

Father Chuck's Homily:

Jesus' baptism is a strange event, if you think about it. John preached a baptism for the repentance of sins. But Jesus was sinless, so had nothing to repent of. By being baptized, he is in fact giving the idea that he DOES have something to repent of. So why was he baptized? Baptism as we know it has a number of effects: Washing away original sin (which Jesus did not have) and personal sin for those older (which Jesus did not have); an infusion of the holy spirit with gifts and talents - which Jesus already had. And one more: incorporation into the Body of Christ, the Church. Jesus' baptism marks the beginning of his public ministry - his public works, in a way the beginning of the Church, since the Church existed in Jesus, even before Pentecost. As one author puts it: "Another very important implication of Baptism is entry into a community. And maybe that is the piece of baptism that Jesus sought. By his baptism Jesus became a part of a community. The specific community he joined – in a way created – was of a collection of Jews in Judea who, through faithful repentance, sought to renew their relationship with God. By his baptism, Jesus affirmed that he was truly one of them, one with them, sharing their lives and experiences and inviting them to share his life and experiences. Jesus may or may not have been personally affected by joining this community, but the community would never be the same. By his presence with them... by sharing his life with them... he transformed those individuals from a collection of people with a religious bent into a community that shared the life of Christ. That community was now alive with the very presence of Christ and empowered to be the Body of Christ in the world. He goes on to make the point that OUR baptism is OUR entrance into the community of the Church, alive with the presence of Jesus and empowered to go out and be witnesses to Jesus:

"Jesus' baptism marks the beginning of his public ministry. Joining a community is the beginning of ministry. Entering the Body of Christ and ministering as the Body of Christ are dependent on one another and inseparable. Part of what Jesus says by being baptized is: I cannot be who I am called to be... I cannot do what I am called to do... alone. Jesus cannot, or at least does not, fulfill his ministry without being in the midst of a community. And it is the same for us. Alone, we cannot be who we are called to be. We cannot fulfill our Christian ministry in our world without being a part of the community that is the Body of Christ. And through our baptisms we become a part of that community, a community that is still alive and empowered with the presence and life of Christ."

So by being baptized Jesus showed that he really was one of us – and gave example that as he went forth after his baptism and spread the kingdom, so we too should use our gifts and talents received in baptism to spread the kingdom – no matter what age: young old middle. It is our responsibility to take the word of God, to take the faith with us and to use them to bring Jesus to others. By an appropriate word here or there, and always, always, always by example in how we speak and act and just are in our everyday lives. Jesus' baptism, OUR baptism are the points of beginning of ministry – but they also point forward as well to the END of our ministries: As he entered the water and rose out again, as we entered the waters and rose out again as a new creation in Christ, so one day he would enter the grave and rise again to a resurrected life and we will enter the grave and rise again to a resurrected life and we will enter the grave and rise again to a resurrected life and we will enter the grave and rise again to a not. So let's think about making the basis of our Lenten reflections our baptism, and how we have – and have not – lived up to our baptismal calling, and then revise reverse refine our lives to be more like him so that the words spoken of Jesus may one day be spoken of us: "This is my beloved CHILD, with whom I am well pleased."

Good Sunday to you!

Let me say a big thank you to everyone who participated, attended, and donated during the Christmas Masses. Our total attendance was just over 1,300 people, the Church has rarely looked more beautiful, and the intermediate total for the Christmas Collection is just under \$36,000.00. Thank you!

Although this is only the first full week of the New Year, I'm already thinking ahead to the END of this year and the many things I want to accomplish during this year. My first goal is to ensure that the spiritual life of the parish continue as it has and even to add a few events, such as conferences or guest speakers. Second, to begin whittling away at the back log of work on our buildings and grounds needed to bring us up to the standard I would like for the parish. Third, to ensure that the people of the parish have input into these decisions. I was once told in my last parish the I was too transparent with the people. I don't plan on changing my ways.

Recently His Holiness caused a stir by revising the regulations on the celebration of what is called the 'extraordinary form' - the modern term for the Mass prior to Vatican II. For the young out there, prior to about 1965 the Mass was said in Latin, the priest was facing away from the people speaking in a low voice, and in many cases the people were spectators. The Vatican Council II changed all of that into what we celebrate today. Needless to say it caused conflict. There were those who refused to accept the changes, and others who thought the changes went too far. Some even splintered off from the Church and formed their own "Churches". The Latin Mass was never banned, but was strictly limited. Pope Benedict loosened the regulations for celebrating the extraordinary form Mass in an effort to heal the divisions. Pope Francis reimposed restrictions and caused the controversy. The problem is that loosening the restrictions, rather than bringing them closer to the fold in many cases merely reinforced the attitude that the Latin Mass was the 'right' Mass. In one case, when they ran low on hosts during Communion and there were still people in line, the priest (only priests or deacons can distribute Communion at an extraordinary form Mass) went to the tabernacle to retrieve the reserved sacrament consecrated at an English Mass. When he turned around the line had disappeared because to them the reserved sacrament, consecrated at the English Mass, wasn't really Eucharist. It's that attitude that Pope Francis wanted to curtail. A prime example of one who refuses to accept Vatican II is the actor Mel Gibson who famously once said that Transubstantiation (turning the bread and wine into the body and Blood of Christ) isn't taking place at Novus Ordo (the Mass since 1965) Masses because 'there are no rules'. I guess those 85 pages at the beginning of the Missal must not count for him. I have no issue with Mass in Latin - we say it in every other language in the world, why not Latin? It's the attitude that the Latin is 'better' or 'more valid' or even worse 'the way God prefers it' that I have issue with. It doesn't matter what language the priest uses, if he is validly ordained with 'faculties' consecration takes place. Or as I have put it rather crudely: if I call you an idiot in any language, I'm still calling you an idiot. The words meant the same thing.

"You are my beloved Son: with you I am well pleased." Luke 3:22



It was a wonderful day when Jesus approached the waters of the Jordan River to be baptized. The wonder was when the Father spoke of Jesus as His Son in whom He was well pleased.

Up until this time in the scriptures we do not see Jesus as an adult doing anything special. No miracles, no signs and wonders, no big physical accomplishments. Then what was it that caused the Heavenly Father to be so pleased? What caused the Spirit of God to be poured forth?

No accomplishment had to take place, only a willingness for obedience through humility. Think of it. Here is God Himself, with no sin within Him, approaching John who was calling for change and repentance. The same God who spoke everything into existence was now going to empty Himself and humbly submit to baptism of repentance. He gave of Himself even in this baptism to be an example to us that we would be willing to humble ourselves to follow Him and be called into His Righteousness. This was the beginning of His mission to save us.

With each Baptism that takes place, the infant, child, or adult is called into a magnificent unity with the Trinity. We become part of God's Family. But what about the Holy Spirit that was poured out on Jesus and the Father's expression of pleasure? Have you experienced that? Many of the wonders that are brought about from the grace of Baptism will not be experienced deeply unless we grasp the humility and obedience that was present in Jesus with His desire to do the Father's Will. It was this that caused the pleasure of the Father. It is our own humility and obedience that causes the Spirit of God to stir His fire within us and we experience a deeper union with God and His Church.

The hustle and bustle of the Christmas Season is over, but did we experience "Emmanuel", God With Us? The Baptism of the Lord may be a good time for all of us to be encouraged to come humbly before our Lord, and seek to be obedient to His Holy Will that we may experience union with Him more and more in 2022. The union that will cause the face of the earth to be renewed.



St. Hilary of Poitiers, Bishop and Doctor of the Church | January 13



Born a pagan, St. Hilary (c. 315 – c. 367) studied philosophy and the meaning of life, eventually making his way through the bible. He became a convert and was appointed bishop of Poitiers in 353. Sometimes referred to as the Hammer of the Arians, St. Hilary defended the Nicene Creed against a popular heresy, Arianism. He was exiled to Phrygia for opposing Roman emperor Constantius II, who preferred the heresy which denies Christ's divinity. From Phyrgia St. Hilary fought with his pen, zealously writing against the heresy.

Eventually he was allowed to return to Poitiers, but did so by a circuitous route, preaching against Arianism all the way. St. Hilary was likely the first writer of hymns in the West, his writings on the Trinity, Psalms and Gospel of Matthew survive today. St. Hilary was created Doctor of the Church, a title given to those who provided important contributions to theology and doctrine, in 1851 by Pope Pius IX.



**Updated 11/15/21

The NJ Reproductive Freedom Act (S3030/A4848) was introduced in the Senate and Assembly on October 8, 2020. The purpose of the bill is to protect and expand access to abortion and contraceptives. It is a radical abortion bill that places women's lives in jeopardy and is so extreme that it will allow abortions up until birth. Among other things, It will make NJ an abortion tourist destination and a haven for sex trafficking criminals because it welcomes individuals from out of state to come to our state for free abortions and sterilizations, all paid for by NJ taxpaying citizens.

At this time, we ask that you stop what you are doing and contact your State Senator and Two Assembly members immediately and tell them you expect them to Vote <u>NO</u> on S3030/A4848 regardless of any revisions or amendments that may be made. Tell them that this is an extremely important issue which deserves adequate public notice for a hearing, and this is not an issue that should be pushed through in secret during a lame duck session during a pandemic.


