We rely on our volunteers to care for our congregants and your actions are very much appreciated by the recipients.

Maintaining Health & Safety, Inclusivity, and a Return to Our Sanctuary

At the start of the summer, Temple Sinai's Re-Opening Advisory Committee expressed its "cautious anticipation" about the trends of higher vaccination rates in Massachusetts, and lowered its restrictions on Temple activities in our building due to COVID-19. Vaccination remains the best way to lower health risk, both personally and to other community members. The Committee reiterated the multiple values that have informed its recommendations about High Holy Days Services: safety, inclusion, and the return to a sense of normalcy.

As of this writing at the end of July, we are planning on holding services in-person without restricting capacity. We will also ensure that everyone is included in our activities, particularly those who are unable to be vaccinated or are unable to attend in person. Information about mask-wearing policies for services will be provided later in August; please watch for announcements. We are aware as well that public health trends may change as the summer proceeds, and, with the recommendations of our Re-Opening Committee, Temple Sinai may update its policies if the need arises. Please watch for additional announcements closer to the start of the High Holy Days season.

Preparing Your Heart in Elul

The Hebrew month of Elul precedes the High Holy Days and is a month for personal preparation and reflection. Again this year, we are pleased to provide a number of safe outdoor gatherings in public spaces for Shofar blowing during Elul, pre-Rosh Hashanah Tashlich, Singing Circles, and more, as opportunities for members of our community to greet one another and to engage in the critical spiritual preparation that allows before the High Holy Days themselves arrive. Please watch for announcements about the times, dates, and locations of these events, which will be led by Rabbi Vogel and Rabbi Stein, and which will deeply enhance your appreciation of the High Holy Days and the possibility of change and renewal for ourselves and our lives.

New Enhancements to Our Sanctuary

We eagerly await a Sanctuary full of people celebrating the High Holy Days and greeting one another joyously and safely. We will provide hand sanitizer and masks for those who want them for health and safety, in addition to providing optional *kippot* and *tallitot* as ritual items.

We are happy to announce that we installed a new hi-resolution camera at the rear of our Sanctuary to broadcast our services on video, which will allow for close-up views as well as a nearly full bird's-eye view of the Sanctuary, for those participating via livestream video.

We are also happy to note that this summer, nearly all the windows in our historic Sanctuary were repaired and restored, and we are now able to open them for increased air ventilation in the Sanctuary for improved health and safety, and for cool breezes (we hope!) to lower the room's temperature on hot days.

To guide our prayer, our congregation will again use the Reform *Machzor* (High Holy Day prayer book) *Mishkan HaNefesh*, which draws from the wellsprings of Jewish tradition and adds its own beautiful and modern sensibilities to our High Holy Days. If you are attending in person, you can pray from one of the Temple's prayer books, which our greeters will hand to you as you arrive. For those participating by video, the Machzor will also be screen-shared during the livestreamed version of the service. Those who wish to borrow a Machzor from the Temple for the High Holy Day season may do so by contacting Paul Kelly in our office; you may also purchase the two-volume *Mishkan HaNefesh* at one of the excellent Jewish bookstores in Brookline.

We are delighted that our former Rabbinic Intern and Vocalist Leah Carnow will lend her voice to our High Holy Day services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, before she leaves for Israel to spend the year studying there. Our pianist Hannah Shields will join us once again, with other musicians.

Torah Reading and Sermon Services

Like last year, our services on the mornings of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur will again be separated into two distinct timeblocks, with the Morning Service held from 9:30-11:15 a.m., followed by a 15-minute break, and then at 11:30 a.m. we will begin the Torah Reading and Sermon service until 12:45 p.m. Please feel free to participate in whichever service(s) you wish, in person or remotely.

Family Services: Mornings at 9:30 A.M.

We are providing an opportunity for families with children to celebrate Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur mornings together in Family Services in the Weintraub Community Room, led by Rabbi Stein and musicians, from 9:30 to 11:15 a.m. on both days. Masks will be required for all participants in these services. Anyone may attend; these joyful and participation-oriented services are especially geared for families with elementary school-age children, but all are welcome. Because space is limited in Weintraub, **pre-registration is required by Wednesday, Sept. 1.** See our website for registration details.

Children's Activities During Morning Services

We are providing children-only activities in our Religious School classrooms for students in grades Pre-K-3, for those who wish, during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Morning services, from 9:30 until 11:15 a.m., with teachers and Madrichim providing engaging, fun holiday activities and a children's service. **Pre-regis-tration is required by Wednesday, Sept. 1** for these activities, and all children participating must wear masks. See our website for registration details.

Oneg in the Street!

Join us for a festive Rosh Hashanah Oneg for the New Year outdoors on Charles Street in front of the Temple's main staircase after the evening service! We have asked the Town of Brookline to block off the street to traffic so we can gather and celebrate outdoors together (weather permitting) with dessert and refreshments.

Tashlich on Rosh Hashanah

On Rosh Hashanah morning, services are followed by the traditional *Tashlich* service for symbolically casting sins and regrets into a body of water. Please meet at the Temple steps at 12:45 p.m. to walk to the Muddy River at the Longwood MBTA Station to observe this ritual together, and cast bread crumbs into the water with singing and meditation.

2nd Day Rosh Hashanah Picnic and Shofar-Blowing

Our community will celebrate the 2nd day of Rosh Hashanah on Wednesday, Sept. 8, at Larz Anderson Park in Brookline (Goddard Avenue entrance, at the Shelter) at 10:30 a.m. with a community picnic and Shofar blowing. Please bring a Shofar if you own one, a blanket, and your own Rosh Hashanah lunch; our Music, Prayer, & Ritual Committee will provide apples and honey.

Yom Kippur Healing Service and Forum Panel

We will again hold our Healing Service in Ehrenfried Hall at 1:00 p.m. on Yom Kippur afternoon, led by Temple Sinai members, an opportunity to join together in prayers for health, life, and strength for those who seek personal healing. This service will also be livestreamed on video.

At 3:00 p.m., please join us for our annual Yom Kippur Forum Panel Discussion, in which Temple Sinai members will share their reflections on particular topics relevant to the spirit of this holy day. Join us in person in the Sanctuary, or by livestreamed video.

Afternoon Services, Yizkor, and Ne'ilah Services

As in previous years, we will hold the final three services of Yom Kippur one after the next, beginning at 4:30 p.m., and this year all three services will be held both in-person and by livestream video. Our *Yizkor* service is an opportunity to remember loved ones, including those whose lives were taken by COVID-19 in the past year, or who died in any other year. Our *Ne'ilab* (concluding, closing) service, which is very dramatic and emotional, will conclude near 7:00 p.m.

Food Drive for the BMC Grow Clinic

We will again support Boston Medical Center's Grow Clinic's food pantry, which assists children in need with food items and other resources to support their physical nutrition and healthy growth. There are two ways to participate: bringing food and other items to the Temple when you come to High Holy Day services (see the list of items in the enclosed flyer), or by making a financial donation to the Grow Clinic through the Temple Sinai website or by check. Thank you for participating in this act of tzedakah, and for helping our community support the work of the Grow Clinic!

Welcoming Guests and Family Members

Temple Sinai members will receive High Holy Day tickets as a part of their membership. Members may also invite close relatives to attend our in-person services in the Sanctuary, and are asked to pay \$150 for a ticket for each guest.

We also welcome non-members to join us for the High Holy Days! People who wish to join us in our Sanctuary can purchase an admittance card at \$250 per ticket. One ticket covers admission to all our High Holy Day services. Non-members who wish to join us by our online video livestream may do so by visiting Temple Sinai's website, www.SinaiBrookline.org. There is no charge for online attendance, but donations are very much appreciated. Those contributions allow us to continue to offer the rich and diverse programming that we make available to the community throughout the year. Welcome!

Balancing Security and Welcoming

Temple Sinai strives to ensure our congregation's physical safety and security and also maintain our welcoming environment consistent with our core values. We strive to find the right balance between inclusivity and security. Our Board of Trustees and our Security Committee have consulted with local experts and law enforcement officials and developed thoughtful policies to achieve this balance. Our staff and greeter volunteers have previously participated in security trainings for Jewish institutions, we have taken steps to equip our building with the necessary security features, and we will have security professionals on site during the High Holy Days, as in previous years. Ensuring a safe community environment is of utmost importance to our congregation as we enter the New Year. If you have specific questions about Temple Sinai's safety and security policies or procedures, please contact our Executive Director, Linda Katz.

Exchange Tickets

If you would like courtesy seating at distant Reform congregations, the Temple office can provide you with an official URJ request form. If your out-of-town guests belong to a Reform congregation, we ask them to get a form from their home congregation so that they can attend our services without charge.

Parking

Parking can be challenging in Brookline. To minimize your chances of getting a Brookline overtime parking ticket, use only legal spaces and leave a Temple bulletin or a big note on your car indicating that you are attending High Holy Day services at Temple Sinai. We will inform the Brookline Police about the holiday, but a reminder may help the local patrol people. And please remember to avoid parking in all private parking lots (including avoiding parking in the Trader Joe's or Neena's lots on the other side of the post office, day or evening). We've had years when members' cars have been towed, which does not enhance anyone's holiday.
