



Catholic Life Explained

Question: I get annoyed with myself when I am distracted while I pray. Is it a sin? How can I be more attentive?

Answer: The mind is a marvelous and complex thing, producing amazing thoughts, images, wisdom and inspiration. Yet at times it is like a two-year-old: it does not follow directions, does what it wants and loves to tell us "no!" This is probably the oldest and most common problem in the spiritual life-dealing with distraction. It comes in all forms: good intentions forgotten, wandering thoughts at Mass, daydreaming, etc. A little poem says it all: When the soul begins to pray, the brain always wants to play!

There are many ways to handle distractions. If we are distracted by thoughts about our families or friends, we should pray for them. If we lose our focus, we need just "re-collect" ourselves. If some worry or concern just won't leave our mind, then we deal with it and come back to prayer or make it part of our prayer. And when words just won't come, the only prayer we might offer is our presence, our suffering, and our desire to be close to the Lord. Most importantly, we need to be patient with ourselves. These things are not sinful, but reminders of our human frailty. Our weaknesses and good efforts are all acceptable to God, who reads the love in our hearts and the good intentions of our minds.

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Most of us are quiet people who desire to live a good and holy life, promote the values and mission of the Gospel as best we can and desire to one day inherit the surprise of life eternal God promises to us. We are not trail blazers. We are simple people who want to do the simple things of life well. But there are others who left a more profound impact along the way of the paths they walked. Folks like Dorothy Day, Martin Luther King, Thomas Merton, Gandhi, St. Teresa of Calcutta, and many others left lasting impacts and legacies. Like Moses, they show us by word and deed who God is and what integrity and a purpose driven life look like. They show us how to be holy. We need Moses people like these to give us inspiration, hope and an example of holy living.

We do not need to do what they did or even mirror their relationship with God. Each one of us is God's special creation, with a purpose and soul known only to us. We need to learn how to open up and bring, without compromise, our soul-ness to life. We know when someone is authentic and centered because they always point to truth, even though they struggle and sin themselves, and they embody an unspoken timeless wisdom that just sounds and feels right. Jesus taught with this same type of authority and it astonished many who listened. We do not need to move mountains, advance a cause, write books or become notable. All we have to do is become credible witnesses of the faith we profess. Moses people can teach us how to do this.

St. Oscar Romero was an amazing man and a Moses figure for sure. He saw God in the burning bush and brought the flame of Gospel faith to the poorest of the poor, challenging the evils of the society in which he lived. He was tireless and persistent. He must have gotten very close to the problem because it cost him his life. He suspected it would. St. Romero said, "When we leave Mass, we ought to go out the way Moses descended Mt Sinai: with his face shining, with his heart brave and strong to face the world's difficulties." We can learn from his wisdom. If we allow the power of the Mass to truly transform us, we will leave that holy encounter changed. Our face will shine and we will have courage. We can bring what we have received to life's challenges. That sounds doable, doesn't it? Because of the example of our simple holiness, people will be amazed.

A Tranquil Soul

Brené Brown's 2010 book, "The Gifts of Imperfection" introduces a term that I love: *gremlins*. I previously knew that word as the title of the 1984 film with Howie Mandel. Brown refers to negative self-talk as "gremlins." Self-talk is that interior conversation that we have, either positive or negative. It governs our moods, attitudes, and worldview.

In the spiritual life, there's a similar concept. The Christian East calls it λογίζομαι (*logizomai*) which roughly means thoughts. The *logizomai* (or thoughts) of the spiritual life are akin to gremlins or negative self-talk in the psychological sphere. In Christian spirituality, the goal is Christ and becoming more like him. The *logizomai* can get in the way, just as the gremlins of negative self-talk can get in the way of psychological health. The nagging quality of these *logizomai* might be described as temptations, yet today's Gospel calls these plaguing thoughts 'unclean spirits.' We all have them; they come in varied ways and intensities, affecting our lives in small and in big ways. St. Paul wants us to be free of these anxiety-producing thoughts that disrupt the peace and quietude our souls so desperately need. St. Paul isn't saying that the demands of responsible living are detrimental to spiritual life. He is saying that the presence of these tempting *logizomai* are the beginning of sin taking root in our soul, influencing our attitudes and moving us away from the image of Christ in our soul.

These pesky unclean spirits know the power of Christ, even though we may not; they lose their stronghold when we call on the name of Jesus, just like darkness immediately disappears when I turn on the light as I enter a room. In the spiritual realm, the unclean spirits are there only because I have knowingly, or unknowingly, given them permission to be there. I have the power to evict them! Calling on Jesus' name is not like some magical incantation or spell that we wield over dark forces. The Catechism describes it this way: "The invocation of the holy name of Jesus is the simplest way of praying always. When the holy name is repeated often by a humbly attentive heart, the prayer is not lost by heaping up empty phrases, but holds fast to the word and "brings forth fruit with patience."

Those who struggle in battle ought to keep their souls free of the waves of distraction. If they do, the mind is able to distinguish among the thoughts that come to it. The good thoughts, sent by God, they can store in the treasure-house of their memory. The evil thoughts, sent by the devil, they can throw out. In the same way, when the sea is calm, the fisherman can see to the bottom and practically no fish can escape his gaze; but if stirred up by wind and storm, it becomes opaque. When that happens, even the wiliest fisherman is wasting his time.

The tranquil soul is one free of the anxieties described by St. Paul. The tranquility of the soul is not a cheap quality; it must be earned through disciplines of prayer, fasting, and repentance. It is what we can do; it is Jesus who returns us to our right minds because ours was transformed and renewed by the power of Jesus' name. Imagine what life could be like if we continually operated out of a tranquil soul rather than an anxious one!

Celebrate the Sacraments

Baptism: Baptism is celebrated on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of the month after the 11:00 am Mass and on the 4th Sunday during the 11:00 am Mass. Please call the Parish office at least two months in advance to make arrangements.

First Reconciliation & First Communion: Our Faith Formation Program begins with Grade 1. First reconciliation and First Communion is a 2-year program. Please call the Faith Formation office to register your child.

Confirmation: Confirmation is a 2-year program beginning in 9th grade. Students will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in the spring of their 10th grade year.

Matrimony: Couples are asked to contact the Parish at least one year in advance.

Anointing of the Sick: Please call the Parish office at anytime for Communion calls or visitation of the sick or elderly. Holy Communion may be brought to the home of any person who is temporarily or permanently homebound.

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA): RCIA prepares adolescents and adults for Baptism and full Communion into the Catholic Church. Please call the Parish office for information
