é um apelo. Enquanto eu estiver aqui como seu pároco, e espero que por muitas décadas além de minha gestão, o discipulado e a mordomia devem ser as medidas que usamos regularmente para medir o quão bem estamos respondendo às bênçãos de Deus. Tenho fé que Deus quer fazer coisas incríveis nessas paróquias e por meio de cada um de nós que aqui nos reunimos, mas isso só acontecerá se cada um de nós fizer a sua parte. Mordomia é reconhecer que tudo o que temos e tudo o que somos começa como um presente de Deus. Nossos dons, incluindo nossos talentos e posses, fazem mais sentido quando agradecemos a Deus por eles e quando perguntamos a Deus como Ele deseja que os cultivemos para Sua glória, para nosso bem e para o serviço dos outros. Deus é o único responsável por fazer nossas ofertas darem frutos, mas assim como a viúva fiel no Evangelho de hoje, precisamos fazer a nossa parte, primeiro colocando abnegadamente diante de Deus os dons que temos e pedindo a Ele para abençoá-los e multiplicá-los.

Quando estarmos cientes de nossos talentos e de nossas posses, podemos enfrentar a tentação de mantê-los para nós, seja porque não entendemos o valor total de nossos dons, ou porque temos a dúvida razoável de que, se dermos do que temos, então podemos não ter o suficiente para nossas próprias necessidades. Precisamos ser mordomos prudentes, é verdade, mas também temos que reconhecer que, como membros do corpo de Cristo, vivemos uma existência interconectada, onde Deus cuida de nós por meio de outros, assim como pode nos incitar a usar nossos dons e talentos para atender às necessidades dos outros.

Uma abordagem confortável para nossa vida de fé diz que vamos à igreja para cumprir uma obrigação e ser alimentados de alguma forma. A longo prazo esta não é uma abordagem que conduz à vida no nosso relacionamento com Deus e a trajetória descendente na frequência com que gente vêm à igreja que vimos nas últimas décadas dá testemunho disso. Não é que a Igreja e ser alimentados espiritualmente sejam menos importantes, ao contrário, é que nossa compreensão e relacionamento com a Igreja precisam ser abalados. A mordomia nos lembra que a Igreja não é algo que fazemos ou um lugar aonde vamos. Igreja é quem somos como membros do corpo de Cristo. Um corpo para ser saudável e florescente precisa que todos os seus membros estejam bem unidos e saudáveis, o mesmo pode ser dito de nossas comunidades de fé. Deus está nos chamando para a vida e para a ousadia santa. Confie Ele nisso. Agradeça a Ele pelo dom que você é e pelos dons que possui, e depois peça a Sua sabedoria para levar esses dons a um florescimento maior! Que Deus os abençoe por tudo o que vocês fizeram e que essas bênçãos sejam multiplicadas nos anos que virão. —Pe. Carlos

MEDITAÇÃO DO EVANGELHO

32º Domingo no Horário Normal

Em 10 de dezembro de 1979, uma mulher santa muito pequena conhecida como Madre Teresa de Calcutá disse estas palavras no seu Discurso de Aceitação do Prémio Nobel da Paz: "Mas tenho a certeza que nas famílias e em muitas das nossas casas, talvez não estejamos com fome de um pedaço de pão, mas talvez haja alguém na família que seja indesejado, não amado, descuidado, esquecido, não há amor. O amor começa em casa. E o amor para ser verdade tem que doer. Nunca esqueço uma criança que me ensinou uma lição muito bonita. Ouviram em Calcutá, as crianças, que a Madre Teresa não tinha açúcar para os filhos, e este pequeno, o rapaz hindu de quatro anos, foi para casa e disse aos pais: "Não vou comer açúcar durante três dias, darei o meu açúcar à Madre Teresa. Quanto uma criança pode dar. Depois de três dias trouxeram para a nossa casa, e havia um pequenino que mal conseguia pronunciar o meu nome, ele amava com muito amor, amava até doer. E isto é o que vos trago, para se amarem até doerem, mas não se esqueçam que há muitas crianças, muitas crianças, muitos homens e mulheres que não têm o que têm. E lembre-se de amá-los até que doa."

Viver autenticamente e caminhar com santidade envolve sempre sacrifício. Tem que doer. Só as ações provenientes de um verdadeiro e profundo sacrifício demonstram a verdadeira integridade. Sem sacrifício, mesmo o que parece ser um gesto generoso não pode ser nada. Não é de admirar que a viúva que contribuiu da sua pobreza tenha recebido grande admiração de Jesus e da criança na nossa história acima do interesse da Madre Teresa. É fácil fazer com que as casas das nossas vidas pareçam em perfeitas condições quando, na verdade, estão em ruínas. A religião às vezes pode tornar este mascarado hipócrita fácil de realizar. Podemos encontrar-nos em todos os lugares sagrados certos, recitando todas as orações corretas, participando em coleções comunitárias, e recitando as doutrinas adequadas apenas para nos encontrarmos vazios, rasos, egocêntricos e excessivamente ansiosos com as preocupações pessoais.

Aquele que aprende a descobrir a sua pobreza interior, a sua pobreza espiritual, é o único que pode realmente colocá-lo à mercê de Deus. Só quando nos permitimos estar vazios é que percebemos quem precisamos para nos encher. Este é o verdadeiro significado da confiança. Muitos de nós têm medo de dar o salto. Permitimo-nos separar-nos de apenas tanto, mantendo sempre um olhar atento sobre a proteção dos nossos títulos. Compreendemos o valor da pobreza, mas não queremos tornar-nos demasiado pobres. Enquanto formos capazes de reconhecer esta tensão, a nossa relutância em deixar ir e a nossa luta, podemos continuar a nossa jornada de aprender humildemente como amar tão profundamente que dói. 

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
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
