Gathering Hymn:

Go Make of All Disciples

First Reading:

Isaiah 66:18-21

Thus says the LORD: I know their works and their thoughts, and I come to gather nations of every language; they shall come and see my glory. I will set a sign among them; from them I will send fugitives to the nations: to Tarshish, Put and Lud, Mosoch, Tubal and Javan, to the distant coastlands that have never heard of my fame, or seen my glory; and they shall proclaim my glory among the nations. They shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations as an offering to the LORD, on horses and in chariots, in carts, upon mules and dromedaries, to Jerusalem, my holy mountain, says the LORD, just as the Israelites bring their offering to the house of the LORD in clean vessels. Some of these I will take as priests and Levites, says the LORD. Responsorial Psalm: "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News."

Second Reading: Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13

Brothers and sisters, You have forgotten the exhortation addressed to you as children: "My son, do not disdain the discipline of the Lord or lose heart when reproved by him; for whom the Lord loves, he disciplines; he scourges every son he acknowledges." Endure your trials as "discipline"; God treats you as sons. For what "son" is there whom his father does not discipline? At the time, all discipline seems a cause not for joy but for pain, yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it.

So strengthen your drooping hands and your weak knees. Make straight paths for your feet, that what is lame may not be disjointed but healed.

Gospel: Luke 13:22-30

Jesus passed through towns and villages, teaching as he went and making his way to Jerusalem. Someone asked him, "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" He answered them, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough. After the master of the house has arisen and locked the door, then will you stand outside knocking and saying, 'Lord, open the door for us.' He will say to you in reply, 'I do not know where you are from. And you will say, 'We ate and drank in your company and you taught in our streets.' Then he will say to you, 'I do not know where you are from. Depart from me, all you evildoers!' And there will be wailing and grinding of teeth when you see Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God and you yourselves cast out. And people will come from the east and the west and from the north and the south and will recline at table in the kingdom of God. For behold, some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last."

The Nicene Creed:

What is that???

The **Altar**, also known as the *Table of the Lord*, is placed in an area called the Sanctuary—the Holy Place—of the church. As in ancient times, the Altar is to be placed so everyone in the assembly can see it. It is a very old ancient practice to use the altar as a way to communicate to a god, especially to offer gifts to a god According to ther Bible, the very first altar for our God was built by Noah. He sacrificed perfect animals on it, as a way of thanking God for keeping Noah and his family safe from the flood. Over time, the Israelites continued to built altars and offer sacrifices, until finally they had just the one place to offer sacrifices to God, and that was the Temple in Jerusalem.

People were to bring their best animals or harvest and offer them to God.

Today we have a simple table for our altar, usually made of wood or marble. In our Eucharist, we re-live the sacrifice Jesus made for us—giving up his life, so we can have eternal life. We give thanks to God for doing this for us, by offering our gifts of the best grapes made into wine and the finest wheat made into bread. We also offer up ourselves, sacrificing ourselves and promising God that we will help him build the Kingdom of Heaven here on earth. God replies to our gifts by giving us the nourishment we need—the Body and Blood of Christ himself. With Jesus within us, there is nothing we cannot accomplish!




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
