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
March 16th St. Patrick Mass and Luncheon


We continue with our growingly popular Senior Luncheons.

Pope Francis has invited the Church-faithful throughout the world to reflect and participate in a "Synod" - which roughly means consultation. The Pope expressed, "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium."

As a parish community, we are happy to participate in this process, happy to be heard and happy to share our thoughts and wisdom.

Although this consultation will primarily benefit the Synod of Bishops in October 2023, our Cardinal Archbishop will use our responses to develop a stronger Archdiocese of Newark and a stronger St. Elizabeth of Hungary.

Reports will be made and passed forward at every level of our universal church—parish, diocese, Bishop's conferences and ultimately the Synod of World Bishops.

Next Monthly Family Faith Formation

Sunday, March 20th after the 10:00am Mass in the Parish Hall

Our parish no longer conducts a weekly CCD, classroom model of Religious Education. Instead, the whole family comes together after Sunday Mass from 11am to 1pm to learn about our Catholic faith. They join with other families to break open God's Word and then to learn this month, about Making Good Choices and Holy Week. Each age group goes into an age-appropriate break out session and comes back together to share pizza and conclude out learning. This is now one process for First Communion Prep, Confirmation Prep and annual religious education. What happens to our faith in the home matters! Join us!

1st Sunday of Lent March 6, 2022

One of the greatest temptations human beings face is leaving the truth of who they are, where they came from and who created them in pursuit of more personal satisfactions. When we consider all that desires our attention in a given day, there are many lures that attract us to illusions about ourselves. We can easily find ourselves distracted or tired, preoccupied with preserving our status in life, social relationships, current trends, and corporate demands, and intrigued by pursuing what we perceive to be the "path of least resistance." The daily concerns of life can quickly take our eyes off of our truth, making the empty promises of worldly accomplishments and ideologies seem so attractive. What is at risk in giving into this temptation?

We cease giving thanks to and worshiping our Creator as we pursue our own self-sufficiency, power, and prestige. We replace the true God with a "pet" one. While many do not totally dismiss the idea of God and pretend to remain at least remotely connected, they do not invest themselves heart, mind, and soul in the relationship either. That is why we are so easily swayed. If something attractive comes along, we lunge for it. After all, having a position above and over everyone else is a good thing, isn't it? In more honest moments, many have to admit that they believe this to be true. The Evil One is very convincing. But he can only gain control if we allow him to.

About temptation, St. Basil remarks, "As the pilot of a vessel is tried in the storm, as the wrestler is tried in the ring, the soldier in the battle and the hero in adversity, so is the Christian tried in temptation." And here is the reason for Lent. It is a wonderful opportunity to get a handle on the attractive lures of illusion that easily captivate us and bring us off track. It is also a time for some honest reflection rooted in prayer, fasting, and selfless giving that can bring us to temptation's remedy: love. Love of his Father gave Jesus resistance. It can do the same for us.

2nd Sunday of Lent March 13, 2022

There is so much wisdom in the first commandment. The daily demands of life, current political ideologies and dynamics, social expectations, corporate philosophies, and even technology can easily become lesser gods. We can find ourselves beholden to and held captive by these secular constructs and systems. Even for those who profess a faith in the one true God, these lesser, attractive but false gods are a temptation. Being overly preoccupied and even obsessed with the state of our present lives, we lose sight of our real destiny and purpose.

Jesus showed his disciples a glimpse of this destiny when he was transfigured before their eyes. In fact, Peter was so caught up in the brilliance, awe, and sacredness of these fleeting moments that he wanted to extend them as long as possible. Wonderful things happen when we leave our illusions and discover something that is true. This is why creating some sacred space in our lives for reflection, prayer, renewal, refreshment, centering ourselves, and disconnecting from the noise is so important. It shows us how false and shallow our lives can be and what is really of importance. Do you create some kind of sacred space in your life? Lent is a perfect time to do so.

St. Irenaeus, one of the early fathers and martyrs of the Catholic Church, said that, "he who was the Son of God became the Son of Man that man ... might become the son of God." We mistakenly believe that life is all about us. It's not. Ours is a journey of transformation in which we become more and more one with the mind of Christ and Christ himself. St. Augustine saw this same transformation occurring when the Eucharist was received. In receiving the Eucharist, we become what we eat, the Body of Christ. Honestly acknowledging false gods that we cling to can open the door for God to show us the wholeness and holiness to which we are called. Take time to discover the sacred. When we do, we will want to stay there for a while. Then, when we return to our personal affairs, we will see more clearly.
