

PASTOR'S NOTE

Dear Saints,

Do you remember this period of Lent from last year? These next two weeks, traditionally known as Passiontide, call for the veiling of statues and the covering of crucifixes.

Two years ago, many of you shared with me the pictures and the pain of shrouding your own sacred images. It's a difficult thing to do, but I invite you to join me again this year in finishing our Lenten journey blindfolded.

Taking these next steps blindfolded means that we are being deprived even of those things on which we rightly depend, and no longer just those things we need to jettison (like sin, overindulgence, and all manner of self-seeking). Sacred images inspire us. Their beauty reminds us that God is at work in the world, and that his love will win the day. All of this we forgo in order to enter into a veiled time; an unmediated, unseeing abandonment to God, who himself descends into our darkness.

You might remember that I like to talk about the disciples' hike up the mountain before Jesus' transfiguration. Every step of that journey, I'm convinced, embodied a decision to grow in trust of Jesus rather than to pull back. The same is true for us here and now: Our being blindfolded gives us a chance to cling more desperately to Christ than we might otherwise have imagined.

This time of pandemic has not been at all pleasant, and I don't want to romanticize it. But our mission to pray and love has not been annulled, quite the opposite. Trusting Jesus more fully and following him more closely these blindfolded days, we are made to receive his love more fully and live it out more sincerely for a world that desperately needs it.

I look forward to seeing you soon, my friends. As always, if you need anything please let me know.





In early October, Pope Francis launched the Church on a twoyear path of worldwide consultation, which is called Synod 2021-2023: "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission"

What is a synod? In Church terminology, the word "synod" means a meeting of the faithful to discuss the doctrinal and pastoral needs of the Church. It comes from the Greek word that means "meeting".

The Synod will go through different phases over the next two years: parish, diocesan, national, continental, and universal. The parish phase has already begun and will continue through early May. OLMC's final listening session will be:

IN CELEBRATION OF SHAKESPEARE

In April, we celebrate the birthday of William Shakespeare, the greatest playwright in the English language. As playwright and poet he gave expression the great drama—the tragedy and comedy—of our human existence. His truly timeless work continues to speak to us about love and hate, joy and despair, suffering and triumph, and virtue and vice. During these last weeks of Lent, we are drawn to this speech from *The Merchant of Venice*, which illuminates the power of mercy, both as a gift to be embraced and a virtue to be practiced.

From The Merchant of Venice, IV.i

The quality of mercy is not strain'd, It droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven Upon the place beneath: it is twice blest; It blesseth him that gives and him that takes: 'Tis mightiest in the mightiest: it becomes The throned monarch better than his crown; His sceptre shows the force of temporal power, The attribute to awe and majesty, Wherein doth sit the dread and fear of kings; But mercy is above this sceptred sway; It is enthroned in the hearts of kings, It is an attribute to God himself; And earthly power doth then show likest God's When mercy seasons justice.

Fittingly, our students not only study Shakespeare in the classroom, they bring his plays to life on the stage. Be sure to save the date for the Middle-School Spring performance of *The Tempest* on May 20 &21.

HOLY THURSDAY ALTAR OF REPOSE

"Can you not watch one hour with me?" (Mark 14:34)

This was the cry of our Lord's Sacred Heart when he found his friends asleep in the Garden of Gethsemane on the night when He was betrayed and entered willingly into his passion. On Holy Thursday, the Church offers us an opportunity to "watch with Christ" through a visit to the Blessed Sacrament at the Altar of Repose immediately following the 7pm Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday on April 14th downstairs in Gordon Hall. At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass severs "strip the altar" by removing sanctuary linens and anything moveable, they make sure that crosses and statuary are covered, they silence the church bells, and the priest removes the Holy Eucharist from the Tabernacle and brings It in great procession to an Altar of Repose away from the Sanctuary. When the Eucharist has been reposed and reserved in the alternate Tabernacle, the faithful are invited to "watch" with Christ in prayer until the Blessed Sacrament is removed from the Altar of Repose during the 3pm Celebration of the Lord's Passion the next day in the following afternoon of Good Friday. To participate in this time of "watching with Christ" at the Altar of Repose at our Lady of Mount Carmel, we invite watchers to sign up between

the hours of Thursday, April 14th, at 9pm until 3pm on Friday, April 15th. In addition to watching at our Altar of Repose, we also invite the faithful to participate in another excellent traditional Holy Thursday devotion and pilgrimage associated with this time of watching called "The Seven Churches Visitation" which invites worshippers to visit the Altar of Repose at any participating seven Catholic Churches before midnight on a Holy Thursday.

Jesus has called us His friends—let us faithfully follow Him wherever He leads us and prepare our hearts for the Feast of His glorious Resurrection—Easter Sunday.
