READING

Baptism of the Lord

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"Here is my servant whom I uphold." (Is 42:1)

Question of the Week In what ways may the ordinary things you do really be a ministry?

HIS WORD TODAY

The Christmas season closes with the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This is not the end of things, but rather the beginning. The readings remind us that the one born of our flesh is the servant of God—the very Son of God—who brings a promise of justice and hope to a world in desperate need. John's baptism was "for the repentance of sins." We might wonder why the sinless Jesus would submit himself to it. Commentators maintain that Jesus' baptism was for him a kind of ritual entry into his ministry. To this God gave divine approval: "I am well pleased."


According to Isaiah, the ministry is concerned with justice for all and tenderness toward those who have been broken. According to Acts, the disciples of Jesus widen the scope of that ministry to include the household of the Gentile Cornelius. That same ministry, with the same divine approval, has now been given to us. Our own baptism brought us into the circle of the children of God and commissioned us to continue the work begun by Jesus. And what might this entail?

We live in a time of great unrest. The world seems poised on the brink of chaos; businesses and individuals face financial instability; the turmoil within the church threatens its longstanding foundation. No one is untouched by some form of the chaos that threatens to swallow us alive. Where can we turn when the institutions meant to give refuge from chaos are themselves the source of its threat?

In the Bible, chaos is frequently portrayed as unruly water threatening to wipe out every living thing (for example, the flood in Genesis). Today's psalm reminds us in no uncertain terms: "The Lord is enthroned above the flood." It assures us that God rules over the chaos in which we find ourselves. The response invites us to trust in God; Isaiah offers us a plan for restoring order; Acts challenges us to continue the work of Jesus. As he came forth from the waters of the Jordan, his life took a new direction. As his followers, we emerge from the waters of baptism as new people, who with God's help are willing to counter the chaos of our world.

On this day we do not look back to Christmas, but forward to the task ahead, trusting that some day it may be said of us, "Here is my servant whom I uphold." The Covid pandemic crisis is urgent, and we all feel powerless. But perhaps feeling small is the best reminder to pray. Prayer is how we actively practice believing, so simply, so confidently, that God has the whole world in his hands. It's where we "let petitions and praises shape our worries into prayers, letting God know our concerns (Phil. 4:6–7). Prayer is never the last resort of God's people. It is our first point of action. These "Little prayers" are helpful and can be said throughout the day:

- For the sick and infected: God, heal and sustain bodies and spirits. Contain the spread of infection.
- For our vulnerable populations: God, protect our elderly and those suffering from chronic disease. Provide for the poor especially the uninsured.
- For the young and the strong: God, give them the necessary caution to keep them from unwittingly spreading disease. Inspire them to help.
- For all local, state and federal governments: God, help our elected officials as they allocate the necessary resources for combatting this pandemic. Help them to provide more tests.
- For our scientific community, leading the charge to understand the disease and communicate its gravity: God, give them knowledge, wisdom and a persuasive voice.
- For the media, committed to providing up-to-date information: God, help them to communicate with appropriate seriousness without causing panic.
- For consumers of media, looking to be well-informed: God, help us find the most helpful local information to equip us to be good neighbors, Keep us from anxiety and panic and enable us to implement the recommended strategies ,even at a cost to ourselves.
- For those with mental health challenges, who feel ,anxious and helplessness: God provide them every necessary support
- For the homeless, unable to practice the protocols of social distancing in the shelter system: God, protect them from disease and provide isolation centers in every city.
- For international travelers stuck in foreign countries and away from home: God, help them return home safely and quickly.


