Divine Mercy Sunday



What is Divine Mercy Sunday?

Each year, on the Second Sunday of Easter, the Church celebrates the Sunday of Divine Mercy. In the 1930s, Jesus appeared to a humble Polish nun, St. Maria Faustina Kowalska. As Jesus continued to appear to St. Faustina, she recorded His messages in her *Diary*.

The Lord expressed His will with regard to this feast in His very first revelation to St. Faustina. The most comprehensive revelation can be found in her *Diary* entry 699:

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the divine floodgates through which graces flow. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My mercy.

When recalling our sins, we may feel discouraged or fearful of approaching God; however, we can cling to the truth that Christ's Passion on the Cross did not end in death, but in the joy of the Resurrection. The miracle of Easter gives us the courage to face our sins, confess our mistakes, and then humbly receive God's forgiveness and accept the joy that comes with new life in Christ. In His infinite love for us, God desires nothing more than to wash away our sins and offer us His mercy. He has a prepared place in His merciful heart for each of us, and no sin is bigger than His power to forgive.

No matter how we have fallen, the Resurrection of Christ is an assurance of *hope*. Christ's mercy is constantly available to us, if only we reach out to Him in faith and confidence through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The words Christ revealed to St. Faustina, He also speaks to us: "*Lay your head on my shoulder, rest and regain your strength. I am always with you*" (*Diary,* no. 498).

In many areas throughout our world today, legislation is being enacted that promotes the elimination of people with disabilities and the elderly as these groups are perceived as having no value in society and as being a drain on our physical and financial resources. The same philosophy is applied to the individual with a terminal illness. The practice of euthanizing the person with a terminal illness, under the guise of 'compassion for the pain they are suffering' is spreading in various parts of the world, including some states within our own nation. Educating our young and old about the tragedy and immorality of this practice is part of our apostolate.

With respect to the young members of our parish community, we are proud to play a part in the efforts of our Faith Formation program as they strive to educate our youth about the value and dignity of every human life. One way in which we will do this again will be to offer our students the opportunity to participate in the 2024 March for Life in Washington DC. This past January, thanks to the support of the Knights of Columbus, generous parishioners, and the parents who recognized the value of having their sons and daughters participate in the March and thus covered their expenses, we brought 17 marchers from SJA to the event. We look forward to sharing God's Truth again with our young parishioners in this same way next year.

Thank you again for your most generous outpouring of support.

WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT OUR DOUBTS?

In today's gospel, we hear about the apostle Thomas, who refused to believe in the resurrection until he put his finger into the nail marks on Jesus' hands and put his hand into the wound in Jesus' side. Have we ever been like Thomas, demanding that Jesus give us a concrete sign of his existence and love for us? What can we do about our doubts?

In some ways, it's easy to understand why Thomas doubted the resurrection. The resurrection is hard to even imagine. And yet the gospels and other sources testify to it. All the gospels agree that the resurrection happened: that the risen Christ appeared to one or more, even several witnesses. Who these people are, and in what order Christ appeared to them, differs between the gospels. Some find these differences evidence of a conspiracy; others point to the differences as indicators of truth. After all, when a group wants to perpetrate a lie, one of the first things they say is "Let's get our stories straight."

We know from the gospel that Jesus allowed Thomas to touch his hands and side, and Thomas confessed, "My Lord and my God!" This encounter transformed Thomas. He believed so fervently that he traveled all the way to India where he was martyred. My husband and I know a couple from Southern India who trace their families and their faith all the way back to Saint Thomas. In Chennai, India, the St. Thomas Cathedral Basilica and national shrine of St. Thomas is located over his tomb. Saint Thomas is one story. All the apostles, except for John, died horrible deaths for the gospel.

The gospels transformed the world. Scholars know of 5,795 Greek manuscripts of the New Testament, dated from 30-150 years after the events described in the gospels. They know of 7,974 manuscripts in other languages dated from the early second century (100 - 150 years after the events). And they know of more than 10,000 manuscripts in Latin dated from the third century and on (300-350 years). No other ancient text has those kinds of numbers. The next closest one is Homer's *Iliad*. For that, scholars know of 1,757 manuscripts, dated 400 years from the event. ([Case-Making 101: How does the Bible compare to other ancient documents?](https:// truthfaithandreason.com/case-making-101-how-does-the-bible -compare-to-other-ancient-documents/) We automatically assume that Homer's *Iliad* is authentic. Do we extend the same courtesy to the New Testament?

These numbers are just data. The gospels are the word of God, living and true. The Bible is one of the main ways that God speaks to us now. If there's one thing that can help all of us to increase our faith, it's reading the Bible. Even if we just take a few minutes to review the gospel for daily Mass, it helps us draw closer to God.

Our call is not to be like Thomas, insisting on concrete signs. We have not seen, and yet we are called to believe. Now is the time to choose God, even if we have doubts. If we choose God, we can trust Him to remove our doubts.
