

PRAY THE ROSARY

The Rosary prayed to Mary is a powerful prayer as Mary intercedes for each of us. Her Son never denies His mother. The month of October is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. The practice of dedicating the entire month of October to the Holy Rosary developed toward the end of the last century. Pope Leo XIII (papacy: 1878 -1903) strongly promoted the increase of devotion to the Blessed Mother by encouraging the constant use of the Rosary. This Tuesday, the Rosary is prayed at Sacred Heart following the 9 AM Mass. The intention

this week is for those affected by natural disasters. Spend just twenty minutes praying the rosary. Your prayers will always be heard.

Our Mass Intention Book for 2022 is open for those wishing to schedule Mass Intentions for family members, loved ones, or special intentions. The practice of offering Mass for particular intentions is an ancient one, dating back to the early Church. Inscriptions discovered on tombs in Roman catacombs of the second century give evidence for this practice. When a priest celebrates Mass, he offers each celebration of the Eucharist for a particular person, or intention (living or deceased). By so doing, special graces from the Eucharistic Sacrifice of Our Lord are applied upon that person or intention. Mass offerings are \$20 for a Sunday Mass and \$15 for a weekday Mass.

THE TABERNACLE

For Catholics, the Tabernacle is the receptacle in which the Eucharistic bread is kept, outside of Mass. The practice began so that Communion could be taken to the sick and the dying who couldn't come to Mass.

"Tabernacle" comes from the Latin word that means small tent, hut or similar

structure. Thus, it is the place where Christ is present in the Blessed Sacrament. The early Christians did not use a Tabernacle. It was because they believed Jesus was in the consecrated bread and wine only when the community was gathered together. During the Middle Ages, there was no designated container in which the Blessed Sacrament was kept. But the Fourth Lateran Council (1215) determined that the consecrated Hosts should be kept in a secure receptacle. The result was Tabernacle. "Be what you see; receive what you are". (St. Augustine)

ALL SOULS

The Church commemorates all the Faith Departed. The reason for the commemoration of all the Faithful Departed is the doctrine and belief that all who die in venial sin, or have not fully atoned for other past transgressions, are detained in Purgatory, and that the faithful on earth can help them through their temporal punishment and hasten their admission to the joys of heaven by prayers and alms, especially by the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The memorial day of the dead comes down to us from the first Christians, and, in the course of centuries, e annual commemoration of all the Faithful Departed in

November 2 was selected for the annual commemoration of all the Faithful Departed in churches of the Latin rite. "Eternal rest grant to them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace." Since it is impossible to offer a Mass for the particular intention or intentions of each individual on All Souls' Day or during the month of November, in many dioceses of the United States and other countries there is a custom by which Masses are offered on All Souls' Day for the intentions of all the people.

Throughout the month of November, those who have gone before us blessed with the sign of our faith will be remembered at all Masses. If you would like to include a loved one, family member, or friend, please write the names on the back of the ALL SOULS' ENVELOPE found at the entrance of each worship site. They may be placed in any collection basket.

TODAY'S GOSPEL REFLECTION



When we see God with true sincerity of heart and God passes us along our way, it is only then that we will be able to cry out, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me!" We have to truly want to be healed by, and in union with, God in order for us to reach out to Him. If God is only an ab-

stract idea, theory, or someone found in the pages of a book, there is no motivation for a relationship and no desire to seek Him. God needs to be real in order for faith to be real. It's all

about the journey.

St. Augustine reminds us that "to fall in love with God is the greatest romance; to seek Him the greatest adventure; to find Him the greatest human achievement." We strive after many things and mercy is not always one of them. We think that we can find fulfillment and healing in other things only to discover that we are still short and empty. From the moment human beings were created, God has been calling us and seeking us. He has been walking right beside the human story from the minute He first breathed life into the first human soul. Are we able to recognize God as He walks with us? At some point we have to realize that there is only one way to satisfy the deepest longings of the human heart and that is in relationship with our Creator. We are called to this. However, we make the huge error of thinking that what we are hearing is coming from somewhere else. We become confused. Every human being would certainly profit with wisdom if they realized Who calls them and to Whom they belong.

Then and only then will we realize that it is only our Divine Master who can give us true vision and heal us. Once we recognize and reach out for the merciful presence of our loving Maker, we will be able to see with our soul, understanding the true nature and depth of all things. God's mercy is always available. It doesn't matter how far we have strayed or how blind we become, God patiently waits to console us, guide us and heal us. All we need to do is desire Him. Once we reach out, we also realize that there is no greater love to be found than God's, no human adventure that comes even close to the thrill of a spiritual search, and no human achievement even remotely as satisfying as union with Him. This is where we belong. This is salvation.

SAINTS SIMON AND JUDE'S STORY

Jude is so named by Luke and Acts. Matthew and Mark call him Thaddeus. He is not mentioned elsewhere in the Gospels, except of course where all the apostles are mentioned. Scholars hold that he is not the author of the Letter of Jude. Actually,

Jude had the same name as Judas Iscariot. Evidently because of the disgrace of that name, it was shortened to "Jude" in English.

Simon is mentioned on all four lists of the apostles. On two of them he is called "the Zealot." The Zealots were a Jewish sect that represented an extreme of Jewish nationalism. For them, the messianic promise of the Old Testament meant that the Jews were to be a free and independent nation. God alone was their king, and any payment of taxes to the Romans—the very domination of the Romans—was a blasphemy against God. No doubt some of the Zealots were the spiritual heirs of the Maccabees, carrying on their ideals of religion and independence. But many were the counterparts of modern terrorists. They raided and killed, attacking both foreigners and "collaborating" Jews. They were chiefly responsible for the rebellion against Rome which ended in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70.



Jesus was called to break boundaries and take God's message of salvation to unexpected people and unexpected places. Through our baptism we are called to be prophets for the Kingdom of God. We will encounter many reactions from those to whom we are sent, not all of them positive. Unswerving dedication, bold courage, and deep biblical hope must be our trademarks.

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
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
