Father Chuck's Homily:

How many of you, whether you are a child now, or were a child once, how many of you have received what I call the 'Mommy look?' You know, when mother tells you to do something, and you either don't do it, or like Jesus today say that's not my job? And you get the look? And next thing you know you're doing what she asked you to do, sometimes as fast as you can. Now how may of you mothers have GIVEN the Mommy look?

I bring that up because today the Gospel passage, while about the first Miracle at Cana, it also tells us as much about Mary and her relationship with Jesus as it does about the miracle. I can imagine today Mary giving Jesus the mommy look. Nowhere else in the scriptures are Mary and Jesus shown as a normal family in a normal relationship. She tells him to do something, he says that's not my business she gives him the look and tells the servants – "do what he says". Doesn't argue, doesn't complain, doesn't throw a guilt trip . . .yet. . . she just lets him know that he WILL do what she asks because it is the right thing to do.

Mary is the Mommy and Jesus, who about 30 and not married, is still the kid. My late secretary Betty used to say that Mom was an acronym for Mean Old Mother.

But what is it that happens today, what the lesson we can draw? Mary brings a problem to Jesus, and he solves it. Whether or not he hesitated or dragged his feet, in the end he solved it. We Catholics and the eastern orthodox Churches, are often criticized for the importance we give to the Blessed Mother and how we pray through her, even though there is this passage that directly supports our practice of praying through her and the other saints – intercessory prayer. We ask them to bring our prayers and needs to Jesus who will answer, and remember sometimes the answer is no, or, if not no, then yes but not the way we want. We may not get this job, but we may get that one. Does Mary answer the prayers? Does Dorothea, or Anthony, or Gertrude or Symphorian, Swiadeck, Sidbert or Quiriac? No, but they help us with THEIR prayers, just as Mary helped the newly married couple in today's reading.

As one author wrote: ""Woman, how does your concern affect me?" This question is often cited by some Protestants to refute Catholic devotion to Mary. Of course, as Catholics we know that in addressing her as 'woman' Jesus is not only using a standard way of speaking for His time, but was universalizing Mary's role in salvation history, identifying her both as the New Eve and looking forward to her role at the crucifixion and later in the Book of Revelation. We know that, even though He hesitates, Jesus relents and performs the desired miracle, thereby marking the start of His ministry and confirming His mother's intercessory role. But there's an even simpler reason why the Protestant interpretation is so wrong: Jesus did not actually say that to His mother. The original Greek in a literal translation says: 'Woman, what is that to me and to you?' This reflects the Greek. This seemingly minor change in translations has immense ramifications. Suddenly, rather than seeming like a rift between Jesus and Mary, Jesus' words make it seem like they are in this together. A fair paraphrase of their words might go something like: How should we intervene? What should we do about this? His response thus intensifies Mary's intercessory role. Rather than balking at it and only later giving in to her request, Jesus affirms Mary's participation in His redemptive mission."

So today, in addition to reminding us of his first miracle at Cana, we have a very good reminder about our practice of intercessory prayer: bringing the needs of others to Jesus, sometimes with the help of Mary and the saints. Because if we ask our friends on earth to pray for us, then why wouldn't we also ask our friends in heaven?

Good Sunday to you!

Well, winter has set in with a vengeance, hasn't it? I hope you are all keeping warm and safe. There's not much to report this week – things have quieted down now that the weather has turned cold and the holidays are over. We're in the lull (gratefully so after the past few months!). I want to take a moment to thank our parishioner who came out and helped John shovel out the Church.

The Church has left the Christmas Season behind and enter Ordinary Time. "Ordinary" meaning not one of the big Church seasons: Advent/Christmas/ Lent/ Easter. Ordinary Time is broken into two parts: between the baptism of the Lord and Ash Wednesday and between Pentecost and Advent. We wear green as a symbol of hope and rebirth. The length of OT varies from year to year, depending on when the major feasts, especially Easter, occur. Ash Wednesday this year will be on March 2, so about 6 weeks from now. Time does fly. Odd how it crept when we were younger and flies when we're older, isn't it?

We've been having a couple of issues lately with the Extraordinary Ministers of Communion. Not all of them have reported into the sacristy before Mass starts. Often I'm not sure if I even have any in the congregation. So, I am asking, again, for them to report into the sacristy and check their names off the list on the counter. Also, they need to come forward DURING THE SIGN OF PEACE. If they wait until the Lamb of God, then others assume there are none and get up to volunteer and we end up with a crowd in the sanctuary. Also, the same situation occurs if they sit too far back in the Church. So, I am asking them: 1. Sign in ahead of Mass; 2. Sit farther forward; 3. Come up during the Sign of Peace. Also, when in the sanctuary and I genuflect to the chalice and host, please bow with me and step forward as I drink from the cup.

We had a monkey wrench thrown into our Mission plans for Lent. Our Mission priest is ill (not COVID) and so we have two options: either find someone on short notice, or delay the Mission until a later date. Fran and I will confer and make a decision soon.

There's still time if you want a souvenir roof tile from the Old School Building, give us call to reserve.

And, last, our Christmas Collection is just under \$40,000.00. THANK YOU!!

These are typical of the water jars used, therefore you would draw out because these are too heavy to be poured.

Through the prophet Isaiah the Lord speaks to us both individually and collectively. He speaks of us as the Church being the bride of Christ called into His glory. But let us not miss our Almighty Father speaking to us individually and hear what He wills for us.

He calls you by a new name. He wants to make you a crown held by the Lord. But most of all He takes delight in you! So much so that He wants to be as a Bridegroom to you, who cares, loves, protects, renews and rejoices in you.

Just prior to today's reading in Isaiah 62 is the last two verses of Isaiah 61:10-11, "I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in my God is the joy of my soul; For He has clothed me with a robe of salvation, and wrapped me in a mantle of justice."

See, the Lord has given us the holy attire to come and worship Him. He has given us salvation and called us to His very righteousness. Being forgiven, renewed, and set free we humbly worship Him in His Righteousness.

Coming ever closer and deeper in relationship with Him, the Spirit of God burst forth with life within us, pouring out His gifts for the building up of others. No matter what gifts you may have if they are used in the Love of Christ they bring about more and more life within each of us individually and within the Church.

What I just described may seem too ideal and you may have been thinking this is not what you have been experiencing. Well, many times on our journey we might relate to this bride and groom at Cana running out of wine. But we do have a God who cares about everything in our lives and knows exactly what we need. In my own life I experienced that my God knows what I need even before I do.

When God supplies our needs according to His riches in glory, he does not go small. I have no idea how big the wedding was in Cana but even if there were 200 people they would not use all the wine that Jesus supplied. Jesus provided 180 gallons of the finest of wine in addition to what was already consumed. In today's standards we would very generously use 50 gallons of wine for 500 people. So if this wedding was 200 people it could easily go on for a week and still have wine left.

But Jesus is still doing this today. When our hearts or lives are out of wine and we come to Him as His mother did; knowing His love and concern for us and with expectation, He will pour out new wine for us lavishly.

It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness." Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint. But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom. Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all. Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word? Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

St. Sebastian | January 20

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian



(256 - 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350. We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually

he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave. One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.

Faithful Departed

Question:

How can we pray for the dead throughout the year?

Answer

We commemorate the faithful departed on November 2nd each year. However, we can and should continue to pray for the dead. Our growth in Christian perfection takes a long time. At the time of our death, many of us might not be saints yet. But God, in His mercy, allows for those who love Him to experience purification after death. Our word for that state is Purgatory. It's the antechamber of heaven, so to speak. We know we're getting in the house, but we're not quite ready to go all the way in. There's rain to shake off our coats and dirt that's clogging our shoes.

Here on earth, we can pray for the souls in Purgatory. One way is to request that your parish offer a Mass for the intention of a specific loved one. We can also remember the departed in our daily prayers. Just as we have special intentions for family and friends here on earth, we can pray for those who have died. It's also a good act of Christian charity to pray for the forgotten, those who have no one else to pray for them. God knows who they are!


