When you pray for a personal intention light will enter the darkness; hope fills you. You may trust that God himself looks upon you and HIS merciful love overshadows you. Since we have a new table by our renovated statue of Mary there will be **7-DAY CANDLES** available to burn during Easter.

EASTER DUTY

The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, March 9 to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, June 15. *Canon 920, §1.

All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,


In Luke's gospel we hear the central event of our life of faith: that Jesus Christ conquered death and the first ones to see this were all women. Luke mentions three women and in other transcripts it says, Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the rest of them. So, there were more, but they are not named. Every gospel shows that women were the first to find the empty tomb, and they all vary about which women were there.

The two men in dazzling garments who appeared to them said, 'He (Jesus) is not here, but he has been raised. Remember what he said to you while he was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners and be crucified and rise on the third day.' And they remembered his words.

It is a very simple account of the central belief of our faith. And the women, not to mention the men, were very surprised by it; it was the last thing they expected. 'He is not here, he is risen!' How simpler can you get? Don't you remember that to experience the resurrection you first have to go through the cross, as he did?

And the women did remember, Luke says. It must have really touched them after a moment or two, and they ran off to announce this to the others. It is a model of what you and I need to do in our life. Remember when you suffer that the resurrection will come. It always comes as a surprise; you expect it in a different way. And when you put it together it is spectacular! And you go off running to share it. An announcement is made with a trumpet, with a lot of noise! When you hear an announcement, a *kerygma*, a Good News, it changes you, as it did to the women, and eventually to the men.

Peter did not believe it either and so he goes and checks, and what does he find? The clothes of Jesus, but they are unwrapped; a thief might have taken them off but not the way Peter found them. It was as if someone slid out from them and leaves them as they were. And he goes home amazed at what has seen. You and I should also be amazed at what the Lord is doing for you and for our parish. Let us praise God on this day the Lord has made, Happy Easter!

THE 2025 ANNUAL APPEAL

REQUIREMENTS FOR BAPTISM OR CONFIRMATION SPONSOR

Godparent/Sponsor must be at least 16 years old.
Godparent/Sponsor must be in good standing with the Catholic Church. Must be a practicing Catholic (attend Sunday Mass regularly). Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation.
If married, must be married in the Catholic Church.
If single, not living with significant other, nor married civilly only. "You should NOT feel good about choosing godparents that are not living the faith."

Alleluia! Jesus is risen from the dead! Today (and for the next 8 days) the Church celebrates the Octave of Easter, which basically means that the celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead goes on for 8 straight days! "O Death, where is your sting? O Hell, where is your victory?"

Christ is risen, and you are overthrown. Christ is risen, and the demons are fallen. Christ is risen, and the angels rejoice. Christ is risen, and life reigns. Christ is risen, and not one dead remains in the grave. For Christ, being risen from the dead, is become the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. To Him be glory and dominion unto ages of ages."

EASTER READINGS

"What do you know?" is the question linking all three readings today. Imagine the shock waves that shot through the city of Jerusalem on the first Easter morning. Jesus' body was missing! By the time Peter spoke the words found in today's first reading, fifty days had passed, so he began by saying, in effect, "I take it you know what has been reported all over Judea about Jesus of Nazareth." Of course, they knew by then, but in today's Gospel we are taken back to the first day. We meet Mary Magdalene exclaiming, "We don't know where they put him!" What do we know? In the second reading Paul asks, "Do you not know that a little yeast leavens all the dough?" Do we know the power of our own faith? Do we know the effect we can have on others?

The Lenten journey is now complete, its mission of renewal and preparation to receive new life fulfilled. The call to worship the Risen Lord has been received, and we gather to experience together the consoling presence of Christ in word and sacrament. We are at our best today, crowded and cramped to be sure, but the fullest sign of who we are meant to be. Christ has claimed us in the waters of baptism, we have acquired wonderful companions, and together we can accomplish great things. This is the day for rekindling the old flames of baptismal commitment, so we light the paschal candle, and by its light we make yet again the ancient promises to reject evil's grip and empty promises.

Today we do not recite the Creed but respond with one voice to age-old questions. New life has to be nurtured, both the life of the newly baptized and the renewed life of those who have passed through Lent's refining prayer, fasting, and giving alms. At any Mass during the next fifty days, you may be surprised by grace and splashed by water! The Easter season begins with the Easter Vigil, which is celebrated after night falls on the evening before Easter Sunday. The season of Easter is a joyous, celebratory season. It begins with celebrating Christ's resurrection and ends by celebrating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus. Christ's ascension into Heaven is celebrated just prior to Pentecost. The Easter season lasts 50 days, from Easter Sunday through Pentecost. The liturgical colors of Easter are white, for most days, and red for Pentecost.

THE PASCHAL CANDLE

The lighting of the Paschal candle is a traditional Easter observance in the Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and Anglican churches. Set aside in a large candlestick near the altar, the Paschal Candle is lit from flint on the night of Holy Saturday (during the Easter vigil service). From this candle is taken the fire from which all other candles in the church are lit. This dramatic ritual of the fire service dates back at least as far as the 4th century. The Paschal Candle represents Christ, and the flame symbolizes His Resurrection as “the light of the world.” In the early days of the Church, most members of the congregation carried the fire of the Paschal Candle to their homes to relight their lamps and hearth. The passing of light to the congregation at the Vigil service symbolizes Christ’s giving of His life to His faithful believers.

SAINT OF THE WEEK, CATHERINE OF SIENA, APRIL 29

The value Catherine makes central in her short life, and which sounds clearly and consistently through her experience is complete surrender to Christ. What is most impressive about her is that she learns to view her surrender to her Lord as a goal to be reached through time.

She was the 23rd child of Jacopo and Lapa Benincasa and grew up as an intelligent, cheerful, and intensely religious person. Catherine disappointed her mother by cutting off her hair as a protest against being overly encouraged to improve her appearance in order to attract a husband. Her father ordered her to be left in peace, and she was given a room of her own for prayer and meditation.

She entered the Dominican Third Order at 18 and spent the next three years in seclusion, prayer, and austerity. Gradually, a group of followers gathered around her—men and women, priests and religious. An active public apostolate grew out of her contemplative life. Her letters, mostly for spiritual instruction and encouragement of her followers, began to take more and more note of public affairs. Opposition and slander resulted from her mixing fearlessly with the world and speaking with the candor and authority of one completely committed to Christ. She was cleared of all charges at the Dominican General Chapter of 1374.

Her public influence reached great heights because of her evident holiness, her membership in the Dominican Third Order, and the deep impression she made on the pope. She worked tirelessly for the crusade against the Turks and for peace between Florence and the pope.

In 1378, the Great Schism began, splitting the allegiance of Christendom between two, then three, popes and putting even saints on opposing sides. Catherine spent the last two years of her life in Rome, in prayer and pleading on behalf of the cause of Pope Urban VI and the unity of the Church. She offered herself as a victim for the Church in its agony. She died surrounded by her “children” and was canonized in 1461.

Catherine ranks high among the mystics and spiritual writers of the Church. In 1939, she and Francis of Assisi were declared co-patrons of Italy. Pope Paul VI named her and Teresa of Avila doctors of the Church in 1970. Her spiritual testament is found in *The Dialogue*.

Though she lived her life in a faith experience and spirituality far different from that of our own time, Catherine of Siena stands as a companion with us on the Christian journey in her undivided effort to invite the Lord to take flesh in her own life. Events which might make us wince or chuckle or even yawn fill her biographies: a mystical experience at six, childhood betrothal to Christ, stories of harsh asceticism, her frequent ecstatic visions. Still, Catherine lived in an age which did not know the rapid change of 21st-century mobile America. The value of her life for us today lies in her recognition of holiness as a goal to be sought over the course of a lifetime. She is the patron saint of Europe, Fire Prevention, and Italy.

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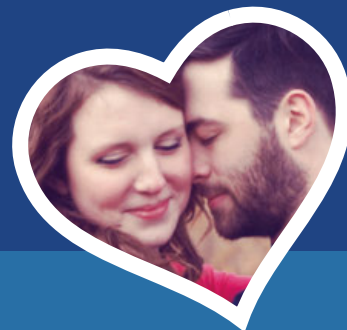
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
