






Various and Sundry

Sometimes it's worth addressing a number of topics in brief rather than focusing on one thing. The following might be placed under the caption "**These confusing times.**"

The Pope: I can't defend everything he says and I haven't taken the time to separate and distinguish what is "cherry picked" by the media and what he has actually said. I do wish that he would be more careful and disciplined. My personal reading of the man is that a large part of his project has been a response against certain bishops and priests who might share in the description Jesus gave to the Pharisees and scribes in Matthew 23:4: "They tie up heavy burdens, hard to carry, and lay them on people's shoulders, but they will not lift a finger to move them," (i.e. "to assist them"). As a priest who worked in the barrios of Buenos Aires, the man has abundant experience with the real-life struggles of people. He does not speak with the professorial discipline of his predecessors but in a colloquial/informal way. Add to this reality a news media with its own, sensationalizing, agenda and we have controversy and confusion. Furthermore, we see divisions in the church which mirror the sad divisions of the society. I can only counsel great caution with respect to extremist sources of information, whether on the "left" or the "right."

Where's the love? The Devil has done a good job of domesticating the word "Love" in society and in the Church. Love has become sentimentalized and restricted: We "love" those who "love us." Yet, "Even sinners love those who love them!" (Luke 6:32). And then love is reducible to sweet and romantic feelings such as one sees on the Hallmark Movie Channel. We can't seem to take seriously Jesus words on the topic: "Bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you ... love your enemies and do good to them." I think the reason for this is this identification of "love" with good or positive feelings. But, I think that the "love" of which Jesus speaks is something along the lines "Even though I may despise your beliefs or actions and that vou have done great harm to me. I pray that only the grace of God and His goodness come upon you and that you receive it into your heart," (or something like this).

If you really have need for a taste of vengeance then I suppose you could appeal to Romans 12:20 wherein St. Paul says "If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by doing so you will heap burning coals on his head. Do not be conquered by evil but conquer evil with good." But, in context, the meaning of such "burning coals" has the effect of melting the frozen heart and fostering the possibility of reconciliation.

It is hugely disappointing to see figures in Catholic social media adopt the combative tone and *ad hominum* sort of attacks seen in the secular political sphere. Where's the love?

Personal Morality vs Social Justice: For the life of me, I cannot understand how these two aspects of morality must be considered "mutually exclusive." The problem seems to be the exclusive focus on the former by people on *the right* and the exclusive focus of the latter by people on *the left*. Being pro-life and pro-traditional marriage ought not prevent one from being against racism and for efforts to care for the poor and vice versa. I speak here of general positions, not specific movements or philosophies: These we can certainly argue and discuss. But, while there is a hierarchy of values from most-important to least-important, the elements of these general categories are not mutually exclusive.



Over-identification with labels: This category touches upon all of the foregoing. What is called "tribalism" in the secular political sphere is called "factionalism" in the Bible. St. Paul confronts this reality in a church context and roundly criticizes it: "For it has been reported to me that there are rivalries among you . . . I mean that each of you is saying 'I belong to Paul,' or 'I belong to Apollos,' or 'I belong to Cephas,' or 'I belong to Christ.' Is Christ divided? 1 Cor. 1:10

Divide and Conquer: Herein I suppose the subtext is that the devil is hard at work with a familiar strategy, "divide and conquer" both in the secular society and in the Church. I'm just appealing to some basic Christianity in hopes to foster some reflection and prayer.


Church Women United (Women of Faith)

Parking Mindfulness at OLV

For the safety and care of all, please be considerate when parking your car in the main lot both during Masses and when coming to the office for meetings or events. When attending Mass, *pull all the way forward* to fill each row. Parishioners do leave in a timely fashion so you will not be "trapped" in a spot. So, please, do not park at the end of the row when first arriving.

If you attend morning Mass and are staying for a meeting, gathering, etc. **please move your car from the main lot after Mass**, *before* **coming into your meeting**. There are funerals planned and the bereaved family and friends attending the Mass will need to pull into the main parking lot. We do not want them to have to weave in/out around parked cars.

When attending or hosting an event in the Parish Center, *attendees need to park in the back parking*. **Please do not use the main parking lot of the main church**.

The fire lanes areas that are marked with yellow/ orange stripes are NOT parking areas —not even if you are quickly dropping off an item to the Parish Office. For the safety of all and the chance that emergency vehicles need to enter, only park in designated spots and always observe posted rules (ie, no parking in fire lanes).

Give every child a chance

According to the National Center for Child Poverty, about 15 million children in the United States—21 percent of all children—live in families with incomes below the federal poverty line. The Christ Child Society seeks to address the critical needs of these children. U.S.-born Servant of God Mary Virginia Merrick, who died on this day in 1955, founded the Christ Child Society in 1887 at the age of 20—despite being paralyzed from a childhood injury. Tuesday, Jan 11, 2022

Pray the way to a more perfect union

Dom Lambert Beauduin, a Belgian Benedictine monk, died this day in 1960—but not without influencing the way we pray at Mass. As a liturgical scholar, Beauduin championed—years before Vatican II—the idea of worshipers actively participating in the Mass rather than sitting in pews to pray their private devotions. He promoted the idea of congregants literally "being on the same page," able to follow along with the Latin by using worship aides to translate the words of priests and prayers. "Beauduin had an insatiable thirst for unity," notes a biographer. Pray for greater unity in our church today. "On the sabbath he entered the synagogue and taught."

Wednesday, Jan 12, 2022

Here I am, Lord

Jesus saw his healing ministry of the sick and spiritually oppressed as a call from God. It is the same call each of us receives, not only to serve God and his people but to serve ourselves—to be our best selves, which will bring us the greatest joy. Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, known as an apostle of love, explains the profound grace that comes with responding to God's call in his "Jesus, the very thought of thee" hymn: "... how kind thou art! How good to those who seek!/ But what to those who find? Ah, this No tongue nor pen can show;/ The love of Jesus, what it is None but His loved ones know."

"Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come."

Thursday, Jan 13, 2022 **MEMORIAL OF HILARY, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH**

In defense of the faith

Saint Hilary (d. 468) was a bishop during a time of great contention in the early church. He was popularly selected to lead, and he undertook scholarship that continues to be recognized today. His informal title, "Hammer of the Arians," has a violent ring to it, but in fact, he defended the Trinity against the Arian heresy through his writing, even though his opponents used the more forcible method of exile. Living a truly Christian life—loving those who oppose you, forgiving wrongs, turning the other cheek—has often been ridiculed by those who prefer the use of force. You can "defend" the faith by the way you choose to live. "A leper came to him and kneeling down begged him and said, 'If you wish, you can make me clean.' "

Friday, Jan 14, 2022

I feel your pain

Healing gospel-style involves assessing the physical, mental, and spiritual health of the ill person. As Pope Francis says, Jesus asks us: "To stop and listen, to establish a direct and personal relationship with others, to feel empathy and compassion, and to let their suffering become our own as we seek to serve them." This holistic approach is slowly being embraced by Western physicians. Today's healthcare providers are encouraged to use such tools as the FICA method to assess a patient's faith; its importance in their decisionmaking: their connection to a community of likeminded believers; and the recommended action related to the spiritual assessment. We're all commissioned to be healers to some extent; the next time someone comes to you in pain, remember this compassionate approach.

Saturday, Jan 15, 2022

The stone rejected

In our continued observance of the Amoris Laetitia Family Year, we are reminded by Pope Francis to consider the complexities of people's lives when we're tempted to judge their family or marital situation. "It can no longer simply be said," writes the pope, "that all those living in any 'irregular situation' are living in a state of mortal sin." Non-traditional families need to be offered "understanding, comfort, and acceptance." We need to stop applying moral laws as if they were, in the pope's words, "stones to throw at a person's life." Consider today the grace of God's mercy, compassion, and forgiveness operating in your own life.



Saint of the Week

Born a pagan, St. Hilary (c. 315 – c. 367) studied philosophy and the meaning of life, eventually making his way through the bible. He became a convert and was appointed bishop of Poitiers in 353. Sometimes referred to as the Hammer of the Arians, St. Hilary defended the Nicene Creed against a popular heresy, Arianism. He was exiled to Phrygia for opposing Roman emperor Constantius II, who preferred the heresy which denies Christ's divinity. From Phyrgia St. Hilary fought with his pen, zealously writing against the heresy.

Eventually he was allowed to return to Poitiers, but did so by a circuitous route, preaching against Arianism all the way. St. Hilary was likely the first writer of hymns in the West, his writings on the Trinity, Psalms and Gospel of Matthew survive today. St. Hilary was created Doctor of the Church, a title given to those who provided important contributions to theology and doctrine, in 1851 by Pope Pius IX.
