Baptism: Baptisms are celebrated


monthly but must be scheduled weeks in advance. Active parishioners should contact your parish office to begin preparations.

We need to be like Martha making use of the gift of hospitality and preparedness: ensuring that the specifics of the dinner is planned, prepared and settled; or details taken care of and that a conducive environment is set up for a meeting. Like Mary, we must learn to be present to the moment, seeing it as gift and opportunity. We need the foresight to know, deep down, what is truly important and make the decision to be present. During the upcoming week, why not try to put the Martha and Mary balance strategy to use, making every effort to not get too distracted with the minutia that may sometimes cloud our vision and priorities.



Father, our niece was married in a Protestant church. The minister at the service invited everyone to communion. Should we have received communion in a protestant church?

GLAD YOU ASKED

The short answer is, "no", Catholics should not receive communion in any church service other than a Roman Catholic Church. In our "tolerate-everything" world we don't look at the differences between many things anymore. In some circumstances, that's o.k. but when it comes to our understanding of Faith and Sacraments, it's not a good practice.

As Catholics we teach Christ's true presence: body, blood, soul and divinity, in the Eucharist (our Communion). Different Christian faiths teach differently. So whatever we can do to help Catholics understand the Eucharist as a primary teaching of our Catholic faith is always time well spent.

Often times the Protestant minister will say something like, "at our church, <u>all</u> people are welcomed to receive our communion, so please feel free to join us at this table". This is further complicated because in some churches they will even use similar prayers and words that we use in our church so the invitation sounds reasonable.

Out of respect for our understanding of our most awesome Sacrament (tantum sacrumentum) of our Church, and the Holy Priesthood by which our Sacraments are conferred, when we attend other's services it is important not to give the impression that their worship and understanding is the same as ours. Therefore, the proper action for Catholics to do is to politely refrain from joining in their communion. Perhaps this time is a good time to pray for Christian unity. Maybe someday, they will return to the church they left many years, or centuries ago.

Pope Saint John Paul wrote, in his encyclical "Ecclesia de Eucharistia" "...because of the lack of the sacrament of (the Priesthood) they have not preserved the genuine and total reality of the Eucharistic mystery. ...The Catholic faithful, therefore, while respecting the religious convictions of these separated brethren, must refrain from receiving the communion distributed in their celebrations, so as not to condone an ambiguity about the nature of the Eucharist and, consequently, to fail in their duty to bear clear witness to the truth" (No. 29,30).

Likewise, non-Catholics and non practicing Catholics are asked not to receive the Eucharist when they come to our Church. We are not being rude to each other, we are being respectful to our Faith, God and our Church and at the same time acknowledging and respecting our different beliefs among faith communities.

I hope that helps, Glad you asked...

WELCOME FR. JUDE KASAIJA, FROM THE DIOCESE OF FORT PORTAL, UGANDA

We Welcome Fr. Jude Kasaija to our parish. He will be covering Masses for the next two weeks during Fr. Codega's vacation.



Fr Jude is a diocesan priest from

Christ the King parish, in the Fort Portal Diocese of Uganda. Father was ordained in 2011, and currently serves several villages in his vast territorial parish. While his visit to the Unites States is primarily a personal-holiday and sabbatical, he looks forward to meeting the good people of the parish, learning more of our culture and faith practices and visiting local attractions. Fr. Jude enjoys sharing his stories. Please invite him to breakfast or lunch (as he does not cook!) and share you story with him as well.

The Diocese of Ft. Portal, Uganda has an area of about 4,100 sq. miles (Rhode Island is about 1,212 Sq. Miles), it has a total population of about 2,515,600 and a Catholic population of about 956,100 (38%), with 24 Parishes, and 119 Priests.

The Republic of Uganda, is a landlocked country in East Africa. It is bordered to the east by Kenya, to the north by

South Sudan, to the west by the Democratic Republic of the Congo, to the south-west by Rwanda, and to the south by Tanzania, in the African Great Lakes region. Uganda also lies within the Nile basin, and has a varied but



generally a modified equatorial climate.

Beginning in 1894, the area was ruled as a protectorate by the British, who established administrative law across the territory. Uganda gained independence from Britain in 1962. The period since then has been marked by intermittent conflicts, including a lengthy civil war, which resulted in hundreds of thousands of casualties. The official languages are English and Swahili.



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
