Now is the time to act, urgently, courageously and responsibly.”


“Dear brothers and sisters, the Lord is not so much looking for skilled Scripture commentators, as he is looking for docile hearts which, welcoming his Word, allow themselves to be changed inside. This is why it is so important to be familiar with the Gospel, to always have it at hand – even a pocket-size Gospel in our pockets, in our purses to read and reread, to be passionate about it. When we do this, Jesus, the Word of the Father, enters into our hearts, he becomes intimate with us and we bear fruit in Him. Let’s take for example today’s Gospel: it is not enough to read it and understand that we need to love God and our neighbor. It is necessary that this commandment, which is the “great commandment”, resound in us, that it be assimilated, that it become the voice of our conscience. This way, it does not remain a dead letter, in the drawer of the heart, because the Holy Spirit makes the seed of that Word germinate in us. And the Word of God works, it is always in motion, it is alive and effective (cf. Heb 4:12). So each one of us can become a living, different and original “translation”, not a repetition but a living, different and original “translation” of the one Word of love that God gives us. This is what we see in the lives of the Saints for example. None of them is the same as another, they are all different, but with the same Word of God.

A problem with religion is that it is possible for someone to make everything appear to be right when actually it is not. We can say all of the right prayers, perform all of the proscribed rituals, claim that we adhere to orthodox doctrines and still lead a distorted, empty and sometimes pitiful life. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even the noblest looking actions can amount to nothing. It is no wonder, then, that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus. While it may not always appear to be the case, God has a special care and regard for those who depend upon him in times of trouble and want. Only the person who is truly poor is the only one who can see this. Because of a lack of trust, the one who has much is afraid to take a risk and sees only what they possess as their only security. ©LPi

REFLECTION

On December 10, 1979, a very petite holy woman known as Mother Teresa of Calcutta spoke these words in her Nobel Peace Prize Acceptance Speech, “But I am sure in the families and many of our homes, maybe we are not hungry for a piece of bread, but maybe there is somebody there in the family who is unwanted, unloved, uncared, forgotten, there isn’t love. Love begins at home. And love to be true has to hurt. I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa had no sugar for her children, and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: I will not eat sugar for three days, I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa. How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name, he loved with great love, he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you, to love one another until it hurts, but don’t forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven’t got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts.”

Living authentically and walking with holiness always involves sacrifice. It has to hurt. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even what is apparently a generous gesture can be nothing. It is no wonder that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus and the young child in our story above the interest of Mother Teresa. It is easy to make the houses of our lives look like they are in perfect order when in fact they are in shambles within. Religion can sometimes make this hypocritical masquerade easy to accomplish. We can find ourselves in all the right holy places, reciting all of the correct prayers, participating in community collections, and reciting the proper doctrines only to find ourselves empty, shallow, self-focused, and overly anxious about personal concerns.

The one who learns to discover their inner poverty, their spiritual poverty, is the only one who can truly place him or herself at the mercy of God. It is only when we allow ourselves to be empty that we realize Who we actually need to fill us. This is the real meaning of trust. Many of us are afraid to take the plunge. We allow ourselves to detach from only so much, always keeping a watchful eye on the protection of our securities. We understand the value of poverty, but we do not want to become too poor. As long as we are able to recognize this tension, our reluctance to let go and our struggle, we can continue our journey of humbly learning how to love so deeply that it hurts. God understands and waits. ©LPi

“I was a stranger and you welcomed me.”

In the next few months, approximately 300 people who were evacuated from Afghanistan in August will be making a new home for themselves here in Rhode Island. These are folks who left their homes and homeland to escape the Taliban, and they're about to enter a whole new world. We can imagine how excited and hopeful they are about their future and a new life here in America. Naturally, they are also anxious as the unknown awaits them.

Aware of the call of our Good Teacher, who will say to those who are welcomed to Father's house on the day of judgment: “I was a stranger and you welcomed me,” our parish will be providing financial and material support to the refugees.

First, we have offered to help families with rent and utilities. As the Diocese works with government officials and the numbers and needs become clearer, the parish finance council will add a line item to our budget that will reflect our generous support to our new neighbors from across the world. Once these funds are set aside, the monthly commitment amount will be published in the bulletin.

This funding will come directly from what you already give and commit to the weekly collection.

In addition to our work with the Diocese of Providence to provide financial support, we will also be partnering with Dorcas International of Rhode Island, which has begun a campaign to collect material goods that the evacuees will surely need as they start from scratch, having left everything behind in Afghanistan except the clothes on their backs! On the weekends of November 6/7 and 13/14, the Social Action Committee will sponsor a drive to collect necessities. Please consider donating any of the following new items. Items (in new condition) can be dropped off in the church hall before or after weekend Masses.

Hygiene items: shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, bars of soap, deodorant, floss, lotion, combs, hairbrushes, shaving cream, razors, feminine pads

Baby supplies: bottles, baby food, diapers, crib sheets, baby wipes, diaper rash cream, sets of clothes

Miscellaneous: basic tool kits, kettles, first aid kits, English dictionaries, umbrellas, electrical cords, outlet strips

Let's fill the church hall with these items, and fill our Afghan brothers and sisters with hope and love!

“**Project Warm Welcome**” is a campaign to collect and distribute winter clothing for the recently displaced Afghanistan refugees. Ava Grosso, a senior at The Prout School, will collect the donations from Christ the King that will be delivered to the base in November. Fort McCoy has taken in 13,000 Afghan evacuees with the capacity to house up to 50,000 total. This collection is also November 6/7 and 13/14.
