St. Paul, named Saul at his circumcision, a Jew of the tribe of Benjamin, was born at Tarsus, the capitol of Cilicia. He was a Roman citizen. He was brought up as a strict Jew, and later became a violent persecutor of the Christians. While on his way to Damascus to make new arrests of Christians, he was suddenly converted by a miraculous apparition of Our Lord. From a fierce

persecutor he became the great Apostle of the Gentiles. He made three missionary journeys which brought him to the great centers of Asia Minor and southern Europe, and made many converts. Fourteen of his Epistles are found in the New Testament. He was beheaded in Rome in 66, and his body is kept in the Basilica of St. Paul near the Ostian Way.

January is The Month of the Holy Name of Jesus

In <u>Philippians 2</u>, Saint Paul tells us that "At the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord." From the earliest days of Christianity, Christians have known the great power of Jesus' Holy Name. As the once-popular hymn commanded:



The Most Holy Name of Jesus

All hail the power of Jesus' Name! Let angels prostrate fall; Bring forth the royal diadem, And crown Him Lord of all.

Small wonder, then, that the Church sets aside the first month of the year in honor of the Holy Name of Jesus. Through this devotion, the Church reminds us of the power of Christ's Name and encourages us to pray in His Name. In our society, of course, we hear His Name uttered quite often, but all too frequently, it is used in a curse or blasphemy. In the past, Christians would often make the <u>Sign of the Cross</u> when they heard Christ's Name uttered in such a manner, and that's a practice that would be worthwhile to revive. Another good practice that we could take to heart during this Month of the Holy Name of Jesus is the recitation of the <u>Jesus Prayer</u>. This prayer is as popular among Eastern Christians, both Catholic and Orthodox, as the <u>rosary</u> is among Roman Catholics, but it's not well known in the West.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner!

This month, why not take a few minutes to memorize the Jesus Prayer, and pray it during those moments of the day when you are between activities or traveling or simply taking a rest? Keeping Christ's Name always on our lips is a good way to ensure that we draw ever nearer to Him.

From the Director's Desk January 23rd, 2022

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153) taught many to govern with prudence. Just about every time I met with Father Terry O'Connell before he died, he told me how the shrine of St. Joseph the Worker had good Oblates to steer the ship to shore. These Oblates acted with prudence.

St. Bernard states that there are 3 stages to prudence; deliberation, decision, execution.

Deliberation is based on reflection, advice asked, and careful examination. 4 eyes see better than 2. Here at the Shrine, there are 8 eyes with Fathers Conserva, Meyer and Tremblay and me.

Decision is choosing what action to take. Prudence is not vacillation, that is, not making a choice. Prudence is making a sure choice. Execution is the most important of the 3 stages. Execution, carried out without discouragement, if things don't go as well as planned.

Not everyone will agree with the way we execute our plans. Our Savior fled when people wanted to make him king. On the Sunday before he died, he entered Jerusalem as king; riding on a donkey. Jesus masterfully practiced prudence. The French press did not, when it came to Napoleon.

The French did not practice prudence when it came to Napoleon. In 1815, he escaped from Elba, his place of exile. Here are how the French newspapers described his activities: "The bandit has escaped from the Island of Elba." "The usurper has reached Grenoble." "Napoleon enters Lyons." "The Emperor reaches Paris this evening." These are not examples of prudence. As always, Jesus Christ practiced prudence perfectly. May we be, as Father O'Connell said, "Good Oblates to steer the ship of the Shrine to safe harbors."
