





THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY

On the spiritual Feast of the Epiphany, we remember those mysterious figures from the East who visited the Holy Family. They have long been the subject of stories and legends. Early on, they were looked upon as royal figures. This may have been suggested by Psalm 72: "The Kings of Arabia and Sheba shall bring tribute: all kings shall pay Him homage". There is no indication that the Magi were kings, but we do believe that they came from afar, from distant pagan lands. And they came to praise the Lord.

Today's first reading emphasizes that Jesus didn't just come for His immediate community, but He came for everyone. That means we can look at anyone and say: "Jesus came for this person, and He would have come if this were the only person in the world. Jesus loves this person." This person is you.





4 DAILY HABITS TO KEEP YOUR FAITH ALIVE

MORNING OFFERING: By praying a morning offering you dedicate the rest of the day to God, which then prepares you to tackle anything that comes at you during the day.

NIGHTLY EXAMINATION: This is important and it helps prepare you for your next confession. It is healthy to

examine your faults and failings and to ask God's help to overcome them.

MENTAL PRAYER (15 MINUTES): It consists of a "heart-to-heart" with God and leaving time for talking and listening. God is extremely interested in what is going on in your life.

SPIRITUAL READING (15 MINUTES): One way to do this is to read the Gospel reading for today and then find a spiritual book that will help you grow in your relationship with God.



The red-breasted robin is a lovely symbol of Christmas. The story is told is that Joseph built a fire in the manger to keep Mary and Jesus warm, but the flames kept dying. A robin fanned them with its wings so that the fire wouldn't die, and his proximity to the fire turned his breast red.

It's also said that a robin landed on the shoulder of Jesus as He carried the Cross on Good Friday. When the bird plucked thorns from His brow, the bird's breast was stained forever with His Blood.

Joy - because we have a Savior, hope - because our world can become better, happiness - because He has chosen me to bring Him to others.

We bring an awareness that this Jesus comes again and wishes to accompany us in this new year. He can't wait for us to get started. We can choose this route, or just simply take the decorations and put them away to gather dust for another year. The choice is quite clear. "They departed for their own country by another way."

THOUGHTS ON THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

In his Apostolic Exhortation, "The Joy of the Gospel", Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.



THE MOST HOLY NAME **OF JESUS**

Although Saint Paul might claim credit for promoting devotion to the Holy Name because Paul wrote in Philippians that God the Father gave Christ Jesus "that name that is above every name" (see 2:9), this devotion became popular because of 12th-

century Cistercian monks and nuns but especially through the preaching of Saint Bernardine of Siena, a 15th-century Franciscan.

Bernardine used devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus as a way of overcoming bitter and often bloody class struggles and family rivalries or vendettas in Italian citystates. The devotion grew, partly because of Franciscan and Dominican preachers. It spread even more widely after the Jesuits began promoting it in the 16th century.

In 1530, Pope Clement V approved an Office of the Holy Name for the Franciscans. In 1721, Pope Innocent XIII extended this feast to the entire Church.

Jesus died and rose for the sake of all people. No one can trademark or copyright Jesus' name. Jesus is the Son of God and Son of Mary. Everything that exists was created in and through the Son of God (see Colossians 1:15-20). The name of Jesus is debased if any Christian uses it as justification for berating others. Jesus reminds us that because we are all related to Him we are, therefore, all related to one another. We celebrate the Holy Name of Jesus this Monday, Jan. 3rd.



WHAT HAPPENS TO A CONSECRATED **HOST IF IT ACCIDENTALLY FALLS TO** THE GROUND?

Answer: This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated Host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated Host or any consecrated

wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of Holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped Host and consume It. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators, if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).



The visit of the Magi was prophesied in the Old Testament. "The kings of Tarshish and the Islands shall offer gifts, the kings of Arabia and Seba shall bring tribute. All kings shall pay Him homage, all nations shall serve Him" (Psalm 72:10-11). "Caravans of camels shall fill

you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the

Lord. "(Isaiah 60:6).

St. Matthew recorded that they brought three gifts: Gold – the gift for a king, Frankincense – the gift for a priest, and Myrrh – a burial ointment. The kings witnessed to the presence of the Messiah on Earth, and the fulfillment of God's promise of a Savior. Christmas is our reminder that God is always faithful. Christmas is our epiphany into God's eternal love.



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
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
