BAPTISM (F.A.Q.)

I. What is baptism?

Baptism comes from the Greek word *baptizein*, which means to "plunge" or "immerse"; the "plunge" into the water symbolizes the catechumen's burial into Christ's death, from



which he or she rises up by resurrection with him, as "a new creature."

2. Why is baptism important?

Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (*vitae spiritualis ianua*), and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as child of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission.

Our Lord Jesus Christ affirms that Baptism is necessary for salvation. He also commands his disciples to proclaim the Gospel to all nations and to baptize them. Baptism is necessary for salvation for those to whom the Gospel has been proclaimed and who have had the possibility of asking for this sacrament. Those who die for the faith, those who are catechumens, and all those who – without knowing of the Church but acting under the inspiration of grace – seek God sincerely and strive to fulfill his will, can be saved even if they have not been baptized. Furthermore, with respect to children who have died without Baptism, the liturgy of the Church invites us to trust in God's mercy.

4. Infant baptism - why do it?

Born with a fallen human nature and tainted by original sin, children also have need of the new birth in Baptism to be freed from the power of darkness and brought into the realm of the freedom of the children of God, to which all are called. The Church and the parents would deny a child the priceless grace of becoming a child of God were they not to confer Baptism shortly after birth. Moreover, **the practice of infant Baptism is an immemorial tradition of the Church**. There is explicit testimony to this practice from the second century on, and it is quite possible that, from the beginning of the apostolic preaching, when whole "households" received baptism, infants may also have been baptized.

5. Who can baptize?

The ordinary ministers of Baptism are the bishop and priest and, in the Latin Church, also the deacon. In case of necessity, any person (even a non-baptized) can baptize provided that he or she has the intention of doing that which the Church does and provided that he or she pours water on the candidate's head while saying: "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

6. What are the duties of the parents?

According to Canon 868 §1, for an infant to be baptized licitly, the parents or at least one of them or the person who legitimately takes their place must consent; and there must be a founded hope that the infant will be brought up in the Catholic religion. The parents are ultimately responsible for the upbringing of the child, including religious formation since they are the first educators of children.

7. Who can be godparents?

According to Canon 874 §1, to be permitted to take on the function of sponsor, a person must have completed the sixteenth year of age; be a Catholic who has been confirmed and has already received the most holy sacrament of the Eucharist and who leads a life of faith in keeping with the function to be taken on; not be bound by any canonical penalty legitimately imposed or declared; and not be the father or mother of the one to be baptized.

FROM YOUR SHEPHERD: PAX ET BONUM! Nov. Ryan Friedda Princeland author darg

It was on July 27, 1977, that I was baptized in Sacred Heart Church (not in Bushwood or La Plata but in Manila). I was not even a month old. I wish I knew what happened, but I do not recall this event. In fact, I do not even have pictures from the ceremony. All I have is a copy of my baptismal record (and my name was even misspelled). There were times when I wish I was baptized when I was older so I can remember what was going on. However, this would have meant growing up without the grace from God, including the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and I honestly do not want that. Thus, I'm happy that my parents fulfilled their Christian duties of baptizing me just a few weeks after my birthday.

Today, we celebrate the Baptism of our Lord. There was no need for him to be baptized but he underwent this act so we can live and die with him. Do we thank God for the graces and gifts that we have received when we were baptized? Do we even know the date of our baptism? Our baptism did not only take away our original sin. Our baptism also enabled us to share the priestly, prophetic, and kingly ministry of Christ. We are all priests, prophets, and kings by virtue of this sacrament. It does not mean that anybody can preside at the Eucharistic liturgy, however, but sharing the priestly office of Christ enables us to worship God. We participate by praying. Then, our sharing of the prophetic and kingly office of Christ enables us to preach the Good News and to lead the people of God.

Meanwhile, every time we bless ourselves with the holy water and make the sign of the cross, we renew our baptismal promises. It is correct that our baptism enabled us to be an adopted child of God. Nevertheless, we need to live our baptismal promises. It is not a free pass to do whatever we want, because being baptized means entering a covenant with God.

As we celebrate the Baptism of our Lord, let us reflect on our own baptism. Let us be thankful for the gifts of being part of the Body of Christ. At the same time, let us remember that being part of the Body of Christ should remind us to be conscientious of our actions and to reflect if we are faithful to the commandments.
