On this Fourth Sunday of Advent, with Christ Mass Day later this week, I have some ideas to help us focus on what will make our celebration of the Lord's Nativity more satisfying and happy.

The first thing to motivate us is that some years, after Christmas is over, people feel a certain sadness, as if after the big build-up, there was something that we missed. There could be a lot of reasons for that, but the real problem might have been that while we were busy about many things and giving gifts and opening gifts, we did not expect to get any gifts from God. What we did not ask for, we did not get—especially Important things like wisdom and satisfaction and trust in a divine plan for our salvation and for our eternal life in heaven.

Or maybe, like the inner child in every adult, we didn't even open what was there in front of us! You thought you knew what others were supposed to give you. You were thinking about tangible presents from family and friends, but you were not expecting new life, new enthusiasm, new joy from your Christmas prayers and Mass.

So here is what we can do now to get ready for a better Christmas this year. It is not too late. First; focus on Jesus. Talk in prayer and read about Him in the Bible. The Gospels of Matthew and Luke, chapters one and two, are called the Infancy Narratives. The list of names are not as important as the messages and dreams by which God the Father prepared Mary and Joseph for their role in salvation history.

Like cleaning for guests at a party, clean up this week to welcome the Christ Child. This starts with repentance for your sins. Sins can be personal or collective, things that you did or that you failed to do. At a minimum, say an Act of Contrition. <u>Act of Contrition</u> is a prayer to use daily and know by heart. (Check the back cover of the missalette, or Google.) Here: I'll even give you a present - one that is traditional, short, and easy to remember: *Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a sinner.*

Going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation – also known as Penance and Confession – is another tool in your toolbox for repairing your life. This Monday is being called **RECONCILIATION MONDAY**. Priests will be in every Catholic Church in our NY area to hear confessions from 11am to 1pm, and from 6pm to 8pm. Fr. John and I will be here, but you have choices. Confess in any Catholic Church that is convenient for you.

St. Luke tells us that the great announcer of the Messiah – Saint John the Baptist—preached a gospel of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Preparing for the celebration of Jesus' birthday includes cleaning our soul and getting rid of the dirt and debris from bad habits and laziness. The word *Gospel* means good news. The way to accept good news and happiness is by repentance for bad behaviors, and a renewed try to be good.

How can imperfect people like us really welcome the Son of God this week if we are not trying to be at least a little bit holier? If we have been careless of the needs of others, or not praying at home or coming to Mass, or if we are the cause of scandal or anger that keeps others away from Jesus – we really need to change! This Christmas is our next best chance. Open yourself to the experience of forgiveness and reconciliation, and discover that forgiving and healing is the path to both happiness and holiness.

Your Christmas present from God is waiting for you. As the Romans said: Carpe Diem – Seize the Day! Make this Christmas the best it can be, especially spiritually. Jesus said that He came so that we may have life and have it to the full. He wants you to accept his His love. Get ready by reconciling with family and friends as needed. Make your commitment to be with Christ, to learn from Him as you go, and to appreciate his Christmas gifts of life and love, of mercy and peace. Pray at home, read the Bible. Receive Holy Communion and other Sacraments that Jesus entrusted to His Church to show His care for you.

Develop an Advent frame of mind

The holiday season can seem more like a test of endurance than preparation for a celebration. In the midst of the seasonal stress, we are asked to reach into ourselves and bring out only what is kind, generous, and loving. It may help to remember that the real reason for the season is the celebration of unimaginable Love.

Try to see with a Father's eye. Our Heavenly Father delights in our creation and loves us for exactly who we are. During Advent, try to see yourself through His eyes. Not the flawed human visible to

The Feast of the Holy Family (December 26) includes the story of finding Jesus in the Temple, a story of love and obedience. Jesus, Mary, and Joseph traveled to

Jerusalem for the Passover, as was the custom for Jews of that time. They traveled in a large group for protection against bandits who infested the hill country. So it wasn't surprising that His

parents didn't miss Jesus as they started the return trip. Upon discovering Him missing, they hurried back to Jerusalem.

On the third day of searching, they found Jesus in the Temple. He was



December 2 - St. Bibiana (363). Virgin and martyr, St. Bibiana was the daughter of a Roman official who converted to Christianity and was martyred for his faith. Bibiana was tortured and executed for her Christianity, as well.

December 8 - Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. On this day we commemorate that Mary was conceived in St. Anne's womb without Original Sin. In addition to attending Mass for this Holy Day of Obligation, praying a joyful Rosary is a wonderful way

December 12 - Gaudete Sunday. This Sunday marks the halfway point of Advent. We light the rose candle in the Advent wreath for joy. During the last two weeks of Advent, the Church prepares to celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas.

December 29 - St. Thomas Becket (1170). As Archbishop of Canterbury, King Henry II tried to pressure him and the other bishops into agreeing to unjust laws, but St. Thomas refused to sign his approval for them. He was eventually martyred for his faith.

himself wholly and entirely present" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #1374).

The Eucharist is a gift we can only fully receive in person. It is spiritual food for the journey. In it we receive not just graces, but Jesus, Himself. Nowhere else on Earth and in no other way can we be so closely united to Him who loves us most.


