My dear friends,

Neither do I condemn you!

With the celebration of the Fifth Sunday of Lent, we have just two short weeks remaining before Easter. Let's not waste them. In our first reading, Isaiah 43:16-21, while remembering and rooting

himself in the memory of the past, the prophet focuses on something new that God is doing. In the past, God freed Israel's ancestors from Egypt, leading them through the sea, but destroying Pharaoh's army: "The Lord opens a way in the sea and a path in the mighty waters, who leads out chariots and horsemen, a powerful army, till they lie prostrate together, never to rise, snuffed out and quenched like a wick." But now God is doing something new, announcing that the people's captivity in Babylon is coming to an end, and that God will prepare a way through the desert for them to come home. "Remember not the events of the past, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new! Now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? In the desert I make a way..." A new exodus is going to take place.

The gospel passage, John 8:1-11, is the story of Jesus bringing forth something new. Trying to put Jesus in a difficult situation, the scribes and Pharisees "brought forth a woman who had been caught in adultery." They then ask him to interpret the ancient Law: "Now in the law, Moses commanded us to stone such women. So what do you say?" John informs us of the interrogators' duplicity: "They said this to test him, so they could have some charge to bring against him." What they are hoping to do is to make Jesus a law breaker if he says the woman should be freed, or an unpopular teacher with the crowds, who were expecting a new, more compassionate approach. What Jesus does, however, is masterful. He turns the tables on the scribes and Pharisees by making the discussion about them, and indeed, everyone who was listening. His famous response is, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." When hearing this, Jesus' opponents "went away one by one, beginning with the elders." Jesus, for his part, shows something wonderfully new. Without ignoring the seriousness of the sin, he demonstrates God's tender mercy and forgiveness. "Has no one condemned you? Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin any more."
