Sacraments:

Baptism: Arrangements must be made in advance. Please call the Parish Office to arrange a date and supply pertinent information. Individual Baptismal preparation is required.

Sponsors: must receive from their respective Catholic pastors a "sponsor certificate," which is the signed word of one priest to another that the proposed godparent is a Confirmed, fully-practicing Catholic who is qualified to be a godparent by living in harmony with our faith.

First Eucharist & Confirmation: Preparation – two years prior to receiving each Sacrament is mandatory as a registered student in the Faith Formation Program.

Matrimony: Couples are asked to consult with our priest at least six months in advance of the intended date to allow time for marriage preparation, including the Diocesan Program.

Ministry to the Sick: Please notify us if someone you know is homebound and would like to be added to our Communion call list, or would like to receive the Sacrament of the Sick.

Low gluten hosts available: Please let us know before Mass if you have a need to receive this type of host.

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The miracle of an abundance of food around the time of Passover comes to us twice this week, both in the Second Book of Kings and the Gospel of John. We will be reading from John for the next several weeks, celebrating the 'bread of life' discourse, for which this miracle sets the scene. John makes the mention of the time of year explicit, but the miracle of Elisha does it by saying that the loaves were of the first fruits of the barley harvest. Passover was, in part, a feast of the barley harvest. In this way John invokes the miracle of Elisha, who was the disciple and successor of Elijah, the prophet who was to return at the end of time. The miracle in the Gospel is therefore another sign of the arrival of the kingdom of God today, the end times. The psalm supports the image of God as the source of all the food we eat.

The second reading is Paul's call to unity for the Ephesians. While it is less well known than the passage in first Corinthians, it is a beautiful meditation on how unity and right living is required not as a something we need to live in order to gain God's favor, but something we live because we have already been loved and called by God. The gift of God's love fills our lives, and so we respond by living in God.

MESSAGE FROM FR. HAMEL

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This weekend in the second book of Kings, the prophet Elisha (uh-LEE-sha), not to be confused with his mentor the prophet Elijah (uh-LIE-jah), gives a preview of Jesus' multiplication of the loaves and fishes which we see this weekend in the gospel of St. John. In Elisha's case, there were twenty barley loaves put before the people to eat, and all those present, who were many, ate their fill and had plenty left over. Elisha puts these words forward as coming from the Lord: "For thus says the Lord, 'They shall eat and there shall be some left over.'" And obviously, there was!

Jesus, as a test to St. Philip, basically asks the same question that Elisha asked his disciple. In both cases, the question of feeding so many with so little is met with more than a healthy dose of skepticism! Physically, it is impossible to feed so many with so little! It cannot be done. It is impossible! Period! ... and yet we constantly see in the scriptures that with God, all things are possible, even those things that are beyond the ability of us mere mortals. The love of God and the power of God transcend time and space and the physical realities of this world since God is the creator of all things! Because we are a people of the New Covenant, we want to concern ourselves this weekend with the actions of Jesus.

Scripture scholars have not always agreed on just what transpired on the side of the mountain (actually a big hill) on the northern edge of the Sea of Galilee. Did loaves and fishes miraculously start to multiply as the gospel suggests? Some say yes, while others are not quite so quick to accept it. Because we know that Jesus is one with the Father and the Holy Spirit, it goes without question that a literal acceptance of the gospel narrative is a very real possibility. Jesus is the Christ, which means Jesus is God, and with God all things are possible.

The alternate scenario that some scholars put forward is a bit different. Other versions of this scene in the other gospels put the number of "men" somewhere in the vicinity of five hundred. Regardless of the exact number, the crowd that came to listen to Jesus was especially large. That we can safely conclude! Can we also conclude that all of them, who were familiar with the remoteness of the area and who were used to traveling distances of foot, were also all too stupid to bring anything along to eat? Who knows? But some scholars suspect that most of them DID have food with them but were reluctant to share it with others. But once they saw the example of Jesus and having just been listening to him teach the beatitudes, they not only opened their hearts to those around them, but also their lunch baskets! Were that the case, the miracle would be the healing of hearts that leads people to be generous. So, is this what actually happened? Who knows? We will find out when we get to heaven and probably not before. But in all honesty, it does not really matter.

Either of the above scenarios have a great deal to teach us, and it is probably for that reason that the questions have been raised in the minds of disciples. In the first, we recognize that all things are possible with God. The question that constantly faces us is: Do you believe? Do we as disciples really believe that God always hears and answers our prayer, even if the answer isn't what we asked for or even wanted? Do we trust that God loves us with a perfect love and because of that won't ever let sin prevail over us to such an extent that our salvation with be lost? Do we believe that Jesus has already prepared a place for us specifically as individuals and that we will in fact inherit that place in heaven when we die regardless of how much or how little we die with? If the answer to the above is a solid "yes, I believe" then it has to have a significant impact on the way that we live, the way that we pray, the way that we worship and the way that we view God's creation, especially his creation in the many and different people of the world. Because if we believe in God, then we believe that God is love and that we have no choice to make in living out our discipleship then to constantly strive to love God as perfectly as we can, and to reverence his work of creation in its almost infinite manifestations!

The second scenario of people who were hoping not to share, changing their minds, and sharing with those who might have had less or perhaps nothing at all, also teaches us a valuable lesson in discipleship.

As twenty-first century Westerners who happen to live on the south coast of New England, most of us live lives that are for the most part at least halfway comfortable. While none of us has the wealth of the Queen of England, or Elon Musk, or some other fabulously wealthy individual, and none of us has the fortune of a "king's ransom" tucked away in a sub-basement of our homes, we have to admit that for us as Americans, life is pretty good. We have a roof over our head, we have food on the table, we have clothes on our backs, and if we are honest, we have luxuries that in some parts of the world are only attainable in people's dreams ... you know what I am talking about hopefully. We have clean water at our fingertips. We have edible food in abundance. We have centers of medicine within our areas. We have all types of electronics that make life easier. We have sanitation and cleaning facilities right within our own homes. We are mobile and have the means to travel distances short or long. Most of us also have some degree of "expendable" income for things that are not exactly life's necessities, but conveniences and pleasures that will not cause our deaths if we are deprived of them. So then, how does the second scenario of the loaves and fishes relate to us??? Do we hope not to be asked to share so that we can keep more for ourselves? Are we likely to hold off being generous so that we can first see what others are doing... you know... so that we do not have to overdo it with our "generosity"?

In St. Matthews gospel (Mt 10:7-15) Jesus sends the Apostles out to preach the Kingdom of God. He tells them that "without cost you have received; without cost you are to give." It is a tall order if we are to be honest. But if we honestly believe in God, and believe that he is involved in our lives, then we have to recognize that we would be nothing and we would have nothing if not for God. Why we have some and others have nothing is a mystery that will not be explained fully until we enter heaven. But despite our sometimes "faithless" belief that all that we have has more to do with us and our work than it does with God, the reality is that we would have nothing if not for God allowing it. And if we look at our lives from that perspective of discipleship, then the consequences demand the opening of a generous heart to give our very best first to God, and then not only of our surplus but of our means to those who have so little. So, this miracle of loaves and fishes really does have implications for our own lives, because if we really, really believe, then our lives have to give witness to it! And yes ... there is a cost. But if without cost we have received, then we are only giving back to God in others what was first given to us by a loving and generous God in whose image we and all others have been created.
