Gospel Reading**Mark 1:29-39**

A Reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of
Simon and Andrew with James and John. Simon's
mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They immediately
told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand,
and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she
waited on them. When it was evening, after sunset,
they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by
demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He
cured many who were sick with various diseases, and
he drove out many demons, not permitting them to
speak because they knew him.

Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to
a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those
who were with him pursued him and on finding him
said, "Everyone is looking for you." He told them,
"Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach
there also. For this purpose have I come." So he went
into their synagogues, preaching and driving out
demons throughout the whole of Galilee.

and his kingdom will have no end.


I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

Reflections on our Readings for The Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time

(Readings can be found on Page 2)



“Praise The Lord Who Heals The Broken Hearted” (Psalm 147)

Our readings this Sunday focus on the human condition of suffering, the healing power of God and our response to it.

In our first reading ([Job 7:1-4, 6-7](#)), we hear a portion of Job's lament of his suffering as he struggles to understand it and give it meaning. In a sense, Job mirrors all of human suffering. It is a lament that could easily be heard today by many of us who suffer.

In our Epistle reading ([1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23](#)), St. Paul give us his understanding of his mission to preach the Gospel. His is an obligation, given to him by Jesus himself. He gives of himself to all freely, without recompense, “to save at least some.” Paul gives us a model of how we are to live our life of service to the Lord.

In our Gospel reading ([Mark 1:29-39](#)), we hear of Jesus continuing with his public ministry in Galilee. Last week, we heard of Jesus the teacher and exorcist. This week, we hear of Jesus, the healer and one who prays to the Father in solitude. We hear of the suffering multitude flocking to Jesus for his healing touch and how Jesus responds as only God could respond. We hear about the tender moment of Jesus grasping the hand of Simon's sick mother-in-law. He helps (raises) her up. Her response to Jesus' healing touch is to get up and offer her service to the Lord.

Even in the midst of the drudgery of our lives and all of its suffering, we know that Jesus has already healed us of the ultimate human condition - the slavery to sin. By his sharing in our suffering, he has "raised us up" to new life through our Baptism. Our response, our obligation, is to get up and live our lives in service to the Lord and to others. In the words of Pope Francis, “*In virtue of their baptism, all the members of the people of God have become missionary disciples. All the baptized, whatever their position in the Church or their level of instruction in the faith, are agents of evangelization.*” ([Apostolic Exhortation: Evangelii Gaudium No. 120](#))

From the Desk of Deacon Jim . . .

As we celebrate Black History month, let us honor influential Black Catholics in our history. These are excerpts taken from the Our Sunday Visitor (OSV) Ministry website, Simply Catholic. Please pray and reflect upon this model of our faith. Enjoy!

Servant of God Mother Mary Lange, Michael R. Heinlein

Born Elizabeth Lange (c. 1784-1882). Likely born in Santiago de Cuba, she was known to be of African descent...Lange eventually settled in Baltimore...In that time, no free education existed for African American children in Maryland. Lange sensed the need and responded to it without hesitation and, along with her friend, Magdaleine Balas, she operated a free school out of her home. Financial difficulties eventually forced its closure.

In 1828, Lange was persuaded into further teaching by Sulpician Father James Joubert, who desired to start a school serving girls of color. Along with Balas, Lange readily accepted the challenge. Eventually, Father Joubert decided it would be best to inaugurate a women's congregation of religious sisters to operate the school. And with that, the Oblate Sisters of Providence became a reality...

At a time when slavery was still legal, and systemic racism permeated so many facets of society, these two virtuous Catholic women were waiting for God to present the opportunity for them to enter religious life. At the time, there was no convent willing to take women of color in the country.

At Joubert's invitation, Lange and three companions consecrated their lives and work to God as professed religious women. With Mother Mary Elizabeth Lange as the first superior, the Oblate Sisters of Providence were established in 1829 — the first successful congregation for African American women in the United States...the Oblate sisters persevered through great difficulties and offered their lives in service to all in need — especially to pupils, orphans and widows, the sick and those in spiritual need.

Mother Lange's solicitude for the less fortunate and marginalized knew no bounds. In 1832, when Baltimore was struck with a cholera epidemic, Lange and several other sisters offered to care for victims of the mysterious disease. And she bore her own difficulties with an abiding trust in God's will.

In her final years, Mother Lange patiently endured many hardships. They experienced Father Joubert's death in 1843, and his Sulpician community informed the sisters that it had no other priest to assign them... Light emerged from the darkness, however, when priests from the Redemptorist order took interest in the congregation and obtained the archbishop's permission to fill the void left by Father Joubert. Later, Jesuit priests helped direct the community.

Mother Mary Lange died on Feb. 3, 1882. A cause of canonization formally was opened in 1991, and her earthly remains were relocated to the motherhouse chapel of the Oblate Sisters of Providence in 2013.


