

Dear God's Holy people, just a day after celebrating the birth of Jesus we celebrate his family, the Holy Family. This reminds us that the Savior was born into a family. This celebration gives inspiration to the family, the basic unit of society and the first Church and the first school. The Mass of the day reminds us of how the Child developed in a family which devoutly observed religious practices.

The first reading from the book of Sirach contains wise counsels on how to lead a life pleasing to God. This section of Sirach deals with the relationship between parents and children and the respect and care to be expected from children. The family is really a basic cell of society, and a lot takes place in the family. 'It is the natural society in which husband and wife are called to give themselves in love and in the gift of life. Authority, stability, and a life of relationships within the family constitute the foundation for freedom, security, and fraternity within society... The family is the community in which, from childhood, one can learn moral values, begin to honor God, and make good use of freedom. Family life is an initiation into life in society' CCC 2207. For this reason, Psychologists say that we are our parents. What we become in society can be traced back to our family. 'A good tree produces good fruit and a bad tree bad fruit'. We need to be careful what we make of homes as parents. It was Mother Theresa who said, "What can you do to promote world peace? Go home and love your family".

The qualities of the Holy Family we need to immolate for the good of our family. A holy family is accepting of the frailty of its members and of behaviors that may not be what the family

Word on Fire – ENGAGE program, "Priest, Prophet, King" Session 6 – "King of Kings" - Pope Benedict XVI wrote in Jesus of Nazareth: From the Baptism in the Jordan to the Transfiguration (Doubleday, 2007), the "core content of the Gospels is this: The Kingdom of God is at hand. ... This announcement [of the Kingdom] is the actual core of Jesus' words and works. Benedict makes this crucial observation: the "basic question is actually about the relationship between the Kingdom of God and Christ. It is on this that our understanding of the Church will depend". "Jesus himself is the Kingdom; the Kingdom is not a thing; it is not a geographical dominion like worldly kingdoms. It is a person; it is he".

Reflection:

- 1. What does Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI mean when he writes in his book Jesus of Nazareth that "Jesus himself is the Kingdom..."? (CCC 541-42; 763-66; 2816-21)
- 2. Pope Pius XI wrote that the kingdom established by Jesus "is spiritual and is concerned with spiritual things." What does that mean regarding the nature of kingdom and the way that it is revealed and known in the world? (Isa. 9:5-6; Jn. 18:36-37; CCC 550, 2816)
- 3. How do we, especially the laity, share in the kingship of Christ here on earth? (Gen 1:27-30; Matt. 20:25-28; CCC 898, 2013, 2015)


Women Who Have Had Abortions Speak Out - The most powerful and convincing advocates for the pro-life movement are the courageous women who have had an abortion, yet are willing to speak out. This is increasingly evident and was very clear during a recent legislative hearing on a Right to Know bill (providing more information to any expectant mother considering an abortion) in the Wyoming legislature. The pro-life side of the debate packed the hearing room with women. They consisted of mothers who have had abortions and have personal experience of the subsequent problems. These brave women who testified spoke of being "treated like cattle" at the Planned Parenthood abortion center. They talked about the lack of choices and information and how staff at the abortion business "sold" the abortion to them. They talked about spiritual and mental health issues they faced following their abortion, referred to the miscarriages and problems in subsequent pregnancies, spoke of the breast cancer they battled, and of the regret and guilt they had to overcome. The legislators and the abortion advocates had little response. How can you respond to someone's tragic personal story? When women who know firsthand how abortion hurt them share their side of the story (which too often is the forgotten part of the debate) it is virtually impossible to refute. Although the babies cannot speak for themselves, no one can do so with the same intensity and feeling as women who have had abortions and have found genuine healing and, forgiveness afterwards. We need to show our love and appreciation to all our mothers. We should also be particularly thankful to the mothers who have had abortions and who have found healing and are now speaking out on behalf of the pro-life movement. As these brave women increasingly lead the battle, we are increasingly likely to win the abortion war! - Ruth Weber

ORIGIN AND HISTORY OF THE SOLEMNITY OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD - On New Years Day, Catholics celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, with a feast. This celebration is within the octave of Christmas. An octave is an eight day extension of the feast. In the modern Roman Calendar, only Christmas and Easter have an octave. This holiday is a celebration of Mary's motherhood of Jesus. It is a reminder of the role she played in the salvation of humankind.

The title "Mother of God" is a western derivation from the Greek *Theotokos*, which means "God-bearer". Mary being chosen by God, the Father, to bring Jesus Christ into this world, and her willingness to do so is great cause for celebration. Without her role, Jesus would not have been able to die for the sins of humanity, thus giving them a second chance at redemption.

The honoring of Mary as the Mother of God can be traced back to the Council of Ephesus in 431. By the 7th century, January 1st was observed as a celebration of the Maternity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. In the 13th century, the Feast of the Circumcision of Christ had come to replace the feast honoring Mary. However, in 1751, Pope Benedict XIV allowed Portugal's churches to devote a feast to Mary on the first Sunday in May. This was because of a push in Portugal for an official feast day celebrating Mary's divine maternity. Eventually, the feast was expanded to include other countries.

In 1914, the feast started to be observed on October 11. In 1931, Pope Pius XI extended the feast to the entire church. In 1974, Pope Paul VI removed the feast of the Circumcision of Christ from the liturgical calendar. He replaced it with the feast of the "Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God", bringing Mary's feast day back to the first day of the calendar year. - *Dhruti Bhagat*
