

On the day of the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, we received the answer to the ultimate desire of all human beings. For more than happiness, health, prosperity, or peace, wise people want eternal life. Any gift you have given or received pales in comparison with this tremendous fact: that the gates of heaven have been opened again because of Jesus Christ.

Our longing for such a future is driven home when death deprives us of someone we loved or knew—as it did this week with word of the going home to God of our parish's first ordained deacon, Deacon Phillip Maroon. Deacon Phillip died on Friday December 17, at age 75, after many physical challenges. These led him several years ago to gradually withdraw from his favorite ministries – Sunday Masses at St. Nicholas Chapel, and Monday Night Novena – and then to ask Cardinal Dolan to accept his retirement for health reasons from being an active Deacon.

A Funeral Mass was scheduled for Wednesday December 22, at Saint Rita Church on Bradley Avenue, with Bishop John O'Hara as the main celebrant. Phil, his wife Kathy and two sons lived near St. Rita's. He began his first years as a Deacon there. We will have more about him in another bulletin. For now, please keep him and his family in your prayers.

Speaking of prayers, Father John Kallattill, Deacon Jonathan Reyes and I are all praying for you to have a happy and healthy Christmas Day and Christmas Season as we celebrate the Nativity of the Lord. Which leads me to ask a challenging question: How many days are there in our Church's Christmas Season this year? (Be very cautious about any song title that links days and presents – although you get extra credit if you remember what those gifts are supposed to be.)

You could find the answer by consulting a new Catholic calendar and/or looking in a missalette at church and counting the days from December 25 to when we go back to what is called "Ordinary Time". But here are a few hints to help you get a preview of the whole liturgical season of Christmas:

- · Christmas Masses begin on Christmas Eve, like Vigil Masses do on Saturday for Sunday. This is because we are faithful to our Jewish tradition, that a new day begins at sunset. To repeat: Christmas Masses are Friday at 4pm in Church and Chapel, 5:30pm, 9pm, and at 7:30am, 9am in Chapel, 10:30am and 12:30pm. There are no 4pm or 5pm Masses on December 25.
- The next day -- Sunday, the 26th— we are celebrating <u>THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH</u>. The Masses on Sunday December 26 are: 7:30, 9, 10:30, 12:30, 5pm.
- Saturday January 1 is <u>THE SOLEMNITY OF MARY, THE MOTHER OF GOD</u>. This is usually a holyday of obligation, but not when it falls on a Saturday or Monday. Even though there is no obligation, people want to honor Mary as Mother of God and also to pray for a much much better New Year! Therefore we will offer three Masses: December 31 at 4pm, and January 1 at 8:30am and 12 Noon (in place of confessions.)
- · Sunday January 2 is the celebration of <u>THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD</u>. On this feastday commemorating the homage of the Three Kings, we are back to the usual Sunday schedule, beginning with a 4pm Mass on Saturday January 1.
- Sunday January 9 is the celebration of <u>THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD</u>. This event completes the quiet part of Jesus' life on earth. By going with his disciples to the Jordan River for a ritual baptism in water for the forgiveness of sins, to be done by his better-known cousin the prophet John, who is called "The Baptist", Jesus begins his public life. At his baptism, there is divine identification given by God's voice speaking from heaven: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." This marks the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus, and therefore makes January 9 the final day of the Christmas Season. (And if you want another clue that January 9 is the final day of the Christmas Season—our beautifully decorated Christmas trees are scheduled to be removed by our Holy Name men on January 8, in perfect coordination with the liturgical calendar.)

So make use of every day in this Christmas season! Spend time in prayer, including at your home nativity scene, placed in a position of honor and respect for contemplation and prayer. I invite you—by yourself or with others, at least once and as often as you desire—to pray aloud these beautiful words from our Church's <u>Book of Blessings</u>. This is the prayer which we used to bless the Christmas Nativity scenes inside and outside our church:

"God of every nation and people, when our need for a Savior was great, you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary. To our lives he brings joy and peace, justice, mercy, and love. And so, Lord, bless all of us who look upon this manger. May it remind us of the humble birth of Jesus, and raise up our thoughts to him, who is God-with-us and Savior of all, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen."

Merry Christmas to all! And a much, much, much better New Year!

Every Commandment of God is for our good. The Ten Commandments are designed to protect us, our families and our communities. They are a guide to improving the way we think, what we do, and how we live.

These are the traditional formulas you can study in the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u>, introducing #2052ff.

I am the Lord your God:
you shall not have strange gods before me.

You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.

Remember to keep holy the Lord's day.

Honor your father and your mother.

You shall not kill.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's wife.

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods or anything else that belongs to him.


