Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe. In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness. Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.

Father Chuck's Homily:

Many years ago I said to my younger brother; "We weren't taught that" about some issue or other and his reaction was: "I don't remember ever remember them telling us about it." And he was right - they never sat us down and told us X Y Z - but we were still taught.

You see the adults we become are the result not just of the things we are actually taught, but the things we see and hear our parents say and do. You know - the neighbor our parents never spoke a bad word about, but the way they were distant and polite with them, but warm and friendly with others. My parents never taught me that we didn't like a certain politician of the 60s and 70s, who some thought was a crook, but the fact that my father started cursing whenever he was on TV and my mother ran to change the channel was a clue. The way our parents handled themselves modeled for us the way an adult in our family behaved. And not just our parents, but also our adult relatives, neighbors, friends, even strangers. We see the models and eventually come up with our own, but still the majority of our behavior was that modeled by our parents. Have you ever heard it said, "You're just like your father or mother?" I was walking ahead of my nephew once as he was talking to me and if I didn't know better, I would have sworn it was one of my brothers speaking. The family mannerisms and attitudes (Trust me I come from a German family I know about attitude) are handed down, almost like the family silver. I bring that up because today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family and we read of the only episode of Jesus' early life after his birth and before his baptism that has come down to us: his finding in the Temple. We call that period of time the "Hidden life of Jesus". But is it really that hidden? Like detectives we can piece together a general idea of his life as a child and young adult. So: we know he was the son of God and son of Mary, which means he was like us in all things except sin. So we can say that Jesus was a well-behaved boy and young man. He was Jewish, so he would have started Hebrew School at a young age and made his Bar mitzvah at roughly 12 - about the time they went to Jerusalem. At that point he would have been considered a man and adopted some of the responsibilities of an adult male - specifically the responsibility to take part in the prayers required of adult male Jews. We know he would have been training in Joseph's craft - every son followed the father. We know that Mary and Joseph were pious observant Jews - they went to Jerusalem on pilgrimage on a regular basis. And we know that Jesus as an adult had a great respect for Jewish law and prayer. Jesus as an adult had great concern for the poor and disadvantaged, and reached out to them whenever he could. It's easy to imagine Mary being gracious and offering hospitality to strangers and those in need, as any good Jew would have done. We assume that Joseph died at an early age and perhaps - this is just a guess - Jesus saw the family and neighbors giving her a hand - assisting the widow and the orphan, a common theme among the prophets in the O.T. So even though we don't know specifics about his early life, we can piece together a picture of what his upbringing was like and the kinds of things he did. And the most important clue is the kind of adult he was. Consciously or not, he would have repeated the kind of behavior he saw as a child and as a young man, modified by some of the other examples he saw, and of course his own nature. So the question we ask on this Holy Family Feast is this: what kind of behavior are we modeling for OUR children? Would we be happy to see them repeating our behavior? Are we modeling, not just the kind of parents we want them to be, but also the kind of adult? And not just our children - what kind of example are we setting for all those other children who see us and hear us and meet us? Mary and Joseph had it easy - their child was Son of God and God. Mary was born without the stain of original sin and Joseph was singularly graced to play his part. Our job is harder. But we can still show the next generations the way to be by showing them the best of examples - by word, what we teach, and deed - what we teach. The world will never be a better place if it doesn't start somewhere. Let the time be now and the place be that piece of the world you inhabit and those you encounter in it. With Mary and Joseph to intercede for us with Jesus we CAN begin to make a difference. Maybe not as big a difference as Jesus made, but certainly as big a difference as we can!

Happy Holy Family!

It only seems like yesterday we were celebrating Christmas and here we are at the Holy Family -- oh wait, it was yesterday. I will bet you that the attendance today will be a fraction of what we had yesterday. Any takers? This year is very confusing. I hope you had a pleasant day yesterday and were pleased with what Santa brought.

I received a number of comments (complaints) that some of the light bulbs in the Church were burned out. I hope you noticed that the bulbs have been replaced. It's a very complicated process. The fixtures can not be pulled down so we have to build a contraption to hold the ladder that John has to climb to change the bulbs (thank you to Bob & Dan who helped John). For some odd reason, though, the color of the light is not consistent even though the bulbs are all the same. That we can't do anything about.

I hope to meet with an engineer in the early part of the New Year to tell us exactly what needs to be done with the bell tower, so that we can put together a proposal and put the project out to bid. This will be paid for out of the rebate we received from the Faith to Move Mountains campaign that you participated in and not from regular parish funds. That is the second major project scheduled for this coming year (the first being the Old School Roof). I'm sure it will not be the last.

With the downsizing of the Facilities department, I'm looking for a few good people to help us (including me) this winter with shoveling the Church entrances and sidewalks. John will plow the lots with the parish truck. I hope to hire a part-time person to take over janitorial work and to help with these kinds of duties. I haven't decided what to do about the lawn care company, I may need lawn mowers in the Spring.

I expect 2022 to be a very busy year. It's time we took the 'hold' off some of our projects and to get things moving. None of that could not be done without your prayers, participation and practical help. Thank you.

We sometimes have a fairy tale idea of the Holy Family. Instead you can hear the fear and anxiety of distressed parents. If you ever lost a child even for a brief moment you understand the fret that may have consumed Mary and Joseph at the time.

But what comes next is worth pondering for ourselves. Jesus response is loving, kind, teaching with wisdom. He is reassuring to Mary and Joseph and most significantly, to us. If for one second they forgot that the child they were guiding is the Light and Savior of the world, the one who came to enlighten us all, He was reminding them. The only important thing was that He be about His father's business. All else could fall by the wayside for Him to continue the mission at hand.

We too forget that God is in control and that the most important busyness to consider, for us too, is to be about our Heavenly Fathers business. And what is the Father's business? Redemption and Reconciliation of the whole world.

Jesus, in his humanity, at the age of twelve, was coming into his identity. It is in the family that we learn who we are and whose we are. It is our parent's that give us the good or not so good understanding of ourselves. It is our parent's love, however imperfect, that teaches us the Love of the Father. It is through failure coupled with forgiveness that we learn this business of Redemption.

We have been redeemed therefore, let us all be about our Father's business, bringing the Love of God, Forgiveness, Reconciliation, and His message of Redemption to all those God places in our path.

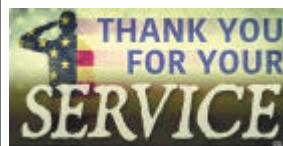

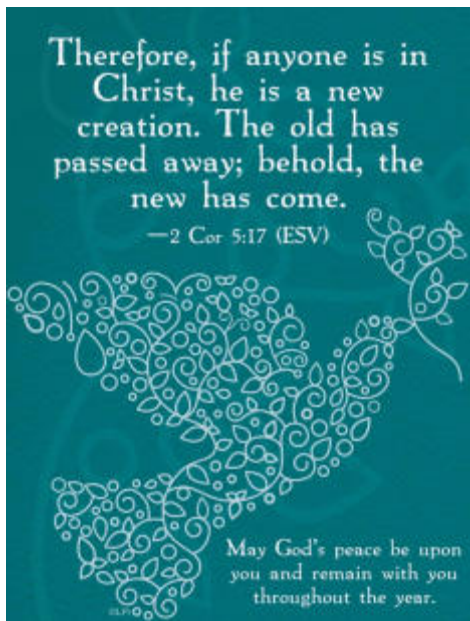

Bishop O'Connell encourages prayer, financial support for tornado victims, survivors

On Dec. 14, Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M., conveyed an appeal from leaders in the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops as relief work begins in Kentucky and other states that suffered an incalculable toll from the recent outbreak of tornadoes.

The Bishop shared, "Catholics are encouraged to donate to recovery efforts and financial help for tornado victims by supporting the work of Catholic Charities USA via the website: www.catholiccharities.us

In a message posted Dec. 11, Bishop O'Connell called upon the faithful of the Diocese of Trenton to join in prayer for all those impacted by the devastating tornadoes that were reported in nearly a dozen Midwestern and Southern states. He stated: "We pray for the souls of those who have died; for the comfort of their grieving loved ones; for the healing of the injured, and for the strength and perseverance of all those who lost their homes and livelihoods."

The Bishop's message concluded, "May all those traumatized by this vast devastation find hope in God's abiding love and be assured that they will not be forgotten."

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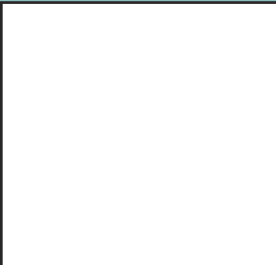
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
