Dear Friends in Christ:

Did you know that the Pro-Life Movement in the Church is more than simply working to end Abortion? Leading up to and following the monumental Supreme Court decision to overturn Roe v. Wade, we have witnessed a whole spectrum of highly charged, volatile, and understandably emotional reactions, whether for or against the decision, and its potential scope.

Personally, I was struck by the remarks made by Archbishop Blair in a recent interview he gave to a reporter in New Haven, in which he shared that although he felt joy over the Dobbs decision, this was not a time for champagne bottles or anything like that. That definitely left an impact on me.

While this is surely a moment of pensive joy for those of us who have been praying, fasting, and marching in the streets, some of us for over forty-nine years, demanding an end to this human atrocity, we must also understand that there are many in the wider human community, and in our church, who are scared and hurting right now. There are many people who still bear the wounds of the experience, have participated in the decision to have an abortion, or to this day, many years after having made

"the choice," find themselves wondering, "what if?"



view this is a time of a more pensive joy and a challenge! A challenge, YES. A challenge certainly for us as Pastors to help our Catholic people remember that we are not a "one-issue" pro-life church. We are COMPLETELY pro- life from conception until natural death! We stand for dignity and respect for life in all its stages—the life of the unborn, the elderly, the terminally ill, and those on death row. These may certainly be controversial issues in our society-and some of them may brush up against our political, ideological, or social commitments—but we as a people of faith, and as a Church must speak the truth and stand up for what is right, we must defend life-all life! We must promote a greater respect for ALL human life from conception to natural death. We must let our elected officials know that there are many people in this great state who view life as a sacred gift from God and want to do all we can to show honor and respect to that gift.

So what is the challenge? It is to truly be pro-life at every step of life, to recognize our need and our obligation to redouble our efforts to make a difference in all lives. How do we do this?

The Catholic Church does this by our outreach to those in need. We do this through our Catholic hospitals in which we serve the needs of God's people and minister to their physical well-being. We do this through the outreach and services of Catholic Charities in which we minister to the mental health of others, promote self-sufficiency and leadership development, strengthen families and train young parents to be role models for their children, provide for basic human needs for individuals

and families, and a variety of other services to help individuals and families better themselves. We do this through ministries such as Saint Vincent DePaul Mission in Waterbury that offers many services to meet the basic needs of those who come to the church in a moment of need whether it is food at the soup kitchen, a bed at the shelter, mental health services, and other



services through which in the name of the church, as they say on their website, "we aid, support, and empower people experiencing poverty, homelessness, hunger, and mental

health challenges so they may recover with dignity and develop sustainable solutions for a brighter future." We do this through pregnancy crisis centers, such as Carolyn's Place in Waterbury, which we support throughout the year, who exists solely to help women and men who face unplanned pregnancy to choose life.

We, as Catholics, are pro-life in other ways as well. We are pro-life in care for others, in concern for immigrants, in educating young people in inner cities who may not be of the catholic faith, in promoting an end to violence in our neighborhoods and in our schools, in providing charitable outreach to those in need, in caring for those in desperate circumstances, feeding those who are starving and lack adequate nutrition, and in caring for the elderly, the terminally ill, and those on death row.

We, as a Catholic people, must see in this recent decision a challenge to strengthen ALL that we do to show a greater respect for ALL life from conception until natural

death. A challenge to see the manifold ways that life and human dignity are being threatened, and to be disturbed and distracted enough to want to do something about it.

Certainly this decision is also a challenge for us here in our parish family. What are we doing, and what can we do, to provide a safety net to ensure that pregnant and parenting moms have the resources, the love, and the support they need to nurture the lives of their children? What are we doing to show the wider community that we care about ALL life from conception to natural death? I welcome this discussion in the near future with our Pro-Life Ministry leaders and members. I welcome any ideas from any parishioner in this regard as well.

As we move forward in this regard it would be good for all of us to remember the words of Micah the prophet when he said (6:8) "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God."

Did you notice Sister Mary Rose, FSE, now has the initials of her Religious Community after her name now that she is a vowed member of the Community!

Sister Mary Rose, FSE, joined the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist a couple of

years ago and went through the various stages of formation. During Pre-Postulancy, she became familiar with the community life and the mission of the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. Then during one year of Postulancy, she formally entered the life of the Community and began to learn about Franciscan spirituality. Then Sister Mary Rose, FSE, spent two years as a Novitiate during which she received the habit and a religious name, and focused on study and the lived experience of the vows of chastity, poverty, and obedience, Franciscan spirituality, community life, and the teachings of the Church.

As you know from her participation in the ministry of our parish here as our Pastoral Associate, she, as a Novice, wore the habit with a simple cord cincture and no insignia around her neck. But during her "First Vows" Mass this past Friday, I was privileged to offer the Church's blessings upon her new cincture which has three knots for each of her vows of Chastity, Poverty, and Obedience, as well as the insignia of the

order which is a simple cross with a circular band of metal signifying the penetrating power of the Cross and the integrating power of the Eucharist!



During this time of her "first vows," which can be as long as six or so years, she will participate more fully in the mission and apostolate of the community and she will intensify her relationship with the community. So as you see her around the parish, join me, Father Lavorgna, and Father Piotr in congratulating Sister Mary Rose, FSE, on her First Vows and continue to pray for her and her community! We offer happiest congratulations to Sister Mary Rose, FSE, as well as to her family, and we promise our prayers as she continues to follow God's call in her life.

the number of Masses you request to just three weekend Masses and five weekday Masses for the first three weeks. After July 27th, you can certainly call back and book additional Masses if they are available. Thank you for your understanding of our attempt to give as many people as possible the chance to book Masses for their loved ones



The donation for a weekday Mass is \$15, and that for a weekend Mass or Holy Day is \$25.

Unannounced Masses are ALWAYS available for a donation of \$10. We do book unannounced Masses and these can always be accepted. We keep a list on our computer and either these intentions are given to one of our parish priests for use on a day off when we hold a private Mass in our chapel or for use at a Mass with those in nursing care facilities such as at Elim Park. From time to time, we also send some of these intentions to the priests who work in the Pastoral Center who do not have a public Mass to celebrate, or to priests in the Missions throughout the world through our Mission Office. You can be assured that if you book an unannounced Mass with our office, your intention is used at a Mass within a short period of time.

As always, remember to pray for our parish family and ask God's blessings upon us all. With the gracious intercession of Saint Bridget of Sweden, our Patroness, and Blessed Michael McGivney, may we be united with one another in prayer! Please pray for me and know that I am praying for you!



Today is the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The readings for today can be found at https://bible.usccb.org/bible/readings/070322.cfm

Today's Gospel begins immediately after the final verse in last Sunday's Gospel. After strong language about the difficulties of discipleship, Jesus immediately appoints 72 people to go ahead of him to every town and place he plans to visit, proclaiming that the Kingdom of God is at hand. He sends them in pairs. In the Law of Moses two witnesses were needed for a testimony to be credible. It was probably also a safer way to travel.

Jesus admits it will be difficult, that he is sending them out like lambs among wolves. Yet they are to bring nothing with them, not even a money bag or sandals. They are to greet no one on the way so as not to be distracted from their mission. When they enter a house, their message is simply "peace." The response they will receive may be positive or negative. Either way, they are to know that the Kingdom of God is at hand. They are not to demand special treatment but eat and drink whatever is given them. They are to stay in one house and are not to look around for one that provides better accommodations.



They are to heal the sick as a sign that the Kingdom of God is at hand for them. Like Jesus' miracles, healing is a sign of the coming of the kingdom. If the town will not receive them, they are to shake the dust from their feet and move on. Even in the case of such rejection they should know that the Kingdom of God is at hand.

When they return from their journeys, they are rejoicing because their mission has been successful. Demons were under their power because of Jesus' name. Jesus may have sent them out as lambs among wolves, but at the conclusion of this passage he assures them that they have been given power over the enemy and nothing will harm them, not even serpents and scorpions.

A key theme of today's Gospel and last Sunday's Gospel is discipleship—its challenges, its difficulties, and its rewards. Sharing in the mission of Jesus is difficult, but everyone is called to do it, not just some professionals trained for ministry. Even for us today, the harvest is plentiful. We should pray to the master of the harvest to send out workers for his harvest.

Ask Father

Dear Father: At the Transfiguration, the apostles seemed to know that the persons conversing with Jesus were Moses and Elijah. How?

The Gospels do not explain how the disciples were able to recognize Moses and Elijah at the Transfiguration, so any answer is a guess.

Possible ways the disciples were able to recognize Moses and Elijah:

Jesus referred to them by name in his conversation with them, and the disciples overheard it.

The disciples overheard the conversation, and the context informed them with whom Jesus was speaking.


They had something unique about their appearance that made them readily recognizable (Exodus 34:29; 2 Kings 1:8).

There was some sort of heavenly announcement that wasn't recorded in the Gospels.

Jesus explained to the disciples who they were.

They were divinely inspired to recognize them, similar to God's revelation to Peter that Jesus is the messiah.

FORMED in FAITH

How are we at Part 4 already? It feels like we just finished up with the Sacraments, and we're almost to the end of the Creed! In case you've been away the past few weeks, this is the penultimate episode of our series on the Nicene Creed. We've covered the sections on God the Father and God the Son in our first three episodes, so you can probably guess who comes next...

If you guessed the Holy Spirit, you're right! The next-to-last section of the Creed focuses on the Holy Spirit, how He relates to the Father and the Son, and His role in Salvation History. Did you know that the Holy Spirit used to be known as the Holy Ghost? The change came about in part because "Spirit" is a better linguistic descriptor for the third Person of the Trinity, but also because the word "ghost" has colloquially come to refer to the spirit of a dead person.

Okay, here's the section we're focusing on today: "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets." Again, this should all sound familiar...if not, there's a problem!

As per usual, let's break down what this piece of the Creed establishes:

- 1) The third Person of the Trinity is God the Holy Spirit.
- 2) The Holy Spirit is the "giver of life," and therefore was also instrumental in the creation of all things.
- 3) The Holy Spirit originates in both the Father and the Son, binding the Trinity together in unconditional love.
- 4) The Holy Spirit is equally worthy of adoration and glorification along with the Father and the Son.
- 5) The Holy Spirit is the inspiration that has guided the Prophets and the Church through the millennia.

It wouldn't be much of a Trinity without a third Person, right? As with the section on the Son, we establish here that the Holy Spirit was instrumental in the creation of all things, as He gave them life. He also, therefore, has the same primacy as the Father and the Son and is equally worthy of praise, honor, and glory.

The Holy Spirit is perhaps the most difficult Person to understand, as He is not described in the terms of man. We have a concept of what a Father is and what a Son is, but a Spirit? That is beyond our human experience. He is the love between the Father and the Son, the inspiration behind the Scriptures, and the manifestation of the truth that reveals Jesus Christ to us as God the Son.

As with just about everything, this is where we turn to Jesus. He gave us the best description of the Holy Spirit when speaking with His Disciples at the Last Supper: "But I tell you the truth, it is better for you that I go. For if I do not go, the Advocate will not come to you. But if I go, I will send him to you...When he comes, the Spirit of truth, he will guide you to all truth...He will glorify me, because he will take from what is mine and declare it to you."

That passage is from John Chapter 16, and we can't recommend reading through it highly enough. The Holy Spirit has been described as the Advocate, the Paraclete (Counselor), the Helper, and other such terms. This is because He is the Person of the Trinity that inspires us, speaks through us, and shows us the truth about Jesus (and all things, for that matter). Since He descended upon the nascent Catholic Church on Pentecost, His inspiration has been burning in the hearts of the faithful each and every day!

Let us all pray that the Spirit never stops moving in and through us; Come, Holy Spirit! We hope you'll join us next week for the final episode of this miniseries.

Outreach and care for pregnant women in difficult and trying circumstances has been an integral part of Catholic pro-life efforts, and we need to commit ourselves all the more to the Respect Life Ministry of our Archdiocese (prolifeministry.org) and to our parish pro-life groups.

I want to thank all the Faithful of the Archdiocese of Hartford who have persevered in their pro-life commitment through thick and thin and have never given up hope that one day the evil of abortion on demand would no longer be the untouchable law of the land.

The Supreme Court published its decision on June 24, the Solemnity this year of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. On the cross, contrary to all appearances, life conquered death. A new member Knight of our council, recruited by Father Romans and former Grand Knight Ron Painchaud, is . . .




