

First Reading:

Amos 6:1a, 4-7

Thus says the LORD the God of hosts: Woe to the complacent in Zion! Lying upon beds of ivory, stretched comfortably on their couches, they eat lambs taken from the flock, and calves from the stall! Improvising to the music of the harp, like David, they devise their own accompaniment. They drink wine from bowls and anoint themselves with the best oils; yet they are not made ill by the collapse of Joseph! Therefore, now they shall be the first to go into exile, and their wanton revelry shall be done away with.

Second Reading:

But you, man of God, pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. Compete well for the faith. I charge you before God, who gives life to all things, and before Christ Jesus, who gave testimony under Pontius Pilate for the noble confession, to keep the commandment without stain or reproach until the appearance of our Lord Jesus Christ that the blessed and only ruler will make manifest at the proper time, the King of kings and Lord of lords, who alone has immortality, who dwells in unapproachable light, and whom no human being has seen or can see. To him be honor and eternal power. Amen.

Gospel:

Luke 16:19-31

Jesus said to the Pharisees: "There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even used to come and lick his sores. When the poor man died, he was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried, and from the netherworld, where he was in torment, he raised his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. And he cried out, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am suffering torment in these flames.' Abraham replied, 'My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. Moreover, between us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to go from our side to yours or from your side to ours.' He said, 'Then I beg you, father, send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may warn them, lest they too come to this place of torment.' But Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them.' He said, 'Oh no, father Abraham, but if someone from the dead goes to them, they will repent.' Then Abraham said, 'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead."

The Nicene Creed:

Hello there, Deacon Phil DiBello here!

I am happy to be on board as Director of Ministries for Father Mark for the Parish of St. Julia! I know that I have big shoes to fill, following in the footsteps of Colm and Andrea.

My wife, Deb Fergus, and I are long-time residents of Billerica, where we served in ministry for our 30+ years there. We have 5 adult children, two of whom are married, and are new grandparents. I grew up in a big Italian family on Staten Island, attending 12 years of Catholic School. Deb and I attended college at Dartmouth, but we were not active in our faith until we started to plan for our marriage.

Our road wound through Marriage Preparation, Baptism Preparation, Lectoring, RCIA, and Bible Sharing group leadership. In the late 1990's, I started to hear God's call to serve the people of God in a sacramental way, and started investigating becoming a Deacon. Thanks to Deacon Tom Mullins and Father Jack McCormick for their constant support, guiding me through the discernment process.

I was ordained in 2004, and was assigned to Saint Theresa (now St. Matthew) in Billerica, where I performed 500+ Baptisms and 35+ Weddings, as well as preached regularly, and met 1-1 with many parishioners.

I was diagnosed with Colon Cancer in 2011. After surgery and months of Chemotherapy, I returned to full strength at my High Tech day job, but, I felt a second call. I started considering whether God had more in store for me than managing software development projects. After about a year of discernment of God's will, Deb and I decided that we would heed God's call to enter full-time Ministry.

So, in March 2014, I said goodbye to high tech, and hello to a full-time role as Director of Ministry, Evangelization, and Faith Formation. I have not looked back.

Along the way, my passions for Scripture, and Scripture groups, as well as for training and forming Disciples has grown tremendously. It has led to a Youtube channel called "5 Minutes with Deacon Phil." Check it out.

I look forward to getting to know you all better as we work together in the vineyard of the Lord, here in Weston and Lincoln.

I will be speaking at all Masses this weekend. Please stop by to say hello.


