**Reconciliation:** Saturdays at 4:00PM, or anytime by appointment

**Baptism:** Baptisms are celebrated monthly but must be scheduled weeks in advance. Active parishioners should

**Marriage:** Diocesan requirements state that arrangements should begin at least 6 months to one year before desired date of marriage. Active parishioners should contact the parish office for more details.

Adult Confirmation: Preparation for RCIA, Rite of Christian Initiation & Baptism for Adults, begins in October. Candidates are prepared for sacraments at Easter. Contact your parish office for more information.

Anointing of the Sick: Chaplains are available at the local hospital during the day and in the evenings for emergency. Because of privacy issues you may have to ask to see the priest. However, if you know you are going, or know of someone who could use a visit today, please do not hesitate to call your parish priest.

I was looking at one of my books entitled <u>Everyday Kindness</u> [365 Days to a Peaceful Life]. No sooner had I put it

down, my thoughts went to today's gospel. In Luke we are told to guard against greed for though one may be rich, one's life doesn't consist of possessions.

The person in the gospel chose to tear down and build bigger barns to store up his fortune so to feel secure for a long time. When trying to decide what he should do with his great harvest of grain he totally could have answered, *I've more than I need*, so *I'll share my* good fortune with someone who is struggling. Or another response the person could have had was, *I'll* give thanks to God, focusing on God's goodness and asking to be more trusting in God's love while sharing what I have with others. The heartbreak in this story is that the man would die that night and his plans for a secure life would be folly.

Today's gospel offers us a wonderful opportunity to take stock of our lives and to re-align our perspective. What do I hold onto: material possessions, status, or success? Do I find it difficult to share what I have? From <u>Everyday Kindness</u> (© 2017 Bounty Books): "Kindness doesn't have to involve a radical overhaul of your life. You don't need to sell all your worldly goods and go overseas to dedicate your life to a worthy cause, just the smallest acts of kindness that you can easily weave into your everyday life can make a real difference."

Freedom and security are experienced when we humbly place our lives in God's care. Trusting in God's love for us can be a tremendously freeing experience and a source of all happiness. Waaaay back in the late 70's/early 80's was a much used phrase: let go & let God! May each one of us let go & let God!

Drop this in the Sunday collection basket or mail it to the parish office and we'll send you a welcome package. "Are Eulogies permitted at Catholic Funeral Masses? Some priests say no, but other churches I have been to allow them. What does the official Church say?"

## **GLAD YOU ASKED**

This is a question that often causes controversy. First, what I think is important is to educate what a Mass of Christian Burial is by first stating what it is not. It actually is not a memorial service for the deceased. The funeral mass, although they are offered for the deceased like all masses, is always about Jesus Christ, salvation and the Eucharist. It is the perfect prayer of our Church offered for the resurrection of the departed. As the perfect prayer of the church, nothing needs to be added or removed.

Although personal words about the deceased rightfully may and should be included in the homily, these words should always point to God's grace through Christ Jesus and the eternal life offered to the Baptism of the deceased.

Unfortunately many of the "eulogies" we have all heard speak of the deceased's hobbies and favorite sports teams but never mention Jesus Christ. They are sometimes theologically incorrect and often contradict church teachings about death, purgatory, and resurrection. People leave the mass remembering the jokes, stories and anecdotes, and forget they have just received the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Although these may be touching remarks, I hope you can see they don't really belong in the Liturgy.

So, the answer is, "no". In 2003 the Church released the new "General Instruction for the Roman Missal" (the playbook for mass) the Church's position was stated pretty clearly, "At the Funeral Mass there should, as a rule, be a short homily, but never a eulogy of any kind." An older document from 1989 entitled "Order of Christian Funerals" (OCF) also stated, "A brief homily based on the readings should always be given at the funeral liturgy, but never any kind of eulogy." [OCF # 141]

So why the confusion if it's so clear? Prior to 1989 Eulogies at Catholic funeral masses may have been more common. Additionally, many protestant churches' memorial services commonly include several eulogies and like the unity candle at weddings these practices have made their way into Catholic Liturgies.

It's my role as pastor to those souls entrusted to my care to teach and preach only Church instructions to the best of my ability. I suggest to families that they may wish to offer a few words of remembrance at the vigil, the grave-side or at the cemetery chapel before the final commendation and committal of the deceased. These are the times when your closest family and friends, those who can best relate to the words are present

In short, please try to see the Wisdom of the Church's teaching before we judge the messenger.
