



Gospel Meditation

The Most Body and Blood of Christ



As our world faces so much turmoil and change, it is now more important than ever to remember who God is, who we are, and where we are going. It is easy to get distracted and lose focus, especially when we are being pulled in so many directions. We can not only lose sight of God but one another. Maintaining our well developed and mature relationships with God and one another is essential to continuing to live, healthy, happy and focused lives. In a message to young people, Pope Benedict XVI said “the happiness you are seeking, the happiness you have a right to enjoy has a name and a face: it is Jesus of Nazareth, hidden in the Eucharist”. What is true for those who are younger is even truer for those who are older. Regardless of how the particulars of life change over time, human beings are still hardwired to seek the fullness of life and happiness. How we embark on this journey, and what we choose along the way, will indicate whether we meet success.

There is brokenness and pain in our world. Many people are lost, lonely, anxious, marginalized, victimized, isolated, oppressed and abused. Every time we receive the Body of Christ, we have an opportunity to become what we eat. The power and presence of Christ in the Eucharist becomes present in us, and effects change in ourselves and in the lives of those we meet. We are given the grace to become temples of justice and peace, carrying God's sacred presence within us wherever we go. Our faith community is ignited with the fire of God's love, and stands out as a beacon of hope in a world that is lost. This is the only way we can discover peace-filled resolutions to violence, and create innovative solutions to what is fueling its

need in the first place. True happiness, for the young and old alike, becomes an obtainable goal.

St John Maria Vianney said "there is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, he would have given it to us." Only the Eucharist has the ability to connect, sustain, strengthen and properly orient us, not only on the road of this life, but the road to life eternal. Knowing this, when life gets challenging, unsettling, and difficult, we can rely on and cling to this gift we have in the real presence of Christ. This actual encounter with God celebrates his unconditional love for us, and grounds us to the truth of who we are in a way nothing else can. Through the Eucharist, we become the Body of Christ, and thus are bonded together in a perfect way to one another. United and strengthened by the Eucharist, let us bring this wonderful gift to all we meet, especially the poor with whom we have a special connection. ©LPi

Totus Tuus 2021

We are very excited to host the Totus Tuus summer camp for our youth again this year. As the program is only three weeks away now, we need a few volunteers to help make it a wonderful week for our children. Totus Tuus tries to involve the whole parish community and is a wonderful opportunity for us to do something for the next generation of faith.

Specifically, the parish needs to provide meals for the team who put on the program. Many will remember that in years past, the team went to people's homes for dinner, but that will not be possible this year. Rather than eating in family homes, we are asking families to deliver meals (for four people) to the parish, or provide financial assistance for our team's dinners. Meals are needed for Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights. We also need volunteers to bring the team lunch every day (Monday to Friday). These are simple bag-lunch affairs.

We are also looking for a few people to be present and help facilitate the cookie and lunch breaks. Adults who would like to volunteer one or more days between 9:30 am and 2 pm would be most helpful! Anyone present during the program with the children must be safe-environment trained and backgrounded through the diocesan office before volunteering. Most important from the kids' perspective, we welcome any and all cookie donations for their daily cookie break!

Finally, even if you cannot volunteer in any of these ways, please pray for the success of the program, and for the children to be led to Christ and his Church.

And from our pastor ...

Dear friends and parishioners,

This week I preached at the annual diocesan jubilarian Mass for priests, at which we honor priests with special anniversaries. I was scheduled to preach last year at my 25th anniversary. That Mass was canceled due to the pandemic. I was invited back this year. Below is a synopsis of my homily.

[My brother priests] ... have you ever thought about how many candles you have lit as priests? Think about it — we light candles all the time. Our sanctuary lamps and altar candles illuminate our sanctuaries for the Eucharist. Candles illuminate our statues. We light Advent wreath candles to signify that our Savior Jesus Christ is nigh upon us. We stand with couples as they light unity candles at weddings, and we see the eyes of a newborn widen at the sight of a newly lit baptismal candle. From a newly blessed fire, we light the paschal candle at the Easter Vigil. We walk with it through a darkened church to signify that Christ will pierce the darkness of sin and suffering. He is the Lord of hope!

Two of these candles especially strike me as significant. The first is the baptismal candle. "Receive the light of Christ" we say to parents and godparents as we hand that candle to them. "This light is entrusted to you to be kept burning brightly, so that your child, enlightened by Christ, may walk always as a child of the light." At baptism, in the person of Christ, we start that marvelous journey for the newly baptized, who is now a child of God. Lit from the paschal candle, the baptismal candle signifies that the child is now sealed forever as a child of God. It is through us that Christ works in baptism. We are bearers of Christ's light, represented by that candle. We stand with families in the beginning of the journey of faith.

As priests, we point to the baptismal candle of hope in other ways. When we teach our youth or adults, we remind them of the candle and what it signifies. With the generosity of Christ, we give a bag of food to the hungry, pay an electric bill for a poor person, or help find housing for the homeless. We do so because the light we received at baptism shines brightly in our hearts. When we comfort or console another person, we remind them of God's love and presence in their lives. And at funerals, we point out the paschal candle towering over the coffin or urn. Hope, not death, will have the final say.

The other candle of great significance is the sanctuary lamp. It is for us to keep that light burning, to be sure the tabernacle contains the Eucharist, the Body of Christ. Our people look for that candle when they come into our churches, genuflect in its direction, and pray before it. It is our ministry as priests to make the Eucharist available for our people. In our celebration of the Eucharist, we priests are icons through which the people may see Christ, the one for whom they hunger, the beacon of hope.

All the candles we light and carry are but symbols of our work. It is our ministry, our calling, to lead others to Christ, to the light. Our people need the hope, healing and light of Christ, which comes through our hands, our lit candles. As a candle gives off light and heat, so our people seek warmth and comfort of hope, of God's presence, symbolized by these candles.

My brothers, we are exiting a pandemic none of us were ready for. At this point, we have two choices. One is despair. The other is to carry a candle — the candle of hope — Jesus Christ. Despair ends in death. Hope takes us to the bosom of Christ. I choose Christ; I hope you do too. Let's light our candles with great joy, passion and zeal. Let's be apostles of hope.

Bishop to ordain a priest and a transitional deacon

Two men are scheduled to be ordained this year — one to the priesthood and one to the transitional diaconate.

Burlington Bishop Christopher Coyne will ordain Deacon Robert Murphy a priest and seminarian Gregory Caldwell a deacon preparing for priesthood at a special Mass on Saturday, June 19, at 10 a.m. at St. Joseph Cathedral in Burlington.

The bishop will place his hands on the head of the candidate for priestly ordination, and through this Laying of Hands and the Prayer of Ordination, the Gift of the Holy Spirit for the priestly office will be conferred on the candidate for priesthood who will receive the stole and chasuble, signs of the office of the ministerial priesthood.

Deacon Murphy graduated from Mount Anthony Union High School Bennington in 2013 then attended Providence College where he earned a bachelor's degree in philosophy in 2017.

He first felt the calling to the priesthood in elementary school. "I was open to the call and desired to do God's will for my life," he said. He chose to study for the Diocese of Burlington because it is his home Diocese, and he felt called to serve the people of Vermont.

"There have been many great priests in Vermont who have inspired me in my discernment of the priesthood," he said.

Caldwell, who graduated from Essex High School in 2008, earned a Master of Arts in Catholic philosophical studies from St. Meinrad Seminary in St. Meinrad, Indiana. He was received into full communion with the Church in 2013.

He has said he hopes to bring to the priesthood an ability to "teach in a way that can reach people," an ability to show people how to live their faith and the willingness to bring the sacraments to the people of the Diocese of Burlington.


Deacon Murphy advises men who are contemplating priesthood to focus on growing in holiness — especially through daily prayer — and striving to grow in virtue. "I believe that if they are open and seeking to do God's will, God will lead them to their vocation and give them what they need to live it well," he said.

The ordination will be a special time for clergy to meet in a spirit of fraternity and camaraderie.

Due to the seating capacity restrictions, attendance at the Mass will be by invitation only to allow for the priests of the diocese, Robert and Greg's family and friends, and members of their home parishes to attend. 


